### Baccalaureate Sunday

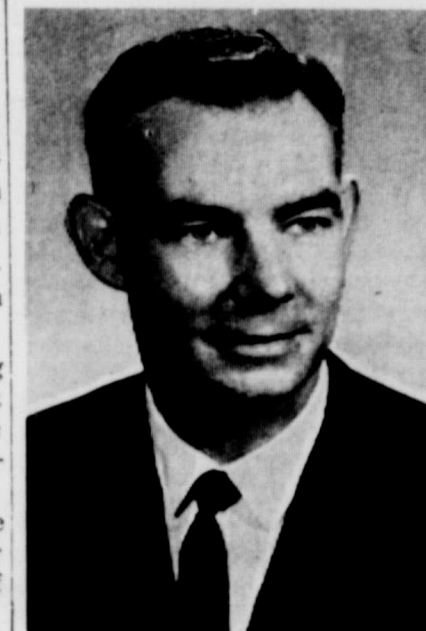

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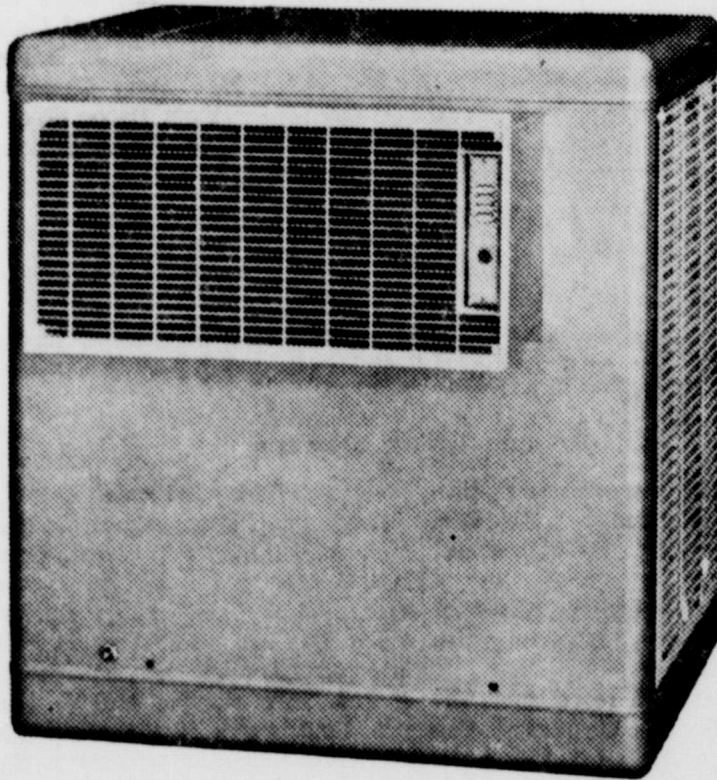
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# '66 Class History Given

In the fall of 1954 a great tragedy befell the small school of Bronte. The Senior Class of 1954 started to school. The class of 34, under the expert guidance of Mrs. "Nell" Flores finally blossomed into brilliant (?) obedient (?) children.

Later on, however, in the second grade, school work was beginning to take 2nd place to extra-curricular activities. That was the year of Mrs. Vera Thomases rhythm band, featuring Royce Lee singing "The Yellow Rose of Texas" accompanied by himself and his guitar.

The 3rd grade brought a new year, a new teacher, Mrs. Phillips and a new problem. Some of the students had to be encouraged to remain seated. Thus, they were tied to their chairs with the jump rope. Poor Mrs. Phillips found herself suddenly faced with the class again the next year. The Halloween Carnival that year caused great excitement. Everyone wanted to sell chances on a car from Caperton Chevrolet, and no one really understood why this didn't meet with the approval of the administration. However, the class managed to raise some money for Pat Robinson and David Davis who were crowned King and Queen. There was never any problem of association between the boys and the girls that year, however, because toward the end of the year the girls began staying in at recess to sit on Darwin Casswell's lap. The class was too much for Mrs. Phillips. She resigned that year and handed us over to Mrs. J. T. Henry.

