## School Open House Planned



The New Bronte High School

Everyone is invited to attend a dedication program and open house at Bronte School Tuesday at 8 p.m. The program will signal the official opening of the new high school building.

Dr. W. O. Beasley of Hardin-Simmons University will be the speaker of the evening. In addition to his talk, there will be some remarks by Conda O. Richards, president of the school board. Richards will give some facts and figures about the new building and school finances which should be of interest to everyone in the district.

Gary Stroebel, president of the Student Council, will give the invocation to start the program, and Boy Scouts will present the colors. Bob Wells will play a bass solo, and Janet Lee and Bennie Carol Oglesby will sing two numbers.

Immediately following the program, the entire school plant will be open for public inspection. Supt. C. B. Barbee said that all teachers will be stationed at their regular places of work to answer any questions which visitors might wish to ask.

### Lions, Masons To Eat

Immediately before the program, members of the Bronte Masonic Lodge and the two Lions clubs will hold their annual banquet in observance of Public Schools Week. The banquet will be held in the lunchroom. Only members of the organizations and their specially invited guests are eligible to attend this affair.

Supt. Barbee said that he wanted everyone in the school district to attend the program and open house. "This is your school," he said, "it was built with your tax money, and we would like for you to see it."

The new building contains a new regulation size gymnasium, offices and science department on ground level, and a classroom wing, plus study hall and library below ground. The underground portion of the building is completely air conditioned. Another new structure included in the project is the new vocational agriculture building. It contains a classroom, workshop, rest room and storage space.

Also included in the contract was a complete remodeling of the old gymnasium building which also houses the homemaking department and band hall.

### Contract Let Oct. 1965

Bids on the new building were opened Oct. 28, 1965, with the main construction contract going to the late Edwin O. Wanoreck of San Angelo on a bid of \$200,990. Plumbing, heating and air conditioning contract went to Fitzgerald and Skidmore of Midland on a bid of \$73,269. Westbrook Electric Co. of San Angelo was the low bidder on electrical work with a bid of \$17,495.

Work was begun a few weeks after the contract was let, and the first job was to demolish the old two story building which was built in 1922. Next part of the project was excavating enough dirt to make room for the underground classroom unit. After this was completed, sidewalk engineers could really see progress being made as the building started going "up". Work has continued until only a few weeks ago when the building was occupied. Only this week, books are being moved into the new library and it will soon be ready for use.

## Rattlesnake Roundup Set For March 11-12

Not quite two weeks remain before the annual Jaycee Rattlesnake Roundup. The Bronte Roundup is the second oldest and usually one

of the largest in West Texas.

A total of \$335 in prize money will be offered the snake hunters this year. The biggest prize \$175 will be given to the hunter who brings in the most pounds of snakes on Saturday with a \$50 second and \$15 third place money. For the most pounds delivered Sunday the prize will be \$50 for first place and \$25 for second place. An additional \$10 will be awarded for the snake with the most rattles and \$10 for the longest snake brought in during the weekend.

## Pancake Supper, Talent Show Set By 4-Hers, Lions

Coke County 4-H clubs and the Silver-Robert Lee Lions Club are jointly sponsoring a pancake supper and talent show Friday night, March 3, in the Robert Lee school lunchroom. Serving will begin at 5 p.m.

The talent show will be in the school auditorium. Local and area talent, including a comedy act, rock and roll bands, vocal numbers and other entertainment is scheduled on the show.

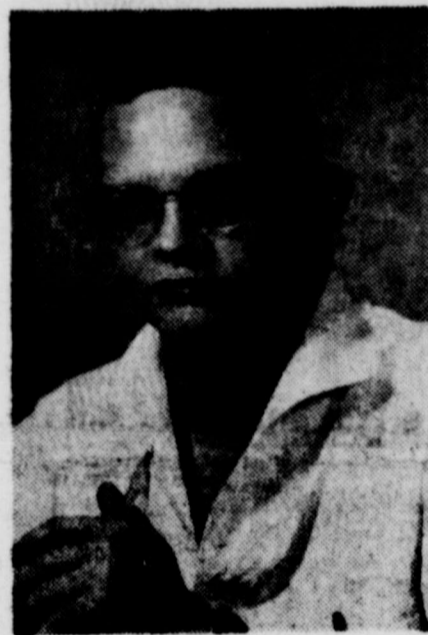
Admission is 75 cents per person for the supper of buttered pancakes, syrup and bacon and the entertainment is free.

