Traffic between Bronte and Monahans is likely to be heavy Saturday morning as a host of football fans travel to see their champion Bronte Longhorns take on the Fort Hancock Mustangs in a bi-district playoff.

The meeting with the Mustangs is a repeat of last year, when the Longhorns met them in Crane and mopped up the boys from far West Texas, 38-12. Needless to say, this year's Longhorns are looking for a repeat on the score, also.

Coach Cecil Toliver said Tuesday that the Longhorns are in

great shape and are looking forward to a confrontation with Fort Hancock. "All our injuries have healed during the past week, and the boys are really in high spirits," said Toliver.

The contest Saturday will be played in Estes Memorial Field, beginning at 2:30 p.m. Admission price will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for students. The west bleachers will be the Bronte side of the field.

Results of the game will determine who is bi-district champion of Districts 3B and 4B, and who gets to play the winner of the

Vega-Wilson encounter for regional championship honors. Vega and Wilson tee off at 2 p.m. Thursday in Plainview. If Vega and Bronte win the two games, the regional tilt would also be a repeat of last year when Bronte met Vega at Brownfield. The Longhorns of the North slipped by the Longhorns of Bronte, 27-22.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said that Monahans has a fine football facility, and he believes Bronte football squad and fans will enjoy using it for their bi-district game. Monahans citizens will provide programs, tickets, announcers and other material and personnel for carrying on the game.

A chartered bus carrying the football squad will leave Bronte at 7:45 a.m. Saturday. It will be followed at 9 a.m. by buses carrying the band and cheerleaders. Barbee said football players and band members will eat at McLain's Restaurant on Highway 80 West following the game.

Band Rates III At Odessa Meet

The Bronte Longhorn Marching Band received a division III rating at the Region VI UIL marching contest last Saturday in Odessa. The band came out in the middle of all Class B bands, with four rated above and four below it.

Band Director Russell Fuller said criticism sheets filled out by the judges stressed that the band played very well for the instrumentation it had. The critics hit hard at the fact that the Bronte Band did not have ample low brass — baritones, basses and French horns. "These deficiencies were caused partly by ineligibility of some of our low brass players because of grades and partly because of the low number of this type horn in the band," Fuller said.

Fuller added that he was very proud of the band members, "as they came through under pressure and did a real fine job."

"The III rating is remarkable," the director said, "since almost half of these students had never been in a marching contest before, including all the cornet section and most of the trombone section."

Fuller and the band expressed their thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Noel Brevard who accompanied them to Odessa and supported them in the contest.

OF COURSE, WE KNOW THAT TIMES CHANGE. With changes come different expressions, just as we hear new tunes and have new dances.

SOMETIMES SOME OF THESE THINGS sound somewhat foreign. It causes one to wonder if we are importing ideas, rather than exporting them.

IT HAS BEEN POINTED OUT THAT the famous quotes from Nathan Hale, Patrick Henry and others have been practically dropped from all textbooks. In nine of the new texts, the reply of John Paul Jones to the British demand for surrender, "I have not yet begun to fight," does not even appear.

TODAY WE HAVE A NEW SET OF HEROES. Their names are Glenn and Grissom, Shepard, Carpenter, Shirra and Cooper. These heroes are from nice, small towns with names like Sparta, Boulder, East Derry, Mitchell and Shawnee. Maybe these men are squares and maybe the reason is they have lived too far from the sophisticated influences to keep from becoming squares. For who but a square would volunteer his life for his country's good? This would be the opinion of some of those who want to make fun of a square, but not these squares. We can be thankful there are still some and hope there will be a great deal more.