Mrs. Henry managed the "all-season" baseball team through spring rain and winter snow. She

even refereed a few fights over "Yankee Stadium" which was the class's so called "private" baseball field.

The 7th grade year brought even greater change. Not one, but several new teachers, different classes and a different attitude. The bats and balls were put away for the more honorable sports of football and basketball. The cultural influence was present as the grass houses were abandoned for square dancing under the expert guidance of Mr. E. L. Hopson. Later on, dancing was forsaken for "ice-skating" on the creek. However, there was a few casual downfalls as the less experienced skaters fell through the ice and had to dry their shoes under the heater before they went home to mother.

The eighth grade was a year of conflict as bitter battles were fought. There were snow fights, pomegranate fights, lemon fights, plus the usual amount of erasers and chalk. However, under the guidance of Mr. James L. Golson, those who had remained throughout the years and those who had joined the class managed (barely) to wander into the "hallowed halls of higher learning." We were freshmen at last.

The 1962 freshman class consisted of Mary Brock, Janet Caperton, Elaine Collins, Larry Corley, Wayne Hester, Donnah Holcombe, Ronald Hooper, Linda Jones, Royce Lee, Sharon Mackey, Alvaro Martinez, Jan Mayben, Joy Kay Moore, Laura Morrow, Tony Olivas, Wayne Owings, Libby Perry, Suzanne Pruitt, Lee Revell, Manuel Reyes, Tad Richards and Pat Robinson.

The high school years passed quickly in a haze of memories, of bon fires, pep rallies, football games, basketball tournaments, concession stands, classes and other activities.

None of us will ever forget the many things that happened. The hayrides, the freshman beanies and the many parades. No one in the band will ever forget the day Tad Richards fell in San Angelo during a parade. (The band was marching behind horses!) However, duty came first so he lay in the street — flat on his back — beating the bass drum, while an ambulance screeched past.

The next year we became sophomores. We were past the freshman problems, the freshman ridicule, but some of the freshman mistakes remained with us. That was the year of Donnah and the cake.

As Mrs. Fancher will tell you — none of us were very good cooks. One day Donnah made a cake and forgot the sugar. We teased her so much, she made the cake again at home, brought it to school and made us eat it.

Our junior year has one big bright spot. Eddie Clark joined us and added his good humor, quick

wit and fun loving spirit.

Finally it was our senior year. Yes, now it's our turn for Baccalaureate, commencement, caps and gowns, invitations, senior rings, senior trips and diplomas. The year will always shine with memories as the 1966 senior class of B.H.S., under sponsorship of Clint A. Low, leave and make their way in the world.

## County Agents News Column

Several people have asked if I have found any eggs on the pecan nutlets yet. I checked four locations in Robert Lee Tuesday morning and found no pecan nut casebearer eggs. But, I did find numerous tunneled-out twigs. The egg laying period should begin shortly.

Normally, the casebearer adult or moth emerges, matures two to four days, then begins to deposit eggs on the tips and sides of the young nuts. The egg incubates four to five days, hatches and the "damage do'er" emerges. The larvae feed one to three days on the bud or buds below the cluster, then enter a pecan.

In attempting to set up a control plan, several things should be given consideration. First, the spray application must be timed to coincide with the peak hatch period. This in turn means checking daily or at least every other day for casebearer eggs during the next two weeks. This is the only way to be sure when the peak egg hatch will occur in a given location. Hatching variances can be found between locations very near to each other.

A second consideration is to be sure the entire tree is covered when spraying. You must use a sprayer that will provide enough pressure to part the leaves and allow the insecticide to reach the nut cluster. This is the area where the casebearer will be feeding. On large trees usually three to four hundred pounds pressure is needed to part the leaves and reach the nuts with the spray.

Also, using the correct formulation is necessary to obtain good casebearer control. The strength solution to use will vary with the chemical to be used. The following mixtures are recommended by the Extension Service: 1.5% DDT; .75% Malathion; 2% toxaphene; 1 pint of 40% nicotine sulfate per 100 gallons of water; 5% Thiodan; or 1.6% sevin. I would add a 2% strength solution of zinc sulfate to the spray to help control rosette.

