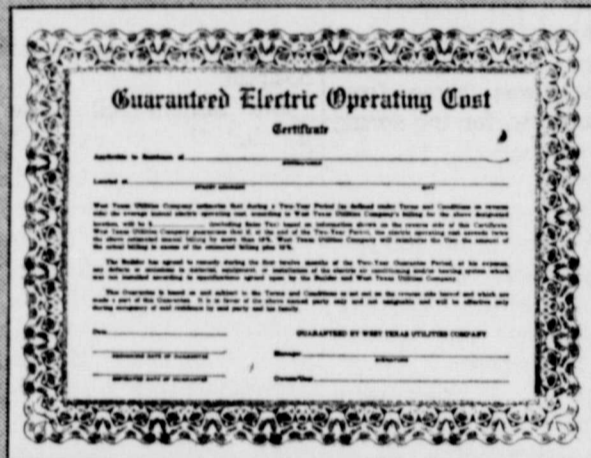

Medicare Signup Deadline Extended

Older persons in Coke County who did not sign up for the voluntary doctor bill insurance under medicare before the close of the first enrollment period on March 31 have been given a little more time, Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said.

In legislation signed by President Johnson last week, Congress extended until May 31 the deadline for enrollment by persons 65 or over.

Nearly 90 percent of the Nation's elderly were enrolled for the doctor bill insurance when social security offices closed at midnight on March 31, Ellington said. Only 5 percent had turned down the protection which supplements the basic hospital insurance provided persons 65 or over.

Another five percent had not made up their minds either way, or else were not aware of the deadline and the need to sign up for the supplementary protection.

Older persons who have not yet applied for their medicare benefits should get in touch with the nearest social security office now, Ellington said.
