Last Rites Held For Nish Taylor

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 10 a.m. at Central Baptist Church for Nish J. Taylor, 78, resident of Coke County for 66 years. The Rev. Wayne N. Stout, Central Baptist pastor, and the Rev. Harry Morris, pastor of First Baptist Church, were in charge of the services. Burial was in Fort Chadbourne Cemetery, under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Taylor died Monday afternoon in Bronte Hospital, following a long illness. He had been hospitalized in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring until recently. Full military honors were rendered in the graveside rites by a color guard from Goodfellow Air Force Base. Mr. Taylor was born March 6, 18-88, in Georgia, and came to Coke County in 1900. He was married to Vivian Bamlett, April 19, 1924, in Roscce. He was a Baptist and a veteran of World War I. Survivors include his wife; a son, J. D. Taylor of Blackwell; a brother, Andrew Taylor of Ballinger; four sisters, Mrs. Martha Whitlow of Albuquerque, N.
