

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the pur-poses of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years. "(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in

the provisions do not provide for a term of office which ex-

ceeds six years."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on

them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years.
"AGAINST the Constitu-
