Longhorns To Try Hermleigh II Next

The Bronte Longhorns will be facing what is the strongest remaining opponent of District 4B Friday night when they travel to Hermleigh to take on the Cardinals.

Coach Cecil Toliver said Wednesday morning that he is expecting a victory, "but, you know, Hermleigh nearly always fields a good strong team." Hermleigh has some good boys, the coach added, and "we're expecting to have to be on our toes."

AD-LIB-BEN

Considerable discussion has been going on the last week or so about changing UIL rules in order for Class B football teams to advance to state playoffs.

Prime mover of the campaign is A. E. Richards, editor of the Jayton Chronicle. It must be pointed out that Mr. Richards certainly can have no personal gain in mind in his crusade. However, he did point out in a letter that he felt his district does have a team which could win the state championship, "if they were not being discriminated against." He referred of course to the Bronte Longhorns.

Richards' arguments have some merit. He points out that Class B football is the only Interscholastic League activity which does not compete for state honors. He feels this is discriminatory, and should be corrected.

The Enterprise contacted Supt. C. B. Barbee who said positively that nothing would thrill him more than cheering the Bronte Longhorns on to a state football championship.

However, the superintendent added that at the present time he is opposed to advancing beyond regional playoffs for two reasons: (1) Additional games, probably at rather long distances would be a tremendous drain on community finances, and (2) further extension of the football season would disrupt the all round program of the school. He mentioned that even with Bronte's going on the regional, as it has the past two years, that the additional two weeks lost to basketball disrupted the basketball program to some extent. Concert band practice would also be disrupted, he added.

We have decided not to decide what we think about Richards' proposal just yet. There are ar-

Coach Toliver said his team should be in good shape to meet the Cardinals, except for Center Don Hageman, who suffered a twisted ankle in practice Monday. The coach said he thought Hageman would be in shape to play at least some on offense.

Bronte's stellar backfield man, Doug McCutchen, increased his hold as the area's top scorer last week at Loraine when he raised his total to 93 points in five games. This averages out almost 19 points per game.

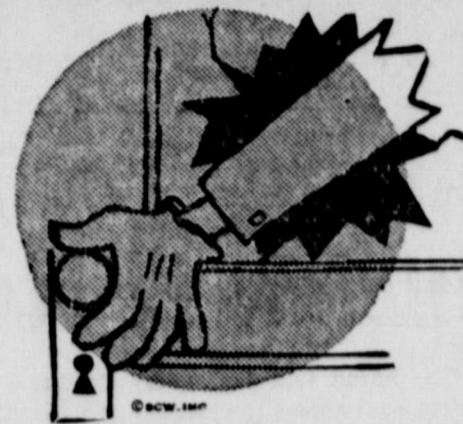

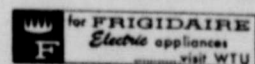

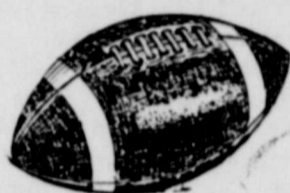

Robert Lee Dogies downed the Bronte Shorthorns in a game last Thursday night in Robert Lee. Score on the contest was 8-0.

The single tally of the game came on a 17 yard run by Kenneth Mathers. Bobby Mumford ran the extra points.

The marker is located only a few miles from the spot on the old Harris Ranch where thousands of dollars worth of barbed wire and posts were burned by those who opposed fencing the open range.

Elton T. Mims of Water Valley, president of the Edwards Plateau Historical Association and member of Coke County Historical Survey Committee, was the principal speaker for the program. He gave a short history of this colorful period in the area's history.

Mrs. L. E. Dudley of Abilene represented the Texas Historical Survey Committee and served as master of ceremonies. Dempsey Salter of Eldorado gave the invocation and Supt. Jimmy Bickley of Robert Lee welcomed guests. Robert Lee School Band played two numbers and Bronte Youth Choir sang two numbers.

Explorer Scouts Joe David Key, Danny Smith and Roy Ivey, all of Robert Lee presented the flag. Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, president of Coke County Historical Survey Committee, presented two books to the libraries of Bronte and Robert Lee High Schools. The historical works are entitled "American Cattle Trails" by Marion T. Place, and "Farewell to Texas" by Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas. In addition, a 1954 historical and progress edition of the San Angelo Standard-Times was presented to Robert Lee High School library. Bickley accepted the gifts for the Robert Lee School. Ulmer Bird, member of the Coke County committee, gave the benediction.

