

J. E. Quisenberry, head of the ASCS office in Coke County, said this week that he has already had nine applications to take advantage of the released acreage. He said a total of about 700 acres is involved in the applications already received.

Quisenberry said that 368 farms totaling 13,369 acres are eligible to apply. He added, however, that only 40 or 50 of the 368 have sufficient grass on them to make grazing worthwhile.

The program will allow four months grazing on the reserve acres, beginning July 1. Applicants must have their applications in by that date in order to benefit for the maximum period. Applications will be accepted all through the month of July, but late applicants will not be allowed to graze beyond the Nov. 1 deadline, thus losing the number of days they are late in applying.

A downward adjustment in payments for reserve land used in grazing will amount to \$1 per acre per month, Quisenberry said.

Quisenberry pointed out that permission to use reserve acres does not come about automatically. The operator has to request it, and his request must be approved by the county committee before the land can be used.

Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Liles died early Thursday in Lott, where he was visiting relatives, of a heart attack.

He wkas born March 20, 1897. in Durango, Texas, and was married to Cordia Mills, Sept. 10, 1920, at Ballinger. They came to Bronte in 1923 and have made their home here since that time.

Liles was justice of the peace for precinct 2, serving in that office at the time of his death. He had served in the office since 1958.

He was a veteran of World War I, a member of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Coke County Barracks of the World War I veterans association. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Horace, of Irving; two daughters, Mrs. O. E. Richie of Pottsboro and Mrs. Frank Wojtek of Robert Lee; a brother, Jack of Lott; and three grandchildren. Pallbearers were T. F. Sims, J. B. Mackey, Bill Wrinkle, Jes-
