Trent Coming Here For Saturday Game

The mighty Longhorns are expected to roll one step further toward the District 4-B championship this weekend when they will play host to the Trent Gorillas.

Saturday Game

Special attention is called to the change in the date for the game. In order to accommodate the expected Homecoming crowd which will be here for the weekend, the game was moved from Friday to Saturday night. Kickoff time will be 8 p.m.

The Longhorns will be in good shape for the game, even though Keith Moris and Don Hageman are not quite up to top strength.

The week's Harris rating leaves the Longhorns in top spot among Class B schools in Texas. Playing strength remains the same as it has been the past three weeks, 110.3. Trent rests in the No. 31 spot in the state with a playing

strength of 72.2.

Coach Cecil Toliver said Wednesday that his team expects a victory Saturday night, "but Trent always plays us a good ball game." The coach added that his charges are ready for the Gorillas, and that they plan to please the big Homecoming crowd expected to be on hand for the action.

Bronte Marine Lance Corporal Tommy Hallmark has received the Purple Heart for wounds received in battle in Vietnam. His aunt, Mrs. Zell Moore, reported that she had received a letter from him this week which stated that his wounds were not serious and that he has already returned to duty with a reconnaissance unit.

She said he wrote that he received shrapnel wounds in his right foot, right side and left knee.

Another letter received later this week said the young Marine had figured out that he had only 41 more days to serve in the Southeast Asia area, and then he will head for the U.S. He has already received his orders and will report to Yuma, Ariz., for duty after he returns.

Longhorns Whip Hermleigh, 38-0

Bronte's high-flying Longhorns took another victory last Friday night when they invaded the stadium of the Hermleigh Cardinals and came home with a 38-0 victory. The win was the sixth of the season and maintained their record of allowing no scores in district play.

The Longhorns, after a rather uncolorful first half, which had only two touchdowns, played some pretty good football after the halftime rest period.

Doug McCutchen scored four of the counters, while David Glenn carried across for one. Extra points were carried across by McCutchen, Charles Masterson Glenn, and by Davis Corley who pulled in a pass from Glenn.

First Quarter

Bronte received the kickoff and it went to McCutchen on the 10. He went down on the 33. Masterson went twice for almost 10 and Glenn moved it on to the 48 for a 1st. Bronte drew a five yard penalty and Glenn hit McCutchen with a pass for 22 yards and a 1st on the Cardinal 35. Glenn kept twice for a 13 yard gainer and a 1st on the 22. A penalty moved the ball back to the 27. McCutchen carried for 6 and then for 20 more to the 1 yard line. From there Glenn took it into royal soil for the first touchdown. McCutchen ran over 2 extras and the scoreboard read 8-0.

McCutchen's kick went to Billy Joe Odstreil who was pulled down on the 40 by Masterson. Tommy Chorn and Danny Peterson carried the ball, but on 3rd down, James Vaughn got the tackle which forced the Cardinals to punt. It went to Masterson and he was pulled in on the Bronte 48 yard line.

McCutchen made 7 on two runs, and on 3rd down Glenn tossed a bullet to Corley who made it a 1st on the Cardinal 36. A holding penalty put the Longhorns in the hole and after 3 unsuccessful pass tries, the Longhorns called for a Corley punt. It was almost blocked and went

short, settling on the Hermleigh 35.

Chorn and Peterson alternated the carrying chores and made two 1st downs, but at the end of the quarter the host team was faced with a 4th and 6 on the Bronte 39 yard line.

Second Quarter

Chorn punted to the 5 yard line where the ball died. Glenn ran for 6 yards, then McCutchen got loose for 25 and a 1st on the 36. Masterson then made a fine gainer to the Cardinal 35, but a clipping penalty hurt and the ball was brought back to the Bronte 33. McCutchen felt the loss should be recouped, however, and ran to the Hermleigh 36 for a 1st. The Longhorns continued their march down to around the 20 yard line. A loose ball was picked up by the home team and the Cardinals took over on their 30.

