In Crucial Contest

Longhorns To Meet Steers

The Bronte Longhorns will lay their unblemished district record on the line Friday night when they invade Steer territory 12 miles west of here.

If the Longhorns can take a victory from Robert Lee, they will have completed a perfect record in 4-B play and will be undisputed champions. However, should they lose to the Steers, the champion-

ship would be in a three-way tie. In such a case, the representative of the district in bi-district play would likely be decided by the flip of a coin.

A Longhorn loss would give a share of the championship to the local lads, to Robert Lee and to Trent. To date, Trent has lost only to Bronte and Robert Lee has lost only to Trent.

Coaches, players and fans have no illusions that the Steers will be an easy opponent. Since they lost to Trent in the district play opener, they have not been scored on. Their losses have been to Trent and Bangs and they have a tie with Eldorado.

On the other hand, Bronte has lost no games, except the season opener with Bangs. The Dragons are still rated the No. 1 Class B team in the state, with Bronte in the No. 2 spot.

It is expected that most of Bronte will move to Robert Lee Friday night, since the annual contest between the two Coke County schools is always a thriller, even when no championship is at stake.

Kickoff time is 7:30.

Dedication Set For Butterfield Marker

Everyone in Coke County and the surrounding area is invited to a program Sunday afternoon to dedicate a historical marker commemorating the Butterfield Trail. The

marker is located at the Y nine miles north of Bronte and the program will be held on the site. Time set to begin the program is 2:30 p.m.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, president emeritus and history professor at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, will deliver the main address. Dr. Richardson is one of the foremost authorities on the history of West Texas and particularly on the Butterfield Trail.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, president of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, worked up the following program for the dedication:

Judge W. W. Thetford will serve as master of ceremonies; the invocation will be given by the Rev. Bill McKinley, pastor of First Methodist Church in Robert Lee; presentation of the colors; pledge of allegiance, led by Brian Richards, a great grandson of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Wylie, who own and live on the land occupied by old Fort Chadbourne, an important station on the Butterfield Trail; introduction of speaker by Mrs. Yarbrough; Dr. Richardson's address; and the benediction.

Mrs. Yarbrough said that she has sent out a number of special invitations to persons to attend the program. One of them went to Mrs. Mary Moody Northen of Galveston, who is connected with the Moody Foundation, donor of the marker. Invitations also have been sent to Historical Survey Committees of nearby counties.

Community-Wide Service Planned

A community-wide Thanksgiving service is planned for next Wednesday night at 7 o'clock in First Baptist Church in Bronte. Participating will be ministers from First Baptist, Central Baptist and First Methodist Churches.

The Rev. Harry Morris, the host pastor, will be in charge of the service and read the scripture lesson. The Rev. Wayne Stout of Central Baptist Church will give the invocation and benediction, and the Rev. Austin Masterson, of First Methodist Church will deliver the sermon.

The junior choir of First Baptist Church, a quartet from Central Baptist Church, and a piano-organ duet from First Methodist Church will provide special numbers for the service.

Everyone in the area has a cordial invitation to attend, said Mr. Morris. "I think it is particularly appropriate for us to assemble to give thanks for our many blessings on the night before Thanksgiving day," he said, "and I hope a large crowd of residents of this community will take part in this service."

A free-will offering will be taken, and will go to the beautification fund of Fairview Cemetery Association.

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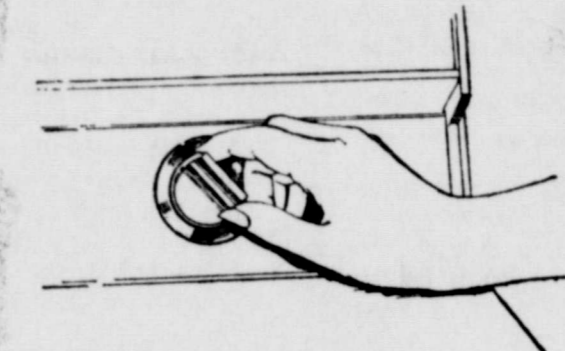
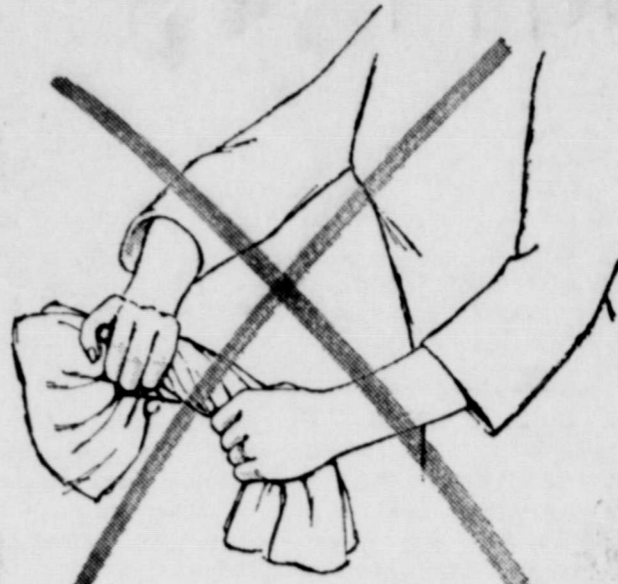

