jail facilities for Coke County, Texas."

Members of the Commissioners' Court have already discussed the matter to some extent in their regular meetings.

Those who are backing the proposal to consider a new jail for the county point out that the present structure is badly in need of replacement, as it is unsatisfactory, both as a place for keeping prisoners, as well as for a residence for the sheriff.

It was also mentioned that the county's finances can well afford the cost of a new jail, since bonds used to finance the courthouse will be paid off in 1966 and county park bonds in 1971. After the latter date, the only outstanding bonds of the county will be road bonds which were voted by the precincts.

There has also been some talk about turning the old jail over to Coke County Historical Survey Committee, if a new jail is built.


Students wishing to buy an annual should contact a member of the annual staff or stop by the yearbook office during the seventh period.

Lockett Owned Horse Wins Race At Sunland Park

There were 12 horses in the race including one from California, one from Omaha, Nebr., two from Oklahoma City, and one from New Mexico. The rest were from Texas.

Lockett added, "Folks out there at Sunland said Dine Early is plenty fast. He just needs more conditioning so he can run greater distances without slowing down."

A three-year-old, Dine Early is out of Little Twin, a mare owned by Lockett. His sire is Dining Alone, a stallion owned by Robert Hickman, also of Bronte.

Lockett said his horse won a race with an \$1100 purse, "but I had to split it with the second

and third place winners." Odds on Dine Early were 10-1, so somebody was surprised when the Bronte man's horse came in first among the 12 horses entered in the race.

Lockett talked Monday as if he might try to make a few more races at Sunland during the current season.