A couple of plays later, the Cardinals returned the favor and McCutchen recovered for the Longhorns on the same 30. McCutchen made 13 yards on two carries moving the ball to the 17. Masterson made 3, McCutchen added 1, and then he went around the right end for another Bronte touchdown. Try for points was no good. Score: 14-0.

McCutchen kicked to Chorn on the 5 and he went out to the 27 where Manfred Thompson and Keith Morris stopped him. Hermleigh was penalized 15 yards on the next series, but Chorn got off a fine run and almost made a 1st before Randy Barbee and McCutchen tagged him. Chorn punted out on the Bronte 47, short because it was almost blocked by Victor Brock. Three plays netted little gain and Corley kicked the ball into the endzone for a touchback.

A 15 yarder against Bronte helped considerably in giving the Cardinals a 1st on the 43. Good gains by Chorn and a long run by Peterson netted Hermleigh a 1st down on the Bronte 35. The next series brought up a 3rd and 6

situation, so quarterback Ronnie Helm called a pass play. Glenn was in the way and intercepted the ball. However, it didn't count as the Longhorns drew a 5 yard penalty to give the Cardinals a 3rd and 1. Chorn moved the ball to the 25 for another 1st, and it looked as though the Cardinals might be ready for a score-making seige against the big Longhorn line. Hopes were short lived, however, for another pass was intercepted, this time by Barbee on the 6 yard line. The clock showed the game was half over, and the scoreboard read 14-9.

Third Quarter

McCutchen kicked to Chorn near the goal line and he was pulled down on the 30 by McCutchen and Ronald Cooper. The Cardinals made 9 yards in 3 plays but thought it best to punt on the 4th. The ball came to rest on the 29 of Bronte. McCutchen went 13 yards for a 1st on the 41. Masterson and Glenn moved the ball to the Hermleigh 49 for a 1st. Ground gains moved the ball on to the 39 for another 1st, then Glenn tossed the ball to Barbee on the 22. It proved to be a nice setup for the local lads, as McCutchen took the ball and followed his blockers into the end zone. Corley took Glenn's pass for the extras, and the score stood at 22-0.

It didn't take long for the Bronte boys to be back in scoring position. After the kickoff and 3 plays, the Cardinals were in punt formation, but Brock got to Chorn before he could get it off, and the Longhorns took over on the 25.

Masterson made 3, and Glenn went for 14 for a 1st and goal on the 8. Glenn almost got trapped on a pass try, but ran the ball to the 4. Masterson pushed to the 2. Glenn battled to the 1, and McCutchen went the final yard across the double stripe. Masterson went around right side for the extra points. Score: 30-0.

The Longhorns kicked off and Chorn ran 3 times for a 1st on the 40, and made 4 more yards when the quarter was over.

Fourth Quarter

Chorn kept his gains going and moved the ball to the Bronte 42 for another 1st down. Helm and Odstreil carried the ball for another 1st on the Bronte 32. Morris trapped Peterson for a loss on 2nd down, bringing up 3rd and 10. A pass was tried, but again Barbee intercepted at about the 25 yard line and ran it all the way back to the Cardinals 45.

Masterson took a pass and fancy stepped his way to the 32. McCutchen went for another 1st on the 18, and then he went around the left side, eluded his pursuers and went the needed yards to pay dirt. Glenn ran the extras to make the score 38-0.

McCutchen's kick went to Ted Winter who was tackled on the 26 by Nicky Arrott. A 15 yard penalty, plus stalwart defenders, Brian Richards, Garland Richards, Brock, David Gentry, Barbee, Morris and Vaughn added up to a 4th and 12 in a few minutes. The punt went short to Glenn on the 50, and he carried it to the Cardinal 40.

