Council Okays Raise In Price Of Water

After hearing spirited arguments both for and against proposed new water rates, Bronte's city council went into a business meeting last Thursday night and approved a rate raise which was proposed about a month ago.

A representative crowd attended the meeting which was held at 6:30 p.m. prior to the council's regular meeting time. Some counter-proposals were offered in place of the one made by the council, but the final decision was to approve a rate schedule as follows:

First 3,000 gallons, \$4.00

Next 4,000 gallons, 50 cents per

Voter Registration Will End Today

Today (Thursday) is the last day for persons who do not have a poll tax receipt to register in order to be eligible to participate in forthcoming elections.

The voter registration is being done by County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs and his office force. An application blank was printed in last week's paper for those who wish to apply by mail for the voter registration certificate.

Jacobs said that applications must be in his hands by Thursday. A March 17 postmark on a mail request will not suffice, unless it reaches the tax collector's office on the same day.

Jacobs emphasized that anyone who has a poll tax receipt for 1966, or who is exempt from paying the tax does not have to register in order to be eligible to vote. "This registration is strictly for persons 21 to 60 years old, who did not pay a poll tax," Jacobs said.

The water price was raised, council members stated, because revenue from the water system was not meeting expenses. Mayor Royce Lee, who presided at the hearing, told those present that the rates were set in 1953, and prices on labor and all material used in operating the water system have taken a considerable jump since that time.

Some items, the mayor said, have doubled in price, and just about everything used has increased in cost.

It was also brought out at the meeting that prices for tying on to the water mains have been raised, as have prices on water which is being hauled from here.

Jaycee Snake Roundup Planned for March 26-27

Bronte Jaycees' big annual Rattlesnake Roundup will be uncoiled here Saturday and Sunday, March 26 and 27. The Jaycees are hoping for at least a repeat of last year's successful event, when over 2,000 persons attended the exhibition and over 1,100 rattlers were captured. The show will be held in the Rawlings Building between The Bronte Enterprise and C. R. Smith and Co.

Biggest prizes offered at any snake hunt will be offered to hunters. Totaling \$275, the prizes will be distributed as follows: \$150 for the most pounds of snakes brought in Saturday; \$75 for most pounds on Sunday; \$25 for the longest snake; \$25 for the snake with most rattles.

Dolan Mackey, who is overall chairman for the Jaycees, said this week that advertising is being distributed over a large area of West Texas. He said Jaycees hope to have even more hunters than last year, since the big \$275 purse will be "a real incentive for some of those fellows to join in the hunt."

Council, Doctor Say Pets Should Be Vaccinated

The city council in its meeting last week went on record as recommending that all dogs and cats in the city be vaccinated for rabies. The council's action was backed up in a statement this week from city health officer Dr. John R. Harris.

Council members and Dr. Harris concurred in their opinions that for the welfare of the community all pets should be immunized as soon as possible. The council also announced that city ordinances dealing with stray cats and dogs should be enforced, and asked anyone who knows of stray animals to call Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker or Constable Hiram Brock.

A refreshment stand will be operated during both days of the show. Members of Zeta Delta H. D. Club will operate the concession, and will serve fresh cooked rattlesnake steaks at all times, along with more conventional refreshment items.

As a preliminary to the Roundup, an exhibit of rattlers is already on display in Bronte at Hurlin Lee's Service Station. Lee said that everyone is invited to stop by and take a look at the snakes. "We've got some big ones around here," Lee said, and added that they will be used to start the show.

Edward Rawlings is furnishing his building free of charge for the show and a number of area ranchmen have contributed to the \$275 in prize money.

Parallel Parking On Oliver Decried By City Council

Bronte's city council, meeting last Thursday night, unanimously decided that vehicles be required to park parallel on Oliver Avenue. This street runs east and west and is one block south of Main Street. It carries traffic to Bronte County Park and to the school. Area of the street covered by the decision extends eastward from Jefferson Street (where the school is located) to the east side of Randall Street (which is two blocks east of Highway 277). Parallel parking will go into effect April 1.

