As in woven fabrics, two layers of yarn are normally used to make Malimo cloth. A sheet with residual deafness or mental of warp, or lengthwise yarns, and defects." a sheet of filling, or crosswise yarns, are used. But rather than bility that measles, like polio, being woven together, the two layers are placed one on top of this country through the use of the other and passed beneath a needle bar. The needle bar contains hundreds of needles which simply stitch or sew the two layers together. Malimo fabrics can be sown with either a lock stitch or tricot knit stitch. In this way, Malmo can be made to look like a knit or woven fabric. Variations of the Malimo machine can also make pile or terry-like cloth.

The speed of the Malimo machine is so great that it has been estimated that three of these machines can replace ninety conventional looms with respect to the number of yards of fabric produced. Malimo fabrics may provide a real cost savings to consumers.
