Funeral services were held Saturday at 2 p.m. in Blackwell Baptist Church for W. C. Shamblin, 87, resident of Coke County for almost 70 years. The Rev. Clarence Minton, pastor, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Kay Corley, also of Blackwell.

Burial was in Blackwell Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral home of Bronte.

Mr. Shamblin died about 10 p.m. Thursday, May 25, in Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Angelo, after a long illness.

He was born in July 1879 in Bell County and moved to Coke County in 1898.

Mr. Shamblin was a retired farmer, stockman, teacher and banker. He was instrumental in organizing the Coke County Soil Conservation District and served many years as its secretary. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, W. C. Shamblin Jr. of Melbourne, Australia, Harold Hamilton of Amarillo, Jack Hamilton of Dallas, and Bill Hamilton of Blackwell; one daughter, Mrs. Pauline Wadley of San Antonio; nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Funeral Held For Dave Brunson, 92

Funeral services were held Monday at 4 p.m. in First Baptist Church for D. C. (Dave) Brunson, 92, Bronte resident for more than 50 years. The Rev. Ruben Blake, Baptist minister at Miles, officiated, and burial followed in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Brunson died at 5:15 a.m. Sunday in Bronte Hospital after a short illness. He had been in good health up until a few months ago, but after treatment, he apparently was enjoying his usual health again until he became ill early Sunday morning.

A retired farmer, Mr. Brunson came to Coke County in 1915.

He was born March 16, 1875, in Hunt County. He was the last surviving child of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Brunson. He and Miss Bessie Lois Creswell were married Sept. 30, 1900, in Erath County. Mrs. Brunson died May 9, 1961.

Mr. Brunson was a member of the Baptist Church and Odd Fellow Lodge.

For the past several years, his annual birthday party was an affair eagerly awaited by local friends. Always stag affairs, many domino games were played and much birthday cake eaten at these parties. Most local residents called him "Mr. Dave."

Survivors include four sons, J. L. and H. H. Brunson, both of Bronte, D. C. PRE-SCHOOL PROGRAM HERE THIS SUMMER

A Preschool program, similar to the one held last year, will be held at Bronte School again this summer. The program is financed under Title 1 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The school will be in operation from June 5 until August 4, with the exception of the week July 10 - 14. Sessions will be held from 8 a.m. until 12 noon.

Children who will be first graders next fall and who did not attend the preschool program last year will be given first priority to attend. Next fall's first graders who did attend last year but need additional preparation will be given the next priority. If more can be accommodated, those who will be first graders this fall and who appear ready for first grade work and those who will be first graders in '68-'69 and who will need to attend two summers will be given the next priorities.

A Versatile Fabric

Make your next dress out of Malimo. No, it's not a new fake fur or an exotic bird foliage. Malimo in fabric that is genuinely new in the eyes of the consumer.

Malimo is the trade name of the fabric construction which produces a new breed of fabric — neither woven nor knit, nor what is commonly considered non-woven.

As in woven fabrics, two layers of yarn are normally used to make Malimo cloth. A sheet of warp, or lengthwise yarns, and a sheet of filling, or crosswise yarns, are used. But rather than being woven together, the two layers are placed one on top of the other and passed beneath a needle bar.

Now there is a distinct possibility that measles, like polio, may be all but exterminated in this country through the use of a vaccine.

Measles vaccine has been available since spring, 1963. Although measles prevention is now readily possible, it has been detained by the development of several different vaccines and many different vaccination schedules.

Most measles-susceptible children can be immunized by their family's physician, but cooperative community action programs may also be needed, the statement said.

Extensive clinical tests show that a type of measles vaccine now in use consistently gives a high degree of immunity with only one immunization and without causing rash or illness. Safety and effectiveness of the vaccine should make the task of eliminating measles in America somewhat easier, the statement continued.

New Sugar Substitute On Way
Latest break through for the calorie counters is a new product that looks and tastes like sugar, but contains only about one-sixth the calories. It is now being test-marketed. This product can be used from the sugar bowl to sweeten beverages, cereals, fruits, and juices, and reportedly has the same sweetness as sugar.

The density of the new sweetener is not identical to sugar, and this means that the manufacturer is having to specially adapt some recipes. Sales promotion of artificial sweeteners have been geared to and accepted by many hopeful dieters. However, evidence makes it clear that synthetics alone can't take off unwanted pounds. Coupled with good eating habits, they can be helpful.

A recent release from the American Medical Association stated, although measles is a common childhood disease (90 percent of American adults have had measles), it is much more serious than many people realize.