Proper traffic lanes will be marked on the street, extending nine feet on either side of the center, and parking will be allowed outside the traffic lanes.

Members of the council issued this statement:

"We hope to impress upon the general public that this is not meant to irritate or disturb anyone, but to provide a more accessible route to and from the post office, the park and the school. We sincerely hope everyone will cooperate with this traffic regulation; if they do not, traffic violation tickets will be issued."

The council said that notice of this regulation in The Enterprise is meant to serve as first notice to would be offenders.

After 16 Years Letter Gets Here

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. received a letter in Monday morning's mail which was slightly overdue. The letter evidently turned up recently in Austin and was sent from that post office on to Bronte.

Addressed to Miss Jeannell Best, the letter bore a three cent stamp and a Baytown postmark dated Apr. 16, 1950. The Austin postmark was dated Mar. 14, 1966.

Pruitt said he had no way of telling where the letter has been the past 16 years. "There are several possibilities, but it's impossible to say what caused the holdup," he said.

Board Re-elects All Teachers

Bronte School's board of trustees, in a meeting last Thursday night, elected teachers for the 1966-67 school year. All classroom teachers, with the exception of Mrs. R. C. Lasswell who had submitted her resignation earlier, were reelected.

At previous meetings the board had considered contracts of Supt. C. B. Barbee and Principals Joe B. Simpson and James Golson.

In other business transacted at the meeting, the board:

—Announced that a 1963 Corvair station wagon is for sale for \$595.

—Approved a board of equalization made up of D. K. Glenn, president; J. B. Mackey, secretary, and Sid Evans, with Bill Thomas to serve as alternate.

—Approved a drivers education course to be taught at the end of the current school term. Supt. Barbee said that in all probability the course will be taught by Coach Raughton, and classes will probably start May 30. The car for the class will be furnished free of charge by Caperton Chevrolet Co. Tuition will be \$25 per student.

—Approved an application for participation in Title I and II programs of the Secondary and Elementary Education Act of 1964. Barbee said he will have an announcement later on this program.

—Agreed to sell the school's 1956 Chevrolet passenger car for \$100.

—Ratified the annual report for the textbook selection committee.

—Approved the final application for foundation funds.

—Reviewed the economic index of the county.

—Approved a color schedule submitted by the architect in charge of new construction of the new building.

—Approved the resignation of Marvin Corley as one of the school's custodian, effective March 15, and agreed not to employ a full time replacement for him until next summer.

—Postponed consideration of purchasing vinyl tile for the new agriculture building.

The superintendent said that renewing of teacher contracts at the meeting brought out the fact that all teachers in Bronte School above the first six grades were employed with a salary above the state level, which is based on experience and educational qualifications.

