Trackmen Win 2nd, 3rd At Santa Anna

After only a week of workouts, Bronte High School's track team took sixth place at a track meet last Saturday at Santa Anna. Brian Richards garnered the most points for his team with a second place in shot put. His throw covered 49 feet 9 1/4 inches.

Davis Corley helped the cause with a third place in broad jump which covered 19 feet 5 1/2 inches. Corley also tied for fifth and sixth in high jump.

David Glenn took fifth place in pole vault with an 11 foot clearance. He was in a tie for fourth, fifth and sixth places and was awarded fifth place when number of misses were counted.

Coach Cecil Toliver said 18 schools were entered in the meet and that about 12 of them were Class AA. Twelve men are out for track this year, the coach said.

\$335 In Prizes

A total of \$335 will be given in prizes to hunters. Most of the prize money will go to hunters who bring in the most pounds of rattlers. For pounds of snakes brought in Saturday, first prize will be \$175, second \$50, and third \$15. For the most pounds delivered Sunday, first prize will be \$50, and second prize will be \$25. Ten dollars will be awarded the hunter who brings in the longest snake and another \$10 will go to the hunter whose snake has the most rattles.

Handler to be Here

Cecil Fox of Spur, well known snake handler in this area, will be here both days to put on regular exhibitions for the entertainment and instruction of those who come to the show. He will show the proper method for handling snakes, how to milk the venom from them, and other interesting things about snakes. He will also be ready to answer any questions from onlookers.

A concession stand will serve freshly cooked rattlesnake steaks during both days of the show. It will be operated by members of Zeta Delta HD Club. Other refreshments will also be available for those who prefer the more conventional refreshments.

Land owners who want their land hunted should report this information to Dolan Mackey at Mackey Feed Store or Hurlin Lee at the Humble Service Station. The Jaycees said they wanted to have hunters on property of everyone who wants them, but they did not want hunters to enter areas where they are not wanted.

No Danger to Spectators

Spectators at the big show are assured there is no danger from the snakes. They will be enclosed in a pit from which they cannot escape. This year is the fourth year for the Jaycee shows, and thousands of person have viewed the rattlers with no one suffering a bite, except for one professional snake handler.

High School Golf Tourney Set

Deadline Nears For Auto Inspections

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists that only six weeks remain before enforce-

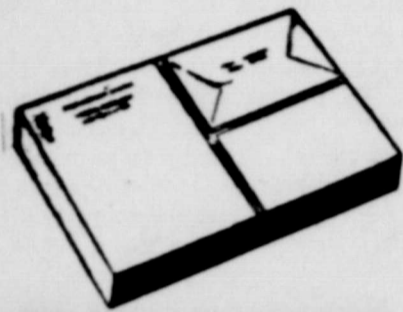
ment begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last minute lines begin forming.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison stated, "many motorists will wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped with late-comers."

"In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we would urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized inspection station."

PEACE CORPS TO TEST ON MARCH 18

Coke County area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement test at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday, March 18, at Room 324, Federal Bldg. San Angelo.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicate a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The Placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive — an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C., 20525.

The Placement Test takes about an hour and a half.

Salmon is March Plentiful Food

If you're looking for a bargain package of powerful nutrition, an extra plentiful supply of canned salmon is available this season. It is one of the March plentiful foods.

Commercial grades of canned salmon are established by five

species. Canned, these species will differ in color, texture of flesh, and flavor, but show little variation in food value.

Canned salmon also varies in price depending on kind. Chum and Keta are the least expensive salmon and are lighter in color. They are especially suitable for casseroles and other cooked dishes.

The low-priced salmon is not inferior or less carefully prepared. It's just a different variety than the more expensive pink salmon.

If you're a calory counter, you'll be glad to know that salmon only has 37 calories per serving.

Home Economics Briefs

If you're going to be out of the kitchen while using a double boiler, here's an ingenious alarm system that tells you when the water is boiling. Borrow two or three of your youngster's marbles and place them in the bottom of the double boiler before turning on the flame. If the water should boil away to a dangerously low level, the marbles will begin a clatter that will get you back in time to add water and save the pot from burning.