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Longhorns Drop Forsan; Keep Lead In District 4-B

The Bronte Longhorns wound up their next to last game of the regular season last Friday night with a big show of offensive strength, but their defenses were down a little as they allowed the Forsan Buffaloes too many pass completions which permitted them to cross the goal line more times than necessary. Final score was 52-28. The win gave the Longhorns a cinch on a tie for the district championship.

The Buffs gave the Longhorns a bad time with their passing attack and a few unconventional formations. However, if all's well that ends well, the contest was a howling success for the local lads.

First Quarter

A short kick was stopped on the Bronte 48 yard line to start the ball game. Charlie Masterson went for 4, then David Glenn had trouble making connection with Doug McCutchen on the pitchout and the ball was recovered but with a loss of 6 or 7. Third down was a real gainer as Glenn passed to McCutchen for 35 yards and a 1st on the 20. McCutchen went for 9, Glenn kept for 5 more and the 1st on the 6. On the sixth play of the game McCutchen went over for the score. He then went around right end for PAT to make the score 8-0.

Victor Brock downed Larry Callihan on the 29 after he took McCutchen's kickoff. With Clayton McKinnon quarterbacking, the Buffs had Jack Ellis and Johnny Dolan carry for a 1st on the 43, but a penalty was called on the next play to make it 1st and 15. Callihan made a 9 yard gain, but the host team could not make the needed yardage and had to punt. It went to Masterson and he was nailed immediately on the 10. Masterson made 12 yards in two carries for a 1st on the 22, then added more. Bronte drew a 5 yard penalty and things bogged down. Corley punted and Forsan got off two play

before a fumble gave the ball back to the Longhorns.

McCutchen and Masterson carried and Corley took a short pass for short gains; then McCutchen got loose for a 20 yarder which put the ball on the 22 yard line. Brock carried for 3 to end the quarter.

Second Quarter

Bronte drew a 15 yard setback for clipping, Glenn passed to McCutchen for a 1st on the 11, and Masterson went over the left side for the yards needed for the TD. A Glenn to McCutchen pass was good for 2 and the score stood 16-0.

Dolan took McCutchen's kick and made a nice runback to the 33. Ellis lost a yard, and McKinnon tossed a second down pass which was intercepted by Gary Don Allen on the 31. Glenn threw a 19 yard pass to Corley for a Bronte 1st down on the 12. Masterson almost went for a TD on the first try, but was stopped on the 1. He went over on 2nd down, and Glenn added 2 EPs to make the scoreboard read 24-0.

Once again McCutchen's kick went to Dolan who was stopped dead on the 14 by Wayne Carlton. Callihan picked up good yardage and with the help of a penalty Forsan had the ball on the Bronte 47. McKinnon took to the air, threw 2 incomplete passes, then connected for a 21 yard gainer and a 1st on the 26. A pass to Dolan was good for another 1st on the 12. Keith Morris slapped down a pass right after McKinnon threw it, and the Buffs were unable to take advantage of their position. Bronte took over on the 10 yard line.

It was a short series for the Longhorns as they fumbled the ball on 2nd down and it was recovered by Gayland Reed on the 6. After a couple of running tries that failed to penetrate the Longhorn line,

McKinnon decided he'd better throw one and it was completed to Steve Park for a Buffalo touchdown. PAT try was no good. Score was 24-6.

McKinnon kicked for Forsan, with the ball going to Glenn. He made a beautiful runback and with the aid of Longhorn blockers, it looked as though he would go all the way; however, a Buffalo, in hot pursuit finally overtook him and pulled him in on the Forsan 8. Masterson went for 3, and McCutchen covered the remaining 5 for another Bronte counter. Glenn went around right end for 2 points. Score was 32-6.

The Buffs set up their business on the 32 yard line after McCutchen kicked off. A long pass to Dolan was good for 51 yards and placed the ball on the Bronte 27. Ellis carried twice for 11 yards and a 1st on the 16. A pass to Dolan was good for another Buff counter and Park took an aerial for 2 extras, to make the score 32-14.

