Each consumer may get not more than 5 pounds sugar for making jams, tollies, preserves and fruit butters, however aggregate allowance for both canning and making jams, jellies, preserves or fruit butters not to exceed 25 pounds per consumer for period March 1, 1943, to February 29, 1944. Applicants are to present War Ration Books 1 of all consumers for whom he applies. The board will make note of amount granted to

We are advised by Washington that the total available supply of Home Canning sugar is not sufficient to take care of a 25 pound average issuance, 80 million allocations of canning sugar were made in this country last year, and it is anticipated that even more will be made this year. The National office advises that the average allotment of canning sugarper person per annum must not exceed 10 pounds if the avail-(Continued on page 3)





THE GRAND JURY OF CASTRO COUNT, TEXAS, recently in session has recommended and requested that notice in substantially the following form be published in the paper, towit:

"It was found that quite a few pople unthoughtedly threw junk consisting of glass, scrap iron, tin cans and dead animals along the country roads in the County. Usually such junk is placed in a bar ditch, where the county road maintainers have to run, and by virtue of the nature of road construction and working this junk is dragged in part to the roadbed proper. In this regard the junk is a hazard to the tires of road machinery and to the tires of the public, both of which are hard to get; and

as to dead animals they are largely chickens and hogs, some of the latter of which would likelybe cholera hogs, and the neighborhood dogs could easily pollute three or four farms from one such carcass.

It is requested that all persons refrain from dumping either carcassess or junk on the county roads or hiways in the interest of all.

Your attention is further called to the fact that such dumping. of junk and dead animals on the road is an offense which is in violation of the law and carries a heavy fine on conviction.