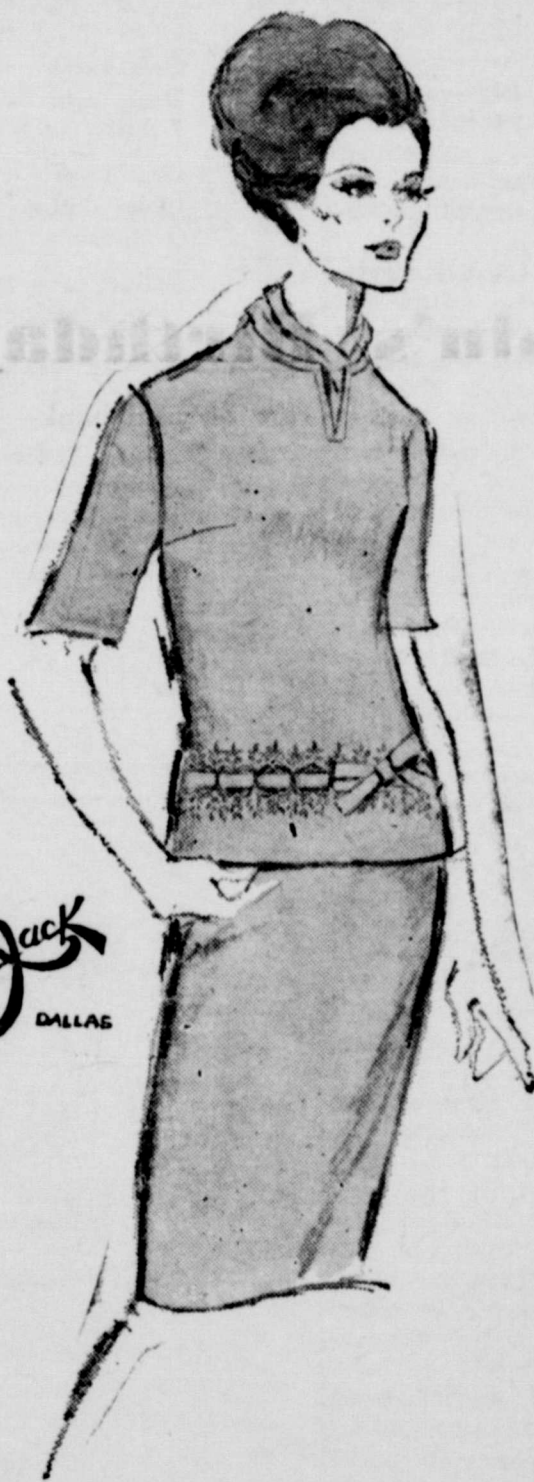

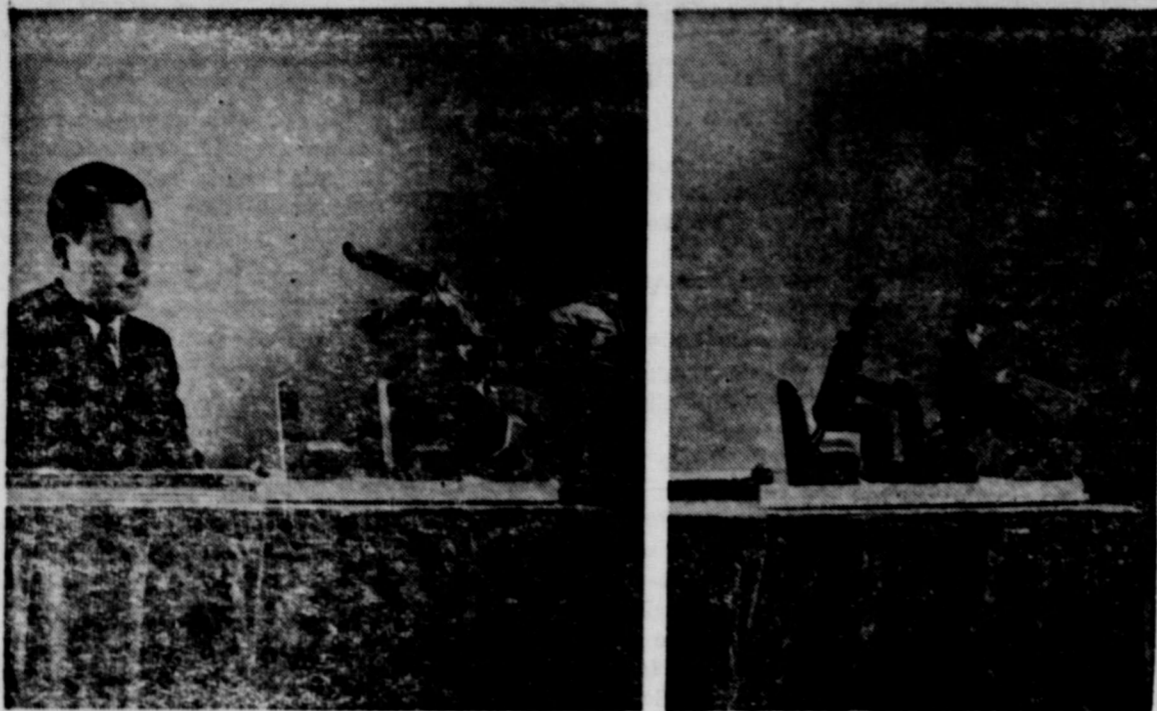

Betty Crocker Award Goes To Frances Glenn

Frances Glenn ranked first in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude test given to senior girls Dec. 6 and becomes Bronte high school 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow, it has been announced. Registered for the test were 581,334 girls in 14,753 of the nation's high schools, a new record for the 13 years the program has been offered by General Mills, its sponsor.

Frances will be awarded a specially designed silver charm, and she remains in contention for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

In the program's next step, a state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be selected from winners in all schools of the state. She will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be given a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The state runner-up's award will be a \$500 scholarship.

Following her selection, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join winners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington D. C. Climax of the trip will be the naming of the 1967 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Chosen from the state winners on the basis of her original test score, plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second-, third-, and fourth-ranking girls in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

All judging is conducted by Science Research Associates, Chicago. This educational testing and publishing firm also constructs and grades the written test.

Started during the 1954-55 school year, the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. More than 5 million girls have participated in the program since it began and, with 1967 awards added, scholarship grants have exceeded \$1.3 million.

O. H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, said that the district is continuing negotiations with the remaining land owners, who number less than a dozen, and that he is hopeful that agreements can be reached in all these.