The first half ended after the kickoff.

Third Quarter

McCutchen kicked off and Dolan brought it to the 33. Glenn intercepted a pass on the 42 on the first play of the series. Masterson made a couple of yards, then McCutchen got loose for one of his crowd-pleasing long runs, and evaded four or five would-be tacklers to go all the way to the end zone. Try for points failed, leaving the score 33-14.

Dolan was nailed by Corley on the 20 after the kickoff. The Buffs were starting a drive by going to the air most of the time. They passed enough to keep the Longhorn defense loosened up, which made it difficult to defend their occasional ground plays. Good pass defensive work was turn in by Brian Richards and Randy Barbee, but

Forsan made a couple of 1st downs anyway. The third series of the drive looked like an impossible situation, as they faced a 4th and 30. They came out of it by tossing a touchdown pass to Dolan. Try for points was no good and the score was 38-20.

McKinnon's kick went to McCutchen about the 20 yard line, and he was off. Fans came to their feet as he managed to get by the Buffalo defenders and go all the way for another Longhorn touchdown. Glenn carried the ball for a pair to extras. Score: 46-20.

Callihan brought McCutchen's kick out to the 32. Pass interference was called against the Longhorns to give the Buffs the ball on the Bronte 45. They failed to make the needed 10, however, and punted across the goal line to give Bronte the ball on the 20.

Masterson made two and McCutchen went for 19 and a 1st. A pass to Barbee moved the ball to the 49, and a penalty against Forsan moved it to their 36. Park intercepted a Bronte pass and ran it to the 45, but a clipping penalty placed the ball on the 15. Dolan made a sensational touchdown run on the next play, but it was called back and the Buffs were again penalized. McCutchen intercepted a Forsan pass on the 33. He then took a short pass from Glenn and ran across the goal line for the last Bronte counter of the evening. Try for points failed. Score: 52-20.

Fourth Quarter

McCutchen kicked to McKinnon who was stopped on the 27 by Corley. Ellis moved the ball to the 42 for a 1st. Dolan took a pass and dashed to the Bronte 25 for another 1st. Park made it to the 4. Ellis went to the 1, and then carried over for the final TD. Callihan added a pair, to make the score 52-28.

The remainder of the ball game was scoreless. Tommy Kirkpatrick recovered a Bronte fumble on his 41 after McCutchen and Barbee had moved the ball up field to the 43 following the kickoff.

Forsan initiated another good drive, but it was stopped at the 8

yard line of Bronte. Masterson and McCutchen alternated carrying the ball, with Keith McCutchen quarterbacking, and made a couple of 1st downs as they moved to the Forsan 46 before the final whistle sounded.

Choose the Best Time to Shop

Using the consumer market place to advantage includes choosing the best time to shop for goods of different kinds.

Decisions about best times to buy may vary with the types of goods to be purchased, whether or not there is always a dependable supply in the stores, and when the stocks are likely to be freshest in offering good choices to the consumer. Choosing a good time to shop or buy may mean deciding whether to purchase in advance of need or at the time of need.

Buying in advance may be a good idea if the item can be found, if storage is not a problem, if money for the purchase is available, and if there is no risk of loss of quality or style before the goods are to be used. On the other end of the scale, waiting until the last minute to make a needed purchase may mean the buyer has little choice and must take what is offered at a relatively higher price. As a result, excessive time may be spent in shopping for and making the needed purchase.

Quite often, seasonal sales help set the time in seeking replacements for goods. For example, white sales in August and January generally offer quality goods at dependable prices. End-of-season sales may offer real bargains in clothing and some types of household equipment, furniture, and furnishings.

Bargains may be found at sales, but it often takes an experienced buyer to find them — by shopping in familiar, reputable stores in which the regular prices are known and can be compared with sales prices. For some, wise decisions can be made in the midst of a hectic "bargain" sale. Other buyers prefer times when the stores are not busy, allowing them to examine the merchandise, compare prices and qualities, and seek individual attention from store clerks.

Experience with buying will help consumers decide upon times that are best for them.

Thanksgiving Dinner to Cost More

This year's great American Thanksgiving feast will on the average cost only a little more than it did in 1965, and it actually will cost less than it did in 1965.

Despite sharply-rising meat prices from coast to coast over the past 12 months, the price of your Thanksgiving turkey will be almost the same it was last year and only about half what the same turkey cost in 1960 — when, incidentally, most turkeys were not oven ready, but were available in the "dressed-feathers removed only" type.