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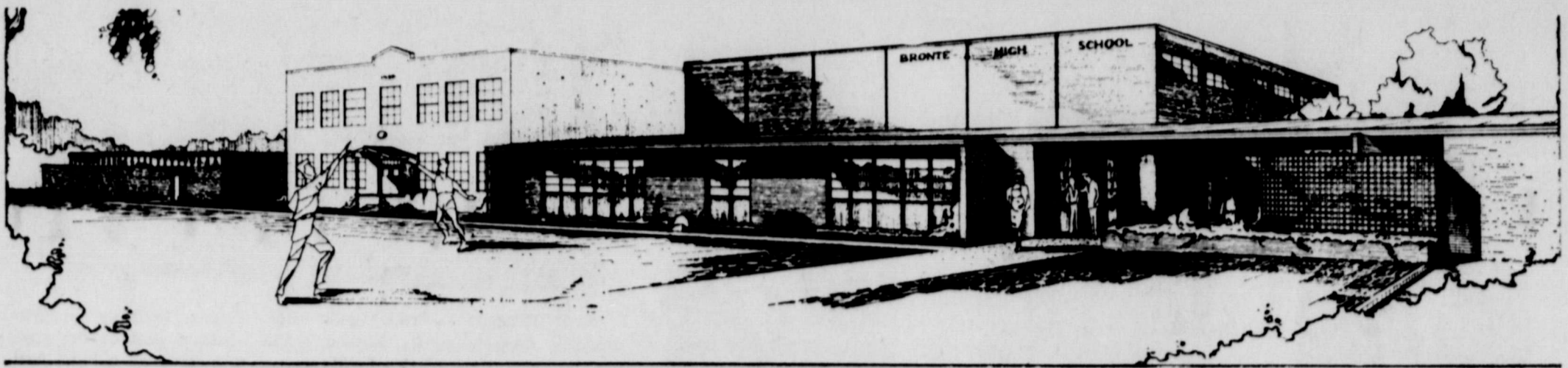

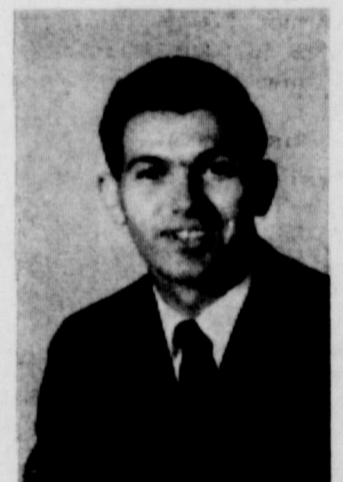

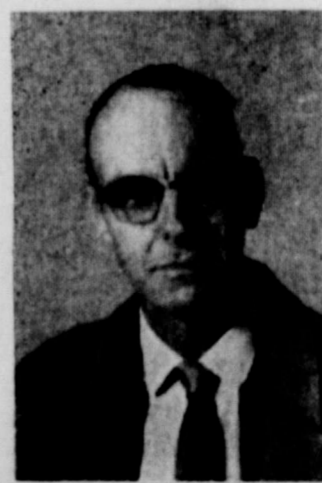

According to information released Wednesday by the office of County Judge W. W. Thetford, candidates for school trustee have through today (Thursday) to file for places on the school board.

A check with the judge's office Wednesday morning showed five candidates running for two vacancies on the school board.

Listed as having filed for trustee for Bronte School were C. M. Howard, David W. Crockett, Conda O. Richards, Harold Moon and Norman R. Kiker.

Richards is the only one of the candidates who is presently serving on the board. The other incumbent is J. B. Morrow, who stated he would not run for reelection.

Also to be elected when citizens of the Bronte district vote April 1 will be a county trustee at large. D. K. Glenn has filed for reelection to this post. Noah Pruitt Sr. has filed for reelection as county trustee for precinct 2, and C. E. Arrott has filed for reelection in Precinct 4.

The Society also provides for research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions, finances public education programs, and provides scholarships for training of professional personnel to staff rehabilitation centers.

Allen pointed out that all these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

The Easter Seal campaign will run through Easter Sunday, March 26. He urged increased support for the Easter Seal Society and its program of services to crippled children and adults.

DEE CULP DISCOVERS DINOSAUR TRACKS

Dee Culp, distribution technician for Southern Union Gas Co. in Pecos, recently discovered nine dinosaur tracks made some 120 million years ago during the Cretaceous period. Mr. Culp, who was born and raised in the Fort Chadbourne community, made the discovery about 24 miles west of McCamey while looking for Indian arrowheads.

The purpose of the programs is to teach those attending how to get the most for the money spent, how to be better managers of time, energy, money and other resources; also to give helps on budgets, records, credit, wills and other matters of interest to the workshop participants.

Dr. Wann Langston, paleontologist with the University of Texas, verified the find and gave some information on the now extinct animal which made the tracks. He said the dinosaur was a duckbilled plant-eating camptosaur that walked mostly on two feet but did drop to all fours on occasion. The three-toed tracks measure 22 inches from heel to longest toe and his stride was nearly 12 feet. The dinosaur stood approximately 12 feet high and was probably wading in a shallow sea when he left his tracks.