Tom Nasworthy of San Angelo unveiled the marker. Nasworthy's father was instrumental in getting Governor John Ireland to ask for legislation to end the fencing war. The governor sent in Texas Rangers to enforce the law when legislation was passed making it an offense to cut barbed wire.

Texas Highway Department officials have announced that they will take bids Nov. 7 for construction of a new highway to go around the Robert Lee Lake and connect up with the Sterling City highway in the vicinity of the Edith community.

H. L. Bailey, resident engineer of Sterling City, who is in charge of the project, told the Observer Wednesday morning that the section of road to be included in the Nov. 7 bids would run from the Y in Robert Lee, across the river, south of the lake basin and intersect the present Sterling City highway near Edith.

The construction will include a new bridge over the Colorado and rebuilding of the intersection at the Y.

The new road will be much wider than the present highway, Bailey said. The pavement will be 26 feet wide and nine foot paved shoulders will be constructed on each side.

The state is calling for completion of the work in 240 working days. Work will include grading, drainage structures, flexible base and two coats of surface treatment, Bailey said.

Longer range plans of the department are being made to complete rebuilding of Highway 158 from Robert Lee to Bronte, Bailey said. Fencing of additional right of way is being done now, and Bailey said the state expects to ask for bids in the late spring or early summer of 1968.

He said that this section of the highway will also be pavement 26 feet wide with nine foot paved shoulders. A considerable amount of straightening will be done during the rebuilding job, Bailey said.

This project will include the

area from the Y in Robert Lee to inside the city limits of Bronte.

Longhorns Remain Undefeated; Loraine Latest Victim, 32-0

The mighty Longhorns continued to roll last Friday night when they invaded the home-ground of the Loraine Bulldogs and wound up the ball game with a 32-0 score.

Passes from David Glenn to Davis Corley accounted for the first two touchdowns, one a 13 yarder and the other good for 65 yards. Doug McCutchen made the other two counters, the first on a beautiful 70 yard punt return, and the other on a power play through the middle from the 2 yard line.

A rather unusual happening was the successful execution of two-point conversions after each touchdown for a total of 8 points. The first was on a pass from Glenn to Charles Masterson; the second was run over by McCutchen; the third came on a run by Masterson; the fourth was a pass from Glenn to Corley.

First Quarter

The Bulldogs dominated the first quarter after taking McCutchen's kickoff. With Tim Hamilton at quarterback, most of the handoffs went to Ronnie Finley and Stanley Hackfield. These two boys were the workhorses in the Bulldog backfield, but they couldn't make a 1st down on their three tries and had to punt. Bronte took over on their 31. The Longhorns couldn't go either and Corley punted to the Loraine 31.

It looked as though the Bulldogs were on their way to paydirt as Hackfield took a pass for a 1st on the 41, then moved on the ground for another 1st on Bronte's 43. Finley made 9 and Hackfield added enough for a 1st on the 31. Another 9 yard gainer was credited to Hackfield,

and then a penalty of 5 yards could well have been the factor which kept the zero on the scoreboard for Loraine. They moved the ball down to Bronte's 23 where the Longhorn defense held on a 4th down try for 1 yard.

McCutchen carried twice, behind Brian Richards blocking, for 16 and a 1st; then Masterson went 14 yards for another 1st on the Bulldog 47. Masterson made 3 more and a pass, Glenn to Corley, was good for a 1st on the 25.

Second Quarter

Masterson went for 13 yards and a 1st, and after losing a yard Glenn cocked his tossing arm and Corley was ready for the touchdown play. Glenn tossed another pass to Masterson for the extras, and the scoreboard finally got some business, 8-0.

Loraine got stalled after the kickoff, thanks to fine Longhorn defense and a 15 yarder for holding. They punted to Glenn on their 45 and he ran it back to the 26. Glenn picked up 5, then the Longhorns were dealt a 15 yard holding penalty. McCutchen made an effort to pick up the 20 yards needed, but couldn't make it, so the Bulldogs took over on their 25 yard line.