A statement issued by the AMA's Council on Environmental and Public Health said, "Part of the problem has been a general apathy to measles. Adults may have forgotten the three to six days of peak discomfort of the uncomplicated illness they experienced as children."

"They may have forgotten the childhood friends who died, the bitter experience of families whose children suffered from complications such as pneumonia or encephalitis, and those left with residual deafness or mental defects."

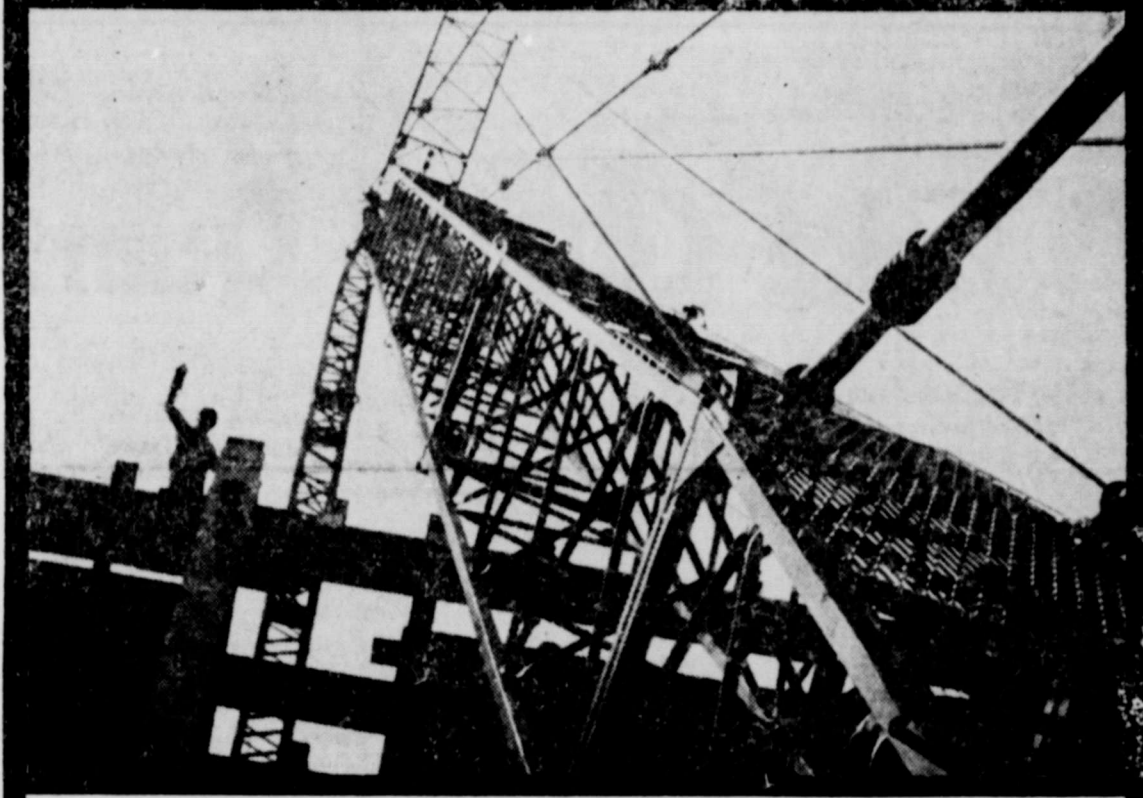

Public Invited to Marker Dedication, Sanco Homecoming Friday, Saturday

The Thirteenth Annual Sanco Homecoming, to be held this coming weekend, will be a double header. It will combine the regular homecoming program and the dedication of what is believed to be the second historical marker in Texas under the RAMPS program to commemorate the establishment of a post office on the frontier.

The only other post office known to have been so honored is Hye, Texas, where President Johnson gets his mail.

Under the auspices of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, and the Sanco Homecoming Association, the program is set for Sunday afternoon at 2:30 at the big community tabernacle. The program will emphasize the part played by the small post office in the small community in the settlement and development of the Texas frontier. It will also give emphasis to pre-historic peoples, especially the occupancy by the Comanche and other Indians in the pre-settlement era.

All postmasters of Coke County have been invited to be honored guests, and postmasters of surrounding counties have been given special invitations to attend. Coke County postmasters include Mrs. Tom Green, Tennyson; Noah Pruitt, Jr., Bronte; Hugh S. Lewis Jr., Robert Lee; Mrs. Bob Odom, Silver and Mrs. Ulmer Bird, Sanco.