Assisting Mrs. Roe with the program will be Miss Joy Arrington, Home Management Specialist of A&M University, and Robert Kensing, District 7 Farm Management Specialist.

The discovery is only the third one made in Texas and is the furthest northwest in the state. Texas Highway Department has built a roadside park at the discovery site, which is about 100 yards off U.S. Highway 67. Pecos County Commissioners are building a fence and protective covering over the tracks.

The programs will be held in the Courthouse and will begin at 2 p.m. on Thursday, March 9, Tuesday, March 14, 21 and 28.

H D Agent's News Dept.

Some fabrics, because of a particular design or weave, require special thought and care when you select a pattern and piece it on the fabric. Such fabrics as plaids, stripes, prints with an up and down, widely open spaced prints, diagonal weaves, twills, corduroy, and velveteen fall into this category.

You should select the pattern and fabric on the same shopping tour. It is difficult to say that one should be selected before the other. Usually the pattern is selected first, however. Consult the pattern envelope for suggestions of kinds of fabric to use, or for those not recommended for the pattern.

Fabrics that require matching are usually more attractive and easier to cut and sew if you select a pattern with a few pieces. Remember that the design or weave of the fabric should be the main interest of the garment, rather than seams or decorative lines.

Designs of plaids, tripes, diagonal and geometric prints should be matched to give a professional look. Alter the pattern to fit before the garment is cut. Change in seam lines after cutting may make the design difficult.

Be careful to cut on the correct grain of the fabrics that have a design which must be matched. Check the fabric before you buy it to see that it is not woven or printed off grain. It is impossible to straighten some off-grain fabrics.

Save and Use Bacon Drippings  
Don't throw away bacon drippings! Save those flavor drops for cooking and seasoning.

To keep drippings in the best condition, pour them into small jars so that the bottom layers won't become rancid. Date or number the jars and store them in the refrigerator. Use the oldest fat first.

One pound of bacon will yield anywhere from one to one and a half cups of drippings. There are any number of ways in which to use this excellent energy food. It's an ideal seasoning for vegetables. Use it as a basis for soups and white sauces. It adds meat flavor to scalloped dishes, soups and creamed mixtures.

Use bacon for frying eggs, French toast, potatoes, apple slices, and meats. Drippings are excellent for "buttering" crumbs for caseroles. Light muffins, coffee cakes, gingerbread, spice cakes, and rich cookies can use bacon drippings to advantage.

In baking with drippings, use one fourth less than for other specified shortenings, because its shortening power is greater than other fats.

Use Hard-Cooked Eggs  
Remember the days when eggs were hard-boiled?

Within the past decade there has been a change in egg recipes. For centuries, people have been eating hard-boiled eggs or using them in their favorite egg dishes. Now, hard-boiled eggs are out of style.

In their place, hard-cooked eggs are the thing. The reason is that boiling tends to make egg whites leathery and tough.

How do you keep eggs from being tough, hard-boiled characters? Put the eggs in a pan and cover them with lukewarm water. Heat rapidly on the stove until the water begins to boil. Remove from heat at once and put a tight cover on the pan. Let the eggs stay in the hot water about 15 minutes.

For easy peeling after cooking, pour off the hot water and run cold water over the eggs until they are cool enough to handle. Then crush the shells by running them back and forth over a

smooth surface. The shells come off with no trouble.

Eggs are exceptionally plentiful now. Supplies are about 6 percent larger than at this time last year. Egg production is always high at this season.

Once you convert some of these plentiful fresh eggs into the hard-cooked variety, you have the beginnings of delicious stuffed eggs, using your favorite filling, or they might be served on top of cornbread, toast, broccoli or boiled

ham or smothered under a cheese sauce, sour cream or creole sauce.