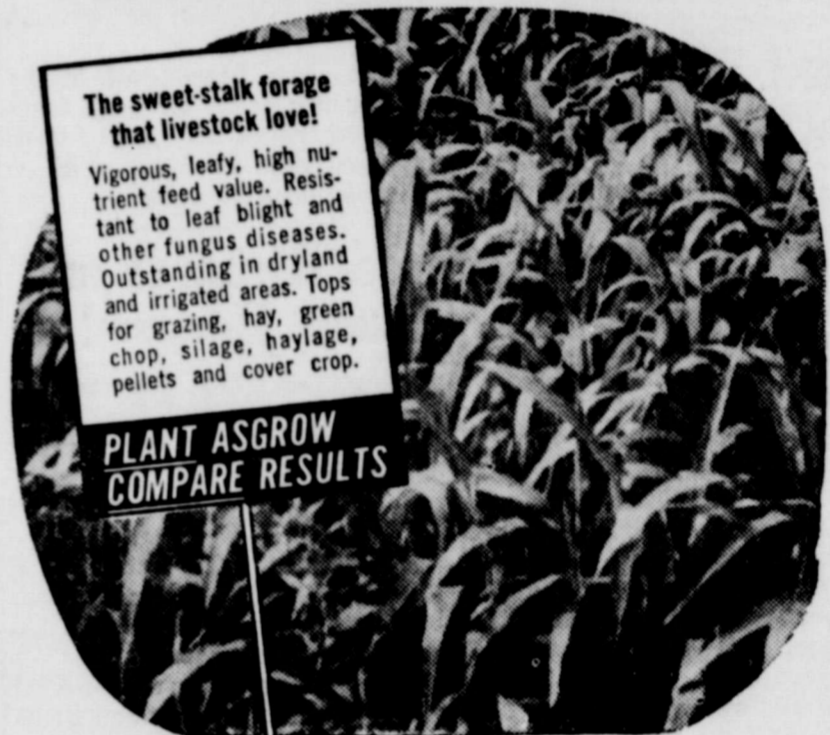

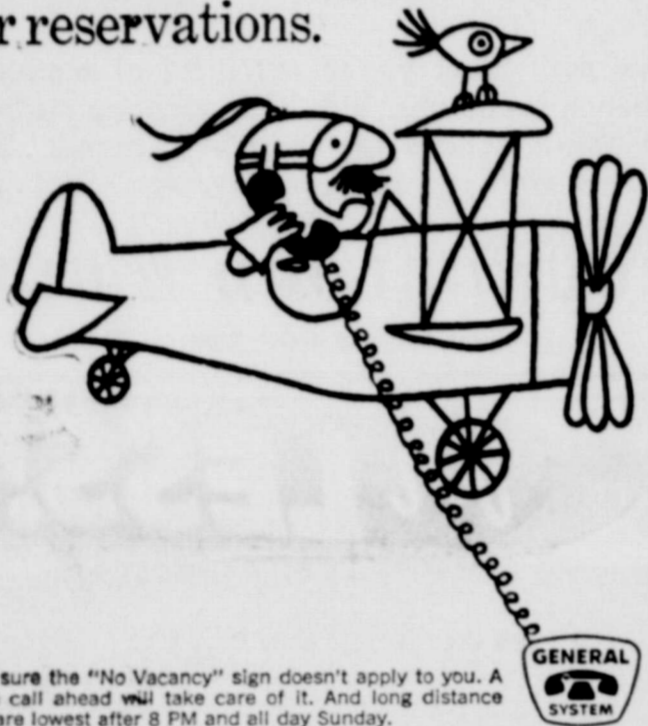
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MRS. EDDIE HANSON DIES AT BETTY

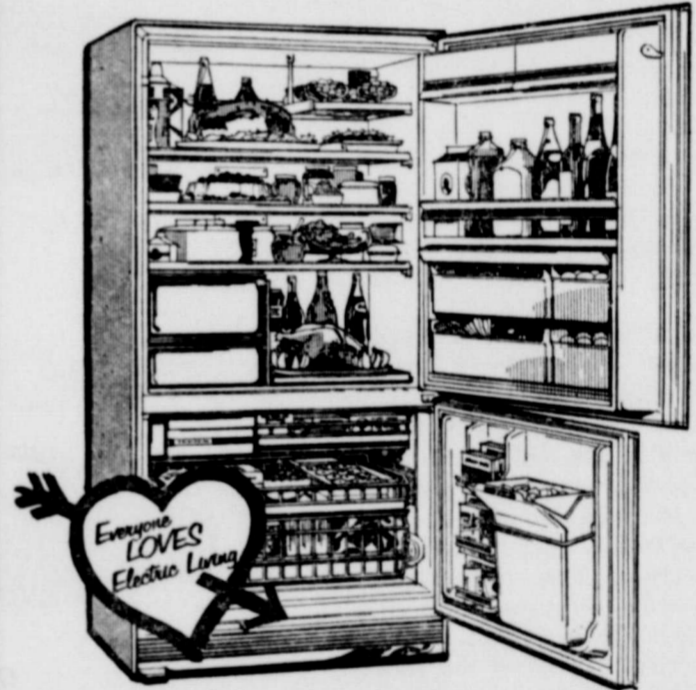