Here is a breakdown of 1966's Thanksgiving cost for a family of four, including two pre-teen children, based on October prices in Washington, D. C. supermarkets, anticipated price changes between now and Thanksgiving, and a menu drawn up by USDA economists:

Dressing (2 pkgs.)	.62
Sweet Potatoes (1½ lbs)	.15
Peas, frozen (1 lb.)	.15

Olives, stuffed (5 oz.)	.49

Lettuce (1 head)	.33
Tomatoes, fresh (1 lb.)	.29
Salad Dressing (4 oz.)	.19
Pumpkin pie, frozen (2-3)	.26
Coffee, (6 tsp.)	.06
Milk, (2 cups)	.12
Rolls (1 pkg.)	.25
Margarine (4 oz.)	.07
Total	\$5.43

The same meal would have cost \$5.03 in 1965, with the turkey costing \$1.95; and \$5.59 in 1965 with the turkey costing \$2.75.

All of the 35-cent increase for 1966 will be in the trimmings — although of course, many will have

far bigger and more elaborate Thanksgiving spreads and will pay extra dollars and cents for the usual array of extras.

But the price of Thanksgiving turkey has declined over the years and this has been the key force in holding the price line on the total dinner costs. The turkey price drop has been due to major breakthroughs in turkey-breeding and turkey raising techniques in the U.S. — thereby soaring turkey production. In 1966, a record 116 million turkeys will be raised — up 11 percent from 1965.

The average cost of a small turkey this Thanksgiving is expected to be about 39 cents per pound or the same average is last year. And

if you buy a giant gobbler to feed a dozen or two relatives and to provide extra days of soup and sandwiches afterward, big turkeys are expected to be widely available to you this year for as little as 29-33 cents a pound, as they were last year.

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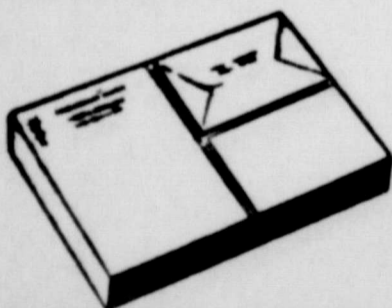
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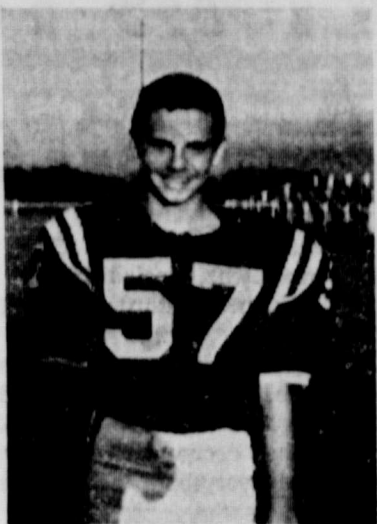

Consumer Interest Talked At Meeting

"Carpet is a big investment, one you expect a lot from in return.

Buying a cheap carpet may be one way to save money—it costs less to begin with. But how will a cheap carpet stand up under wear? Two years from now what will it look like? Will it save you money in the long run?" This information was part of a discussion, "What's Underfoot?" given by Bud Everett in the Consumer Program held Thursday in Robert Lee. Mr. Everett discussed color, texture, carpet weaves and fibers used in carpeting, and the care of carpets. He is with Home Furniture in Ballinger.

Others appearing on the program included Willard Piel and Mrs. Joyce Drake, with West Texas Utilities Company, Ballinger. They discussed features to look for when selecting ranges, washers and dryers. Mrs. Drake gave some rules for caring for the dura-press fabrics. She suggested a warm wash with a cool rinse for all garments made from the no-iron fabrics.

"Teflon needs special care; however it is worth the extra care given it, as it is so easy to clean," said Mrs. Eloise Guerrant. Mrs. Guerrant pointed out that the consumer should read the label on any utensil purchased, Teflon coated especially, since they do need a little extra care. Mrs. Guerrant is the homemaking teacher in Robert Lee School.

"Good bedding to suit the person in size and firmness is needed to give a person a good night's sleep and rest," pointed out Miss Jewel O'Neal of King-Holt Company, also of Ballinger. Miss O'Neal advised people to use sheets that are not overly tight over the mattress, as this causes the mattress frame to bend and break. She said persons should not buy orthopedic mattresses unless told to by a doctor. She emphasized the use of good springs as a foundation for the mattress. All mattresses should be turned regularly, she said.

Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Home Demonstration Agent, introduced the persons on the program.

Refreshments were served to about 30 persons.