The Bulldogs tried two ground plays, Corley blocked a pass try and they punted. It went to Masterson who took it all the way to the Loraine 35, but a clip moved the ball back to the Longhorn 25, a loss of 40 yards. Masterson ran for 9½ yards, then a pass and run play, Glenn to Corley, took the football over the Loraine goal line for 6 points. McCutchen went around left end for the EP, making the score 16-0.

Hackfield took McCutchen's

kick on the 5 and ran it out to the 26. After 2 incomplete passes Hamilton threw one to Glenn on the 47, and he went 11 yards to 36. It wasn't the right time of the day for the Longhorns, however, and the ball went over. The first play for Loraine gave the ball back to the Longhorns, with Corley recovering a fumble. One holding penalty later the Longhorns wound up with the ball and a 1st down at midfield.

Once again the Longhorns couldn't move and Loraine took over on their 41. A run and a penalty against Bronte gave the Bulldogs a 1st on the Longhorn 40. Two plays later Masterson intercepted a Loraine pass and was downed on the Bronte 45, but a Bulldog penalty moved it to their 40 yard line.

McCutchen went for 12 and a 1st at the 28. A pass from Glenn to Randy Barbee, who pitched the ball to McCutchen, was good for a 1st down around the 10. A penalty moved the ball all the way back to the 28. Glenn ran for 9, and then a pass was intercepted, but a red flag was on the ground and Loraine was penalized down to the 10. Two incomplete passes gave the ball to Loraine and one play was run before halftime.

Score 16-0.

Third Quarter

The kickoff went to Barbee who was downed on the 35. Masterson, McCutchen and Glenn all contributed yardage to a drive to the Loraine 20 where a fumble gave the ball to the host team. The Loraine lads made a 1st, then had to punt. McCutchen took it to midfield and ran back to the Bulldog 35. The Longhorns penetrated deep to the 7 yard line. With a 4th and 4 to go, a fumble took a Loraine roll but was recovered on the 20. However, the Bulldogs took over on downs anyway.

The Bulldogs were able to make only 4 yards before they had to punt. Hackfield's kick went to McCutchen on the 39, he ran up the right side past midfield, cut across and was long gone for a 70 yard touchdown play. Masterson went around left end for 2 and the score was 24-0. Only time for the kickoff was left on the clock.

Fourth Quarter

Once again the Longhorn line held the Bulldogs and they punted to the Bronte 45. A penalty moved the Longhorns back to the 30. McCutchen made 15 yards for a 1st on the 45. A Glenn to Corley pass was good for 5, and Masterson went 6 more for a 1st on Loraine's 44. Glenn went a short ten and two tries later with the help of a fumble Loraine took over on the 35.

In the next series of downs, the Bulldogs suffered a 15 yard penalty which forced them to pass. Masterson was waiting for it and carried it to the Bulldog 15 before he was pulled down. Masterson then went 11 yards for a 1st on the 4. A penalty moved the ball to the 2, and from that point McCutchen went through the middle for the final counter of the night. Glenn passed to Corley for the extras and the scoreboard read 32-0.

Time was growing short as Terry Brewer took the kickoff and went down on the 31 yard line. A fumble was covered by David Gentry to give the locals the ball. A long pass to Corley from Glenn was no good, as the Bulldog defenders had the lanky Longhorn well covered. After all the damage he had already done them. Masterson went for 8, but the Longhorns were unable to make the other 2 yards and Loraine took over.

Skip Row Practice Okayed By USDA

Cotton farmers, and particularly those in West Texas, won the "skip row battle" which has been underway since 1965 when the White House announced last Wednesday afternoon that the method of measuring cotton acreage would revert to the system used in 1962-65.

The big gripe of cotton farmers was brought about when the Department of Agriculture ruled that the common practice of planting two rows and skipping two must be counted as solid cotton in computing acres. The former methods used allowed the farmer to count only the two rows which were used for cotton.

Cotton farmers argued that the skip row method of planting is an effective tool for increasing yields in areas of low rainfall. They and their representatives in the Congress argued that farmers in other areas were not penalized for using irrigation, fertilizers, insecticides, which, also, are used to increase yield.

Congressman Omar Burleson was reported as saying "I am extremely happy we have returned to this approved and historic procedure." He sent the following telegram to this newspaper announcing the decision:

"Oct. 11 White House announces this afternoon that the skip row regulation now in effect will be returned to 1965 program with no penalty for the historic skip row practice. The announcement also includes reduction in both voluntary and mandatory diversion acres as well as payment."