Potatoes may be an overlooked choice for the reducing diet. A medium-sized potato, boiled or baked, contains about 100 calories. This is about the same number of calories as in a large apple, orange, or half a grapefruit.

Tickets Complete For School, City Elections In April

One change has occurred since last week in the tickets of forthcoming elections which will be held here in early April. Another candidate's name will be on the city ballot. Mayor Royce Lee said that he was advised late last week that Bill Clark would have to run for the additional year of Buddy Reed's unexpired term, to which he was appointed recently.

The mayor said the city council has the authority to appoint an alderman to fill the vacancy on the council, but only until the next regular city election. Therefore Clark will have to stand for election in the April 4 balloting.

Other candidates who will be seeking a two year term on the council are Horace Grigg, who is presently serving, and Marvin Bryant, who is seeking the spot now held by Norman R. Kiker. City absentee voting will commence Wednesday, March 15, and continue until five days before the election.

School Election

Five candidates are seeking the two spots on the school board which become vacant next month.

Running for school board are Conda O. Richards, the only candidate now serving on the board; also David W. Crockett, Norman R. Kiker, C. M. Howard and Harold Moon. Terms of J. B. Morrow and Richards, who is president of the board, expire this year. Morrow, who has served as trustee for many years, did not seek reelection.

Other members of the board who have one or two years yet to serve are Horace Taylor, Joe Rawlings, A. E. Bell Jr., Bill Thomas and Wayne Arrott.

Absentee voting in the school race will start Monday and continue until five days before the election.

County Trustees

D. K. Glenn is the only candidate to file for county trustee at large. He is seeking reelection.

Also on the ticket for reelection and unopposed are Noah Pruitt Sr. in Precinct 2 and C. E. Arrott in Precinct 4.

Hundreds Attend School Program and Open House

Hundreds of Bronte School patrons and friends didn't mind the windy weather Tuesday night as they turned out to hear a program and admire their new school buildings.

The program began at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium and was held as the main feature of Public Schools Week.

Two high points of the program were addresses by Conda O. Richards, president of the school board, and Dr. W. O. Beazley of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

The board chairman gave a short history of events leading up to construction of the new building. He praised the school board which was responsible for construction of the elementary building, stating that foresightedness of its members, in setting up the debt retirement plan, made the new facilities possible.

Richards said after it became apparent that Bronte School District residents were not interested in a possible consolidation with Robert Lee, the board began at once to make plans to provide additional high school facilities, which were badly needed. He told of sessions with architects, and noted that A. E. Bell was mainly responsible for the board's decision to build underground facilities and thus provide students and others with a storm shelter.

Richards concluded his talk by saying that he is proud to live in a community and serve a school where the citizens are interested in providing their children with first class educational opportunities.

Dr. Beazley congratulated citizens here on their progressiveness, and stated that the Bronte School system is one of the best in this area. "Some of the best students we have had at Hardin-Simmons have come from Bronte," he said. He emphasized the importance of

progressive educational methods, but warned that education must go hand in hand with instilling high moral values in today's students.

Supt. C. B. Barbee served as master of ceremonies, and following the last number on program introduced board members, faculty members and other school employees. He then invited everyone to tour all parts of the school plant, which extends almost two blocks along Jefferson Street.

Also included on the program were the invocation by Gary Stroebel, president of the Student Council; a bass solo by Bob Wells, accompanied by Miss Ida Lee Parker; a clarinet trio composed of Melissa Lee, Norma Pruitt and Kathy Kiker, two vocal numbers by Janet Lee and Bennie Carol Oglesby, accompanied by Mrs. LaRue Brouard. Bronte Boy Scouts presented the colors and led the pledge of allegiance.

The large crowd milled around

the new structures for more than an hour after the program was concluded. Teachers were stationed in their teaching places to answer any questions which visitors asked.

Perhaps the most admired part of the new building was the study hall-library, since it was first opened Tuesday and had not been seen before by most of the visitors. New furniture for this part of the new building arrived Monday, and workers had to assemble it Monday night.

