Students To Participate In Regional UIL Meet

A total of eight Bronte students have been certified for participation in the regional literary meet which will be held Saturday at Howard County Junior College, Big Spring. The students qualified for regional competition with their performances at the district meet last Friday in Robert Lee.

Going to the regional meet will be Larry Corley, who took first

in number sense and second in science; David Glenn, first place winner in boys extemporaneous speaking; Gary Stroebel, second place winner in ready writing; Wayne Carlton, who tied with Royce Lee for second place in number sense (Lee will not participate because of a conflict between number sense and a track event in which he is entered); Patricia Robinson,

who won second place in shorthand; Ronald Hooper, third place winner in typewriting; Lillian Strickland, who was fourth in typewriting and will serve as alternate from this district; Eddy Clark, who was third in slide rule and will be an alternate.

Bronte High School's 96 points took second place in the meet, only 17 points behind first place Robert Lee with 112 points. Sterling City had 67, Miles 61, and Mertzon 42.

Mayor Says Dump Ground Is Abused

Mayor Royce Lee said this week that many residents of Bronte are abusing the privilege of using the city dump ground located southwest of town. The mayor issued a statement which explains the situation and suggests making some changes in the way the dump ground is handled. The statement follows:

"Too many people are abusing the city dump area by numerous violations which do not necessarily carry a penalty at present, but a penalty will have to be invoked and necessary ordinances passed to provide for a penalty for violations, if said violations are not stopped.

"Some of the violations, but not all, are listed below:

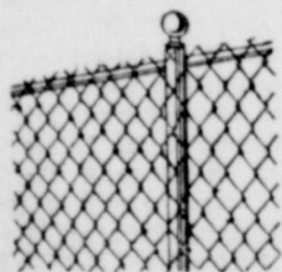
1. Dumping unburned garbage in the form of papers and rags.
2. Unloading too near fence boundaries.
3. Unloading in the road right-of-way which is a private entrance into a land owners property.
4. Unloading too near the road right-of-way.
5. And other violations that any reasonable person should know is wrong.

"I would like to add that this city dump ground is an obligation of all of the people and we should treat it and the adjoining property as we would want others to treat ours.

"We feel sure that we can improve this situation with complete cooperation from everyone who uses this city dump ground. This will enable us to continue a harmonious operation instead of chaos."
