The race for United States Senator is the big race in Texas. Dem-Buried At Bronte ocratic nominees in other races to be veted on by Coke Countians have only token opposition.

In the senate race, Democratic nominee Waggoner Carr, now attorney general of Texas, is seeking the spot now held by Republican John Tower. Both have made intensive campaigns for the office. Republicans in many quarters have listed the Texas Senate race as the most important in the entire country to their cause.

Another race which will be voted on by Coke County voters is for state representative of the 66th Iegislative district. Incumbent Gene Hendryx of Alpine, the Democratic nominee, is opposed by Republican Marvin Russell. Experts on politics think that Hendryx will have little trouble in retaining his seat in the Texas house. Democrats cited Hendryx's long record of service to his district and his outstanding

has doubled the past four years. BETTER HIGHWAY TRANSPORTATION - Texas has more farm-to-market roads than any other state - more than 35,134 miles. We lead the nation in construction of interstate highways, at a cost 40% below the nation's average.



NEW CULTURAL GROWTH - The Fine Arts Commission was established in 1965 to nurture the cultural enrichment of Texans. The state's cultural heritage will be preserved and portrayed in the state's pavilion at HemisFair '68 in San Antonio.