With Cooper quarterbacking, he, Nicky Arrott and Steve Williams made short yardage, but had to punt. Corley came in to do the honors and booted to the 25. The Cardinals couldn't go and Chorn punted to Masterson. The ball was put in play on the Bronte 42.

A pass from Cooper to Willie Zuniga was good for 4 and Arrott picked up 3, but the Longhorns had to punt. Barbee kicked it out on the Hermleigh 36. The Cardinals got off two plays before the final gun.

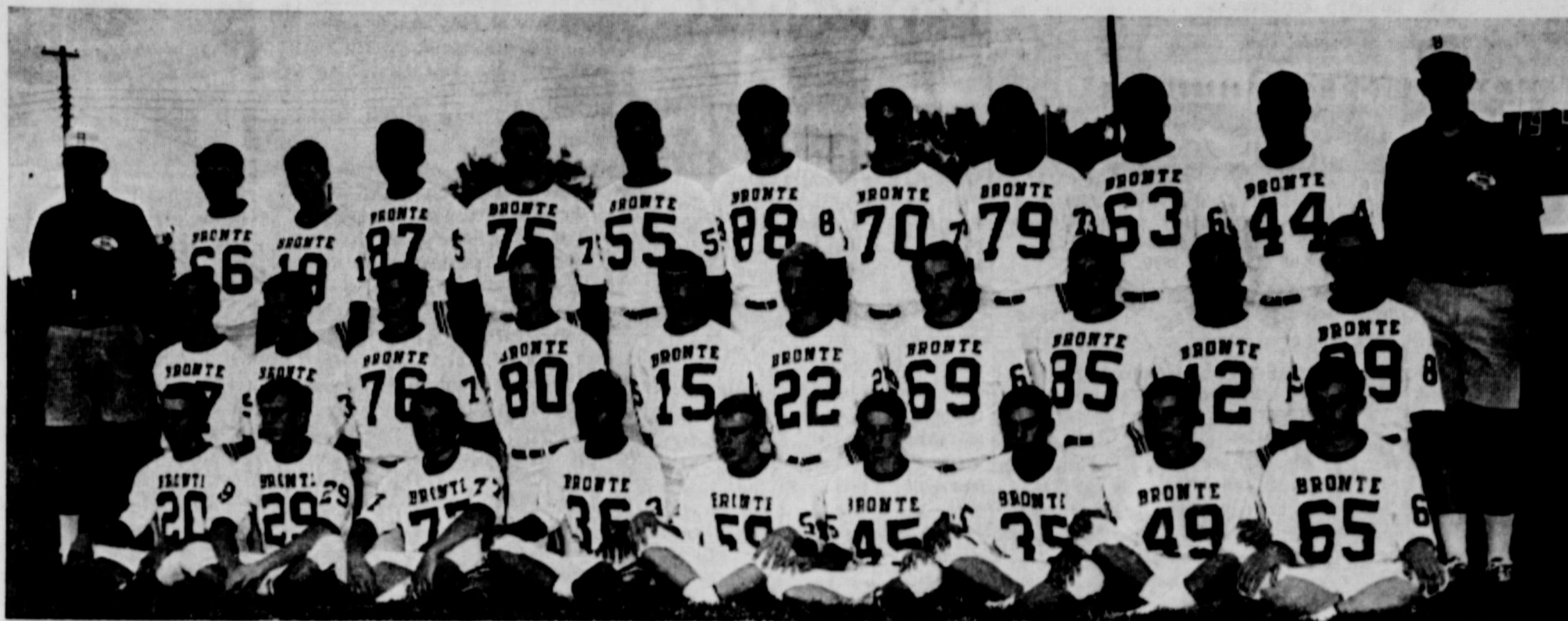

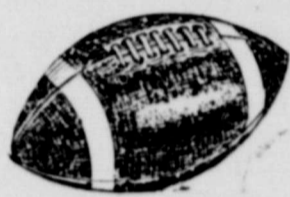
