Crowd Of 650 Attend Barbecue

A crowd estimated at 600-650 persons crowded into Bronte County Park Monday evening to attend the annual Labor Day barbecue, sponsored by the merchants of Bronte.

Bronte Jaycees, who were in charge of arrangements for the affair, spent all day preparing the feed. The menu consisted of barbecue, salad, beans, bread, slaw, pickles, onions, tea and coffee. Desserts were brought by women of the community.

Following the meal, Bronte Youth Choir, under direction of Tommy Walter, sang several numbers. Mrs. Martin Lee was accompanist. Charles Taylor, local teacher and well known pantomimist, kept the audience in a gale of laughter with his numbers. The Rev. Harry Morris was master of ceremonies.

Tommy Lee of the Jaycees said 600-650 persons were present. He made his estimate from the fact that over 800 plates were used, allowing for a number who used more than one plate.

Enrollment Up 15 Over Last Week

Enrollment in Bronte Schools took another jump of 15 students in the last week. A report issued Wednesday said 323 students were enrolled, compared to 308 at the same time last week.

Supt. C. B. Barbee released the figures, which showed 110 in high school and 213 in elementary school. The fourth grade is the largest in elementary school with 35, while the largest in high school is the sophomore class with 34.

GOOD RAINS USHER IN FALL

Up to two inches of rain fell in the Bronte area over the weekend and the first of this week.

The moisture fell intermittently all day Saturday and continued through Monday.

Prospects for fall pastures and some late row crops will improve as a result of the rain.

Up to three inches of moisture fell in the Robert Lee vicinity. Coke County escaped the violent weather that accompanied the rain in many parts of Texas.

Mayor Lee Honored

Mayor Royce Lee was honored when the Jaycee president went to the microphone to present the club's annual Distinguished Service Award plaque. The Jaycees looked over their membership and failing to find anybody who deserved the award, Lee said, "we started looking on the outside, and decided that the award should go to Mayor Royce Lee, who has unselfishly spent his time and money working for this community."

The Bronte Longhorns will start off the 1967 football season with a rating of No. 1 in the state. Supt. C. B. Barbee reported Wednesday morning that the school had received its copy of the Harris Ratings for this week, and the mighty Longhorns occupy the top spot in Texas among Class B schools.

They will get a real opportunity to prove their mettle Friday night in the season opener when they go up against the Bangs Dragons, who are rated No. 3. The Longhorns will have plenty to fight for when they get to Bangs, as the Dragons were the only team on last year's schedule who handed the locals a defeat, 7-0.

The Harris Rating System is operated in Dallas and supplies information to schools and other interested organizations and businesses on ratings compiled from statistics which consider many factors which might affect a football team. The rating given the Longhorns was 104.1.

Other ratings which may be of interest to local fans include Eden in the No. 8 spot; Trent 16; Forsan 37; Chillicothe 10; Groom 19; and Vega 38.

Merkel Was Tough

The Longhorns ran into some tough opposition last Friday night when they went to Merkel for a pre-season scrimmage. The Merkel lads, who have been picked to win District 4-A, and the Longhorns scrimmaged to what was considered a tie ball game.

Coach Cecil Toliver said this week that probably starters in the Bangs contest will be:

James Vaughn and David Scott are likely substitutions in a tackle position on defense, the coach said.

First Baptist To Build \$22,000 Parsonage

Members of the First Baptist Church voted to build a new parsonage for the pastor of their church. The new structure will cost an estimated \$22,000.

The new pastor's home will be financed largely from money willed to the church by the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Keeney. E. F. Glenn, chairman of the parsonage committee, said that in their will, Mr. and Mrs. Keeney left \$18,049.18 to the church for use as members wished. This figure represented one-third of their estate. Another one-third went to Buckner's Orphans Home in Dallas.

The new house will be built on the site formerly occupied by the old parsonage, which was sold to Mrs. Minnie B. West and moved to the north part of town.

It will be of brick veneer structure, and will have a living-dining room combination, library, family room-kitchen combination, four bedrooms, two baths and a two car garage. Central heating