Lions, Masons Have Dinner

Prior to the program, members and guests of the two local Lions Clubs and Bronte Masonic Lodge had their annual dinner in honor of Public Schools Week. Teachers and board members were special guests. The affair was held in the school lunchroom, with an overflow crowd. The menu consisted of barbecued chicken, green beans, mashed potatoes, combination salad, hot rolls, apple cobbler, coffee and tea.

A copy of this order shall also serve as a writ of election which shall be delivered to the above appointed Presiding Judge, for said election.

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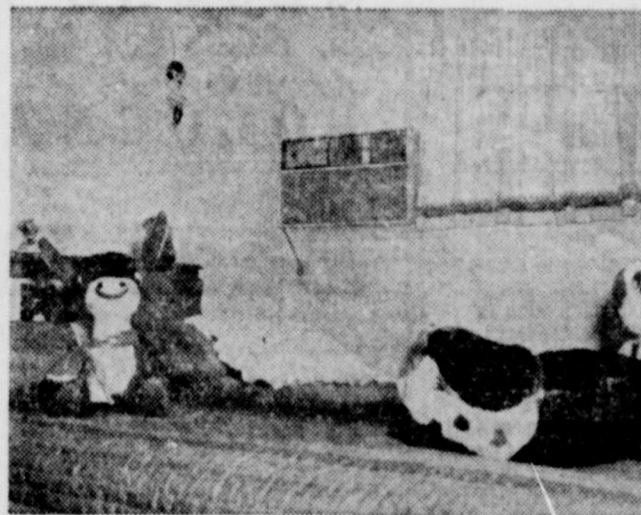

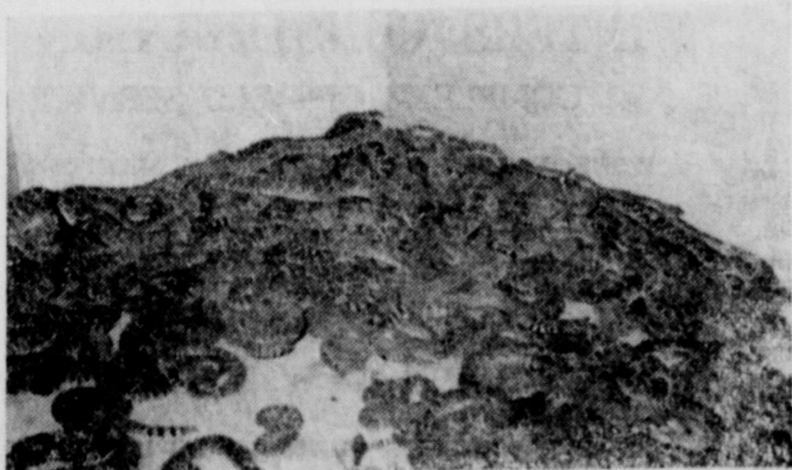

TSGRA Grateful For Help On Wage, Hour Problem

Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Assn. members and directors meeting in Ozona unanimously voted for an expression of gratitude to officers and individual members who carried on an extensive campaign on behalf of the ranch industry in respect to the new Wage and Hour Law. Included in the expression were officers of the National Wool Growers Association, who worked closely with the Texas group. "At a time when all the odds seemed to be against us, and when many organizations saw no hope and offered little help, these men carried on the battle", declared Gaylord Hankins of Rocksprings, chairman of the TS and GRA ranch labor committee.

He said exclusion of range livestock employees from the new law, and exemption of ranchmen from responsibility for most contract labor, was due to the determined efforts of these men in the wool - and - mohair - grower organizations.

Ranchmen will find themselves having to keep more records than ever and comply with regulations they have never known in the past, he continued, but even so the TS&GRA and NWGA won important concessions the industry would not otherwise have had.

The official commendation lauded officers and members who worked with Texas Senators Yarborough and Tower, with individual members of Congress, with labor committee members of both Houses and with the U. S. Department of Labor. It recognized the effect TS&GRA and NWGA had upon the final writing of various safeguards in the law.
