Voter Registration Deadline Nears; Taxes Due, Too
O. B. Jacobs, Coke County tax assessor-collector, said Wedneshave registered to vote in elections which will be held in 1967. Jacobs emphasized that everyone between the ages of 21 and 60 must have a registration certificate in order to vote in any election held this year.
Deadline for obtaining the certificates is Tuesday, Jan. 31. He pointed out that young people who will become 21 any time during this year must obtain certificates before the deadline

New Law Questioned Judge Herman Jones of Austin recently ruled that the constitutional amendment abolishing the poll tax in Texas is unconstitural Crawford Martin said he would appeal the decision to the Texas Supreme Court.
Meanwhile, in the period while the matter is pending, the voter registration law will continue in effect. Jacobs talked with officials in the attorney general's office and was instructed to carry out the original plans for voter registration during the remainder of this month.

PRANKSTERS WARNED ABOUT DAMAGING U. S. MAIL BOXES

Mailboxes are protected by Fede-ral law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment, postmasters in this area warned repress.
The postmasters noted that some
25,000 mail receptacles were dam-
aged or destroyed in the past year.
It was also noted that 2,641 persons
were arrested in the year up to
June 30 for damaging or destroying
mail receptacles.

taw: "Whoever wilfully or mali-
ciously injures, tears down or des-
troys any letter box or other recep-
tacle intended or used for the re-
ceipt or delivery of mail on any
mail route, or breaks open the
same or wilfully or maliciously

ment said. "A $\$ 1,000$ fine or a erm in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank.
Often the mailbox damage is the work of youths, who do it for "kicks." And the courts have shown little sympathy for this
youthful means of expression. In Michigan, a justice sentenced two l8-year olds to 10 days in jail, in-
cluding two on a diet of baby cluding two on a diet of baby
food. The diet specification, ex p'ained the judge, was because the youths "acted like babies." They costs.
In New York state, five youth were fined each plas restitution or restoration, plus no driving for an indefinite period, plus an 8 p.m curfew, plus a written analysis by each of a magazine article entitled "A Judge Gets Tough on Hood ums."
Two lewa youths who damaged 30 mailboxes were required to per sonally apologize to each boxholder
in addition to making repairs or providing a new box
In Missouri, three 17 -year olds ost their driving privieges, were given a $9 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. curfew, and had to report twice weekly to juvenile aumailboxes.
And in Arkansas, four juveniles aced the following: (1) no driving until further notice, (2) a 10 p.m curfew, (3) return to court in moath with letters from their school attitudes, (4) full restoration of all damages, and (5) wear a sign for 30 days stating "I have not learned to respect the property of others."
Anyone tempted is reminded that
his is a federal offense.
