The sheet is entitled "Twelve Year Study of Economic Indexes, Local Fund Assignments and Valuheld next Tuesday, May 2, in the ations," which is a little awesome. Nevertheless, the figures give some information which is worth knowing, and compares various items from 1956-57 through 1967-68.

The first columns show county valuations, then there are a couple of columns which have to do with fund assignments toward the state foundation program, about which we are a little fuzzy.

Then comes the last column, which was the one we thought particularly significant. It contains a list of the school district's tax valuation, and shows that the 1967-68 values will be \$8,400,000, the highest figure on the sheet.



Bill Luckett, city water superintendent, said this week that in making his rounds reading water meters, he noticed that many Bronte residents are putting rocks, wire, and other heavy objects in their trash barrels, makhandle.

The city council has instructed the city trash hauler not to hald off heavy objects of this kind. Local residents are asked to cooperate by not filling their barrels with waste matter of this type. In th efuture, barrels containing heavy and hard to handle objects will not be emptied, it was noted.

Special arrangements with private payment can be made to have heavy trash hauled, however.

Paper and other trash should be burned, also, Luckett said.

Cemetery and inspected some of the old grave markers, especially those known that have historical significance in this area.

As they left the cemetery Mrs. Yarbrough pointed out where the townsite of Hayrick, Coke's first county seat, was located.

The group headed east along the road which goes near the foot of Nipple Peak and comes out at the old town of Fort Chadbourne. A stop was made and the old Santa Fe depot and Methodist Church, both now abandoned, were pointed out. Also the townsite where a number of thriving business firms stood less than a half century ago was shown the visitors.

The next stop was the ranch of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Wylie where Fort Chadbourne is located. The visitors were fascinated with the remains of the buildings which were put up prior to the Civil War. The group wandered over the grounds and discussed the possibilities of activities which might have occurred on the spot 100 years ago.

The Old Fort Cemetery was the last stop. Still in use by several families in the area it contains graves well over a century old.

Mrs. Yarbrough said she felt that the tour was a big success and was well pleased with having the 46 persons participate in it.
