4-H Soil Judges Best In Texas

The Coke County 4-H Club soil judging team won first place in the State Contest held June 8 in College Station. Jerry Parker, Darrel Pitcock, Leroy Casey and Steve Rives represented Coke County in the big contest.

Amassing a total of 1588 points, the Coke County team bested sec-

ond place Wharton County by 51 points. Third place Bexar County County scored a total of 1503 points.

The four Coke County team members were awarded team medals and wrist watches. The watches, compliments of the Dallas Hardware and Implement Club, are awarded each year to the top 12 individuals in the contest who have not received a watch previously.

Jerry Parker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Truman Parker of Bronte, was second high individual in the contest, while Darrel Pitcock, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Pitcock of Sanco, stood fourth in the individual rankings. Leroy Casey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Casey of Robert Lee, and Steve Rives, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Rives of Robert Lee, were eighth and 14th high, respectively.

Special Bus Going To Astrodome

Sunset Bus Line of Abilene is announcing in an ad in this week's newspaper a special one-day bus tour to the Astrodome in Houston. The trip is scheduled for Sunday, July 3, when the Houston Astros will play the Cincinnati Reds in the huge indoor stadium.

The bus will leave from Bronte at 5 a.m. and will arrive at the Astrodome at 12:15 p.m., in time for lunch before the ball game starts at 1:30 p.m. The bus will depart from Houston immediately following the ball game and will arrive back in Bronte at approximately 10:30 p.m.

Cost of the trip, including a reserve seat ticket at the ball game, is \$13.50 per person.

Reservations must be made not later than Saturday, June 25. A minimum of 25 persons is required in order for the bus company to make the trip. Reservation and payment of fare and ticket may be made at the Observer office in Robert Lee or the Enterprise office in Bronte, or the \$13.50 may be mailed to Sunset Bus Lines, 324 Sycamore, Abilene, Texas.

C. H. Martin, representative of the bus line, who is promoting the excursion, said the trip will be made in a 29 passenger air conditioned Starliner bus.

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NOTEBOOK-PATTERNS FOR PROGRESS

INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS

... a must in Economic Development

Obtaining leads on industries that might locate in a community is one of the hardest parts of any sound economic development program. The lack of an industrial prospecting program that produces several leads may cause serious mistakes by a community in financing or other endeavors to attract unsound or unattractive industry. A community needs a well balanced program, combining all the techniques and utilizing all of the sources that will give it increased effectiveness and chances for real success. **LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS** — usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

- **BUSINESSMEN** — should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.
- **CITIZENS** — who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.
- **EXISTING INDUSTRY** — may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.
- **LOCAL IDEAS** — can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.
- **EX-CITIZENS** — should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY — should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip — watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand.

COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES — such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

ANY and ALL industrial leads should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce.