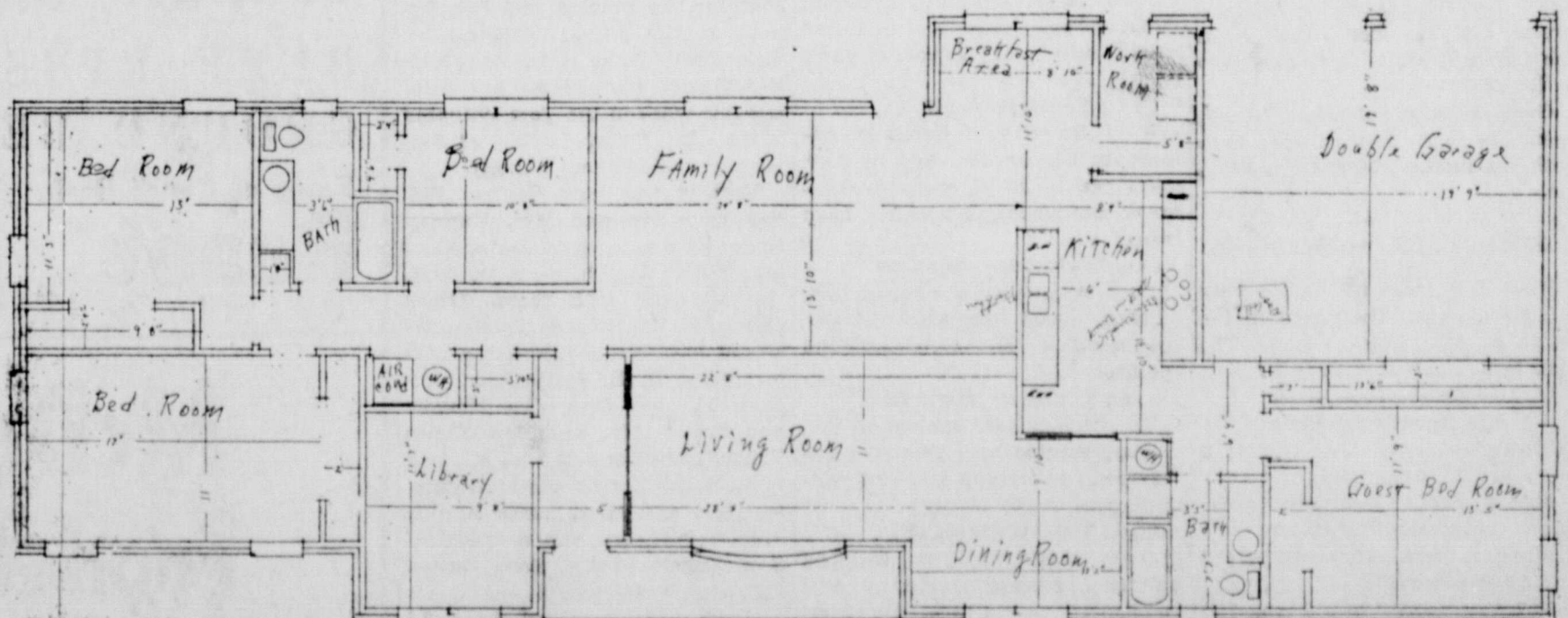
and air conditioning will be used throughout.

Martin Lee has been awarded the contract on the new building, and is already making preliminary plans to start work in the near future, subject to final approval of the church.

The parsonage committee, in addition to Glenn, is made up of Mrs. Charlie Keeney, a sister-in-law of the principal donors, Mrs. C. B. Barbee, Royce Fancher, J. B. Mackey, and the Rev. Harry Morris, pastor.

Glenn told the Enterprise that he felt the entire community should be made aware of the fact that the new home was made possible by the generosity of the Keeney family.

Mr. Keeney, with his brother, the late Charlie Keeney, operated various businesses in Bronte over a period of almost 50 years. Mr. Keeney died in 1956, and his wife, the former Eva Flood, died in 1964.

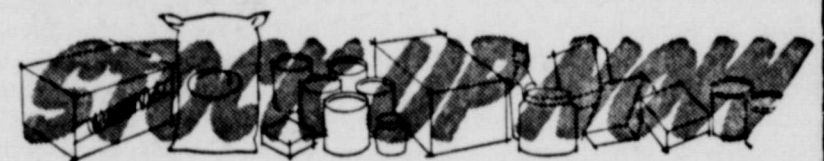



more than 93 million telephones throughout the United States and Canada.

All customers will receive by mail before September 10 an instruction booklet which tells precisely how to use the new service. Persons who have not received an instruction booklet or anyone needing additional copies may obtain them by calling the business office during regular office hours, McCullough stated.

The equipment making this new service available is located in San Angelo, McCullough said. Plans for modification of, and changes in local equipment were begun more than four years ago. In addition to installing the intricate EDDD facilities in San Angelo, the overall project involved constructing new central office buildings in Carlsbad, Christoval, Eldorado and Sonora and placing new central office equipment in the buildings. Additional long distance circuits have been added between San Angelo and area towns so customers in the network can have access to the equipment.

McCullough pointed out that General Telephone customers will have a more advanced type of long distance dialing service than most. "All customers having E-DDD service can dial station - to - station long distance calls; however, the equipment we have also permits customers to dial their own person - to - person, collect or credit card calls."