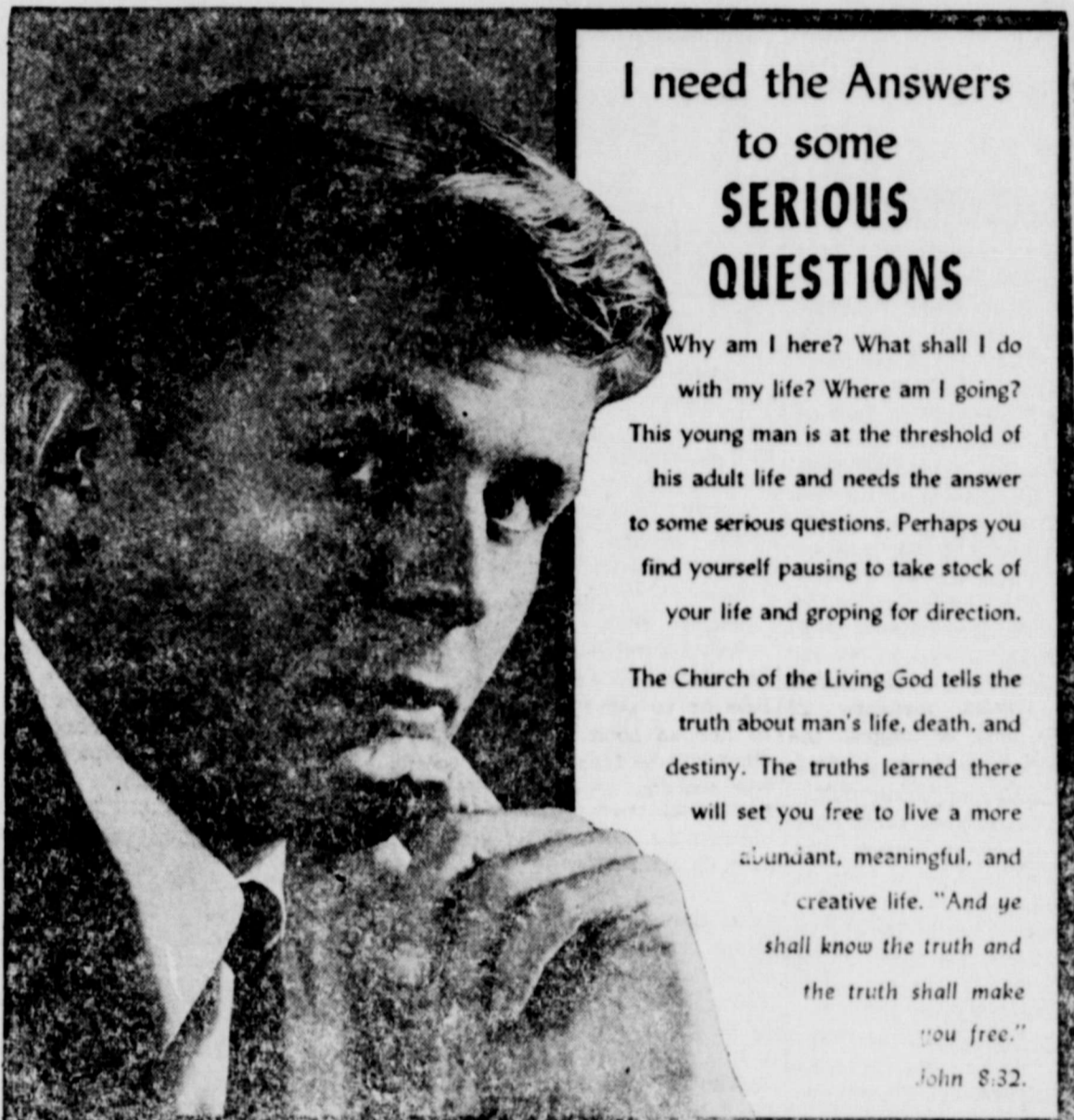

For going away, the bride wore a three piece melon colored wool suit with matching hat and shoes, beige gloves and an orchid from her wedding bouquet.

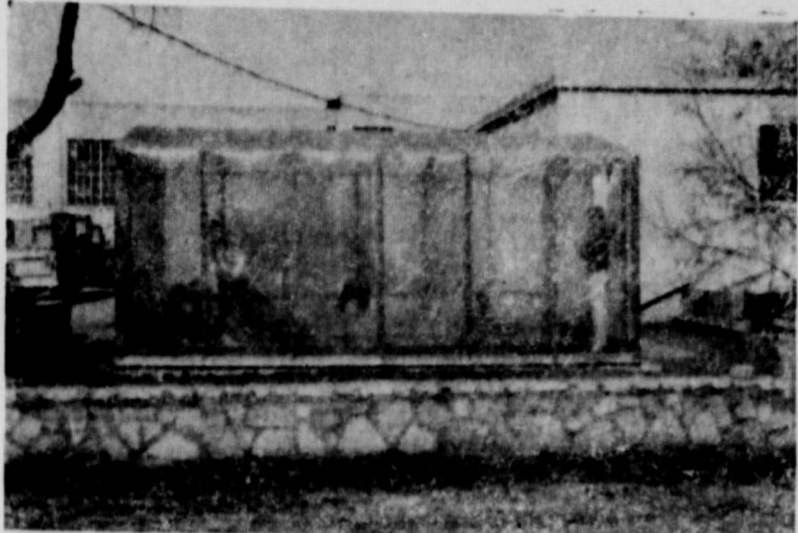
They will be stationed at Ft. McClellan, Alabama for five weeks and then at Fort Bliss in El Paso.
