




Mrs. McLendon died at 6:35 p.m. Sunday in an Abilene Rest Home after a two-year illness.

Besides qualifying for price-support loans, purchases, and payments, the paticipating grower also earns a diversion payment for shifting part of his feed grain base to a conserving use; the payment dces not apply to the first 20 percent diversion except on farms with small bases. The price-support payments may be earned on the projected production from an acreage up to 50 per cent of the total feed grain base for the farm by planting one or more of the feed grains, corn, grain sorghums, or barley or by planting soybeans in lieu of a feed grain.

Two trophies, one for each partner, will be given for first, second and third place winners. A new golf ball will be given each participant before he tees off.


Clyde Lee will serve as tournament director and A. E. Bell Jr. will be assistant. Lee said the association is hopeful that about 160 golfers will participate.