J. Allen Dupree, assistant to the Regional Director of the Dallas Region, will be present and represent the U. S. Postal Department on the program.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Hardin-Simmons, close student of the pre-settlement era in this vicinity, noted author and speaker, is to bring the dedicatory address.

Two riding groups, the Coke County Roping Club and the 4H

Riding Club, are expected to take part, riding through the village after the program at the tabernacle and just before the unveiling ceremony at the marker. Ranchmen not members of the clubs are invited to bring horses and riders to take part in the riding salute to the founders of the Coke County ranch communities and ranch business.

The dedication of the cast aluminum marker, officially a part of the Texas RAMPS program, is included in the homecoming for the 80-year-old community, which is one year older than its post office. All visitors who plan to attend the dedication will be welcome at the Sunday morning program for homecomers which will start at 10:45 at the tabernacle. A basket dinner will be served at noon in the tabernacle. Meat will be furnished by the Sanco Community Association with visitors providing other food.

Saturday Activities

Saturday activities will include a tour sponsored by the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, conducted by Ulmer Bird and other members of the committee. The tour will begin at the Community Center at 2:30 p.m., Saturday and will include visits to Indian camp sites and other points of historical interest, with presentation of evidence concerning pre-historic man in Coke County and in the Yellow Wolf Valley. The tour will include the northeast IAB Oil Field installations.

Saturday night at 8 o'clock will be the informal get-together for visiting. Some of the old-time "fiddling" recorded on Saturday night two years ago by the late Tee Green and others, including Arthur Tubb and Rodney Mathers, will be played back. Arrow heads, hide scrapers, and other tools of the ancient past will be shown along with antiques, in the community center by Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Prine Jr. and possibly others.

Sunday morning at 10:45 will be the customary morning program for the Homecoming, with recognition of families and individuals, special flower awards, and a brief devotional by Wilson Carwile.

April Bond Sales Given For County

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to 1,418 in Coke county were reported today by G. C. Allen, chairman of the Coke County Savings Bonds Committee. This figure brought the year's sales to \$5,566.00, which is 14 percent of the county's goal of \$40,000.

Total purchases of E and H Savings Bonds in Texas for the month of April amounted to \$13,817,202. The January - April sales for the state totaled \$56,389,486 which is an increase of 8 per cent over the same period of 1966.

Nationally, cash sales of E and H Bonds for the first four months of 1967 amounted to \$1,770 million, 4 per cent above sales in 1966. Sales of E Bonds alone for the first four months were \$1,640 million, an increase of 6.3 per cent over 1966's \$1,543 million.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN, Tex. — State Legislators wound up their 60th session here on schedule despite a hectic flurry of last-minute assignments, and left behind a far-reaching record of achievement in many areas.

No one can deny that there were some notable failures. But the accomplishments were impressive.

Here is a random look at some of the session's highlights:

—BUDGET — Lawmakers agreed on \$2,400,000,000 in spending (\$446,800,000 from general revenue) for 1968, without passing a tax bill. They will come back next year to budget for 1969. Funds provide for substantial increases in all areas of state government, including education, health, general administration and welfare.

—SCHOOL TEACHERS — After requesting a \$68,000,000 salary increase program and being offered \$55,500,000 by the Senate, teachers finally got \$51,000,000.

—STATE EMPLOYEES — These workers came up with their most substantial salary benefits in history. Raises averaged about 14 per cent and rang-

ed up to 30 percent and more in some salaries.

—MEDICAID — Title 19 hospitalization and medical aid to the needy — most dramatic step in public welfare since launching of social security — was implemented for Texas by passage of a special act and appropriation of nearly \$25,000,000.

—EDUCATION — Money was made available for 2,300,000 public school pupils and a 26 percent increase in higher education spending. Junior College appropriations were increased from \$13,600,000 to \$24,400,000.

—CITY SALES TAX — Cities got the authority they sought to supplement their property tax income by levying one per cent sales tax on vote of their citizens after next August.

—LABOR — Although defeated on minimum wage legislation and workmen's compensation law revision, labor came to terms with management on a compromise industrial safety act and an increase in unemployment compensation benefits from a maximum of \$37 to \$45 a week.

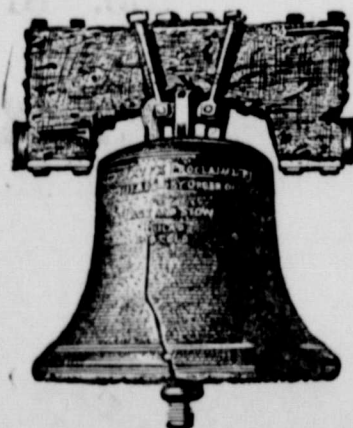