It would be impossible to say when the best time to spray will be based on our findings to date. If the normal pattern is followed, though, the period from May 24 to May 28 looks like the ideal time. We should be able to give a more definite answer next week.

Some people may prefer to make two control applications. If you prefer to spray twice, we estimate May 23 and May 28 to be the ideal times to spray.

Again, we emphasize that identifying the eggs, watching the egg laying pattern and then using the proper equipment and correct formulation are necessary if the results are to be satisfactory. Begin now checking your pecan nut clusters for tiny small eggs on the dried blossoms or on the sides of the nuts.

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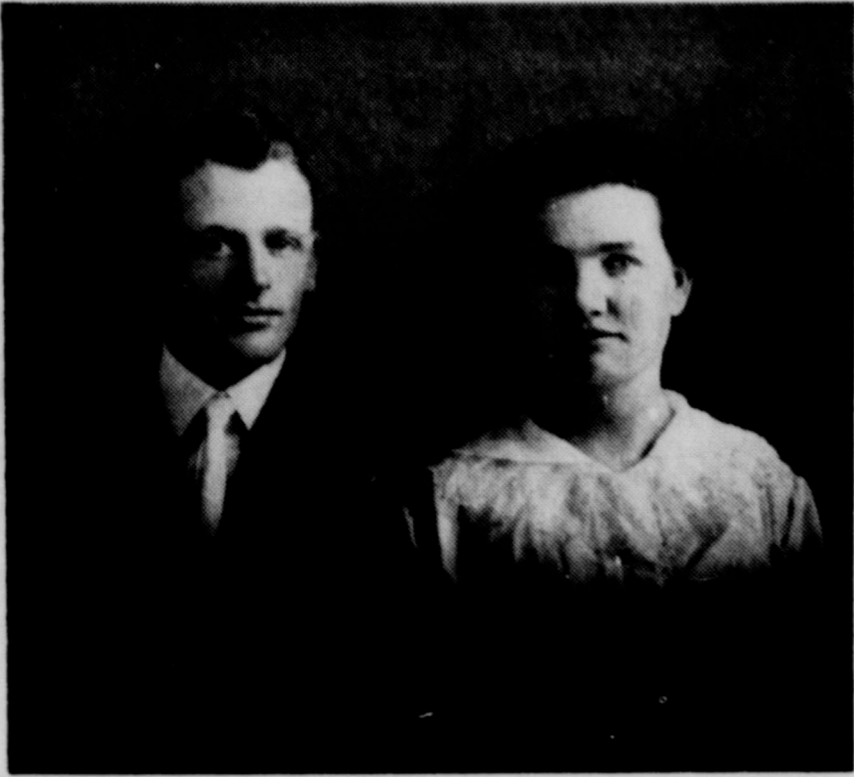

### Pre-Schooler Summer Classes Okayed

Notice is hereby given to all users of the Bronte City Dump Ground that there will be no more dumping of any burnable material left unburned at the City Dump Ground and that all garbage and/or residue will be disposed of at designated pits or places within the City Dump Ground. There will be no more leaving of dead animals such as sheep, cattle, hogs, horses, mules at said City Dump. As for dogs and/or cats and other small animals they shall be buried if left at the City Dump.

It is considered by the City Council that all paper, wood, rug carpeting, tires and any other thing of this nature is burnable material and therefore, should not be disposed of until it is burned before or after taking to the City Dump Ground.

This resolution and proposed Ordinance which will go into effect immediately after the next regular meeting night, June 2, 1966 is not intended to keep anyone from using the City Dump Ground, but only to use it with more respect to the City, yourselves and the land owners surrounding the City Dump.

Because there has been considerable misuse of the City Dump Ground, it becomes necessary to set up rules and regulations governing same. Therefore, as of June 2, 1966, there will be a penalty for violation of any rules which will be posted at the entrance to the City Dump Ground. This penalty shall be a minimum of \$5.00 per violation and a maximum of \$100.00 per violation.