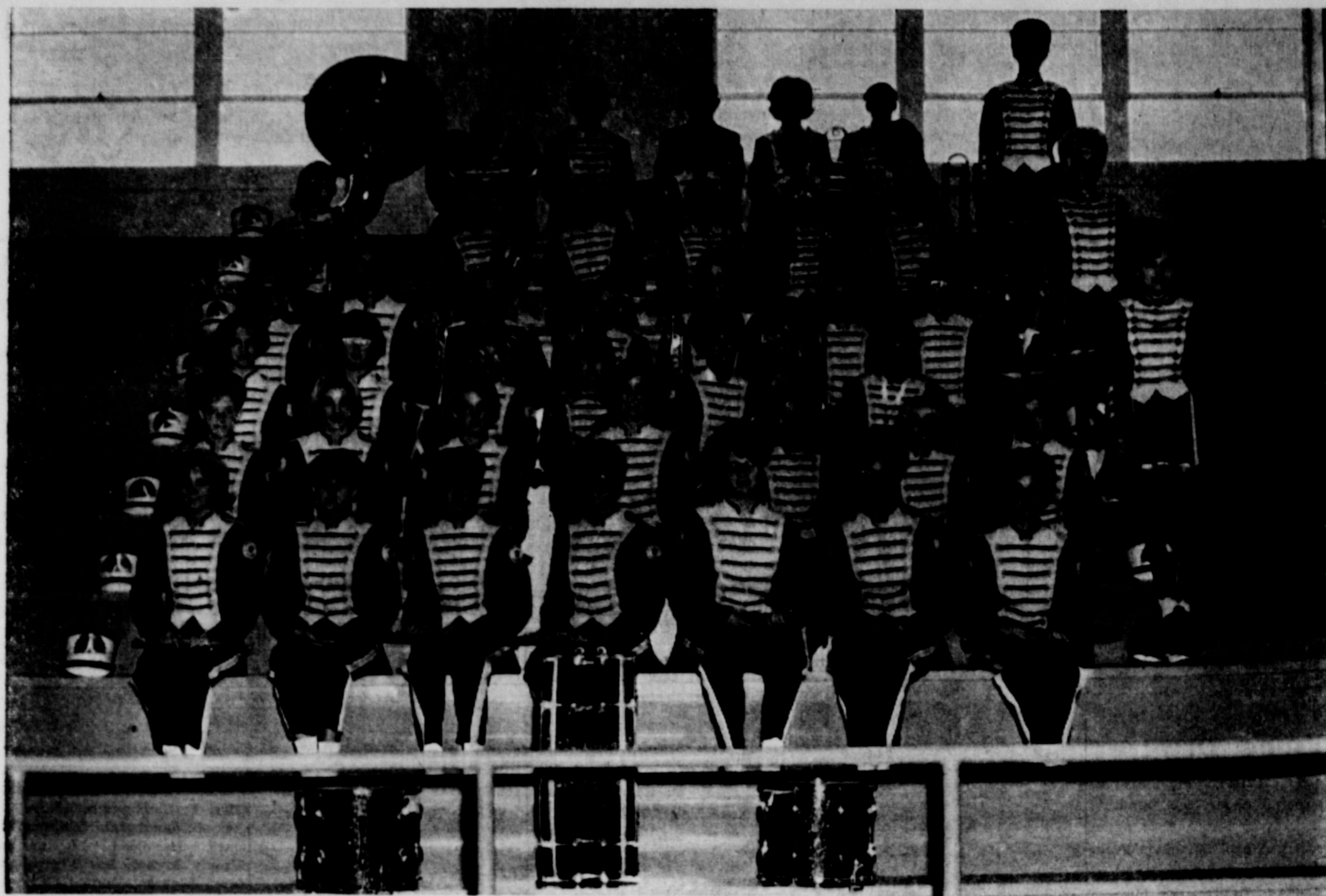

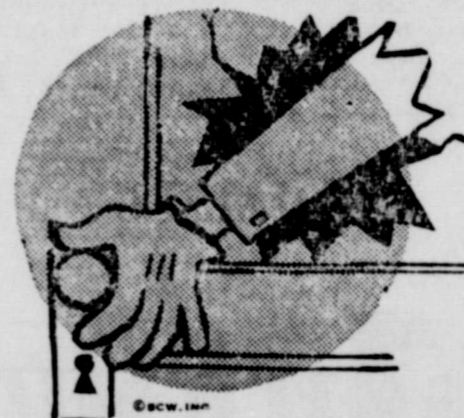

Here is a recipe that might be used as a means of using up leftover chicken or turkey from Thanksgiving dinner.

Try this:

Chicken or Turkey Taco Pie

- 3 to 4 cups diced chicken or turkey
- 1 can enchilada sauce
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- Dash pepper
- 11-ounce package corn chips
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1 cup chicken broth

Combine chicken, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup, onion, garlic salt and pepper. Grease a 2-quart baking dish and line with corn chips. Add chicken mixture sprinkle with grated cheese and cover with corn chips. Pour 1 cup chicken broth over mixture. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Serves 6. This dish freezes well. If frozen, bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 1/2 hours.

Other recipes ranging from Creole A La Louisiana to Hot Poultry Salad and Texas Fried Chicken are available at cost at any county Extension office in a newly published "All-Time Favorites — Chicken and Turkey."

Also included in the booklet is information on selecting and storing poultry, as well as carving, cooking and serving it. Poultry is fun for the cook and eater as well as easy on the budget.

present on other occasions during the two day celebration.

Central Baptist Church is a Missionary Baptist Church and is affiliated with the Fairland Baptist Association and the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas. The church was begun Feb. 28, 1904, and named Kickapoo Baptist Church. Early meetings were held in a building near present Bronte School, which was sold to the Church of Christ about 1915.

A new building was completed in 1924, and it burned in the spring of 1926. In the fall of 1926 another new building was completed about four miles north of Bronte. This structure housed the congregation until 1955 when the present building was completed in Bronte.

The educational wing, on the back of the building was completed in 1959. Since that time new pews have been added, new pulpit chairs have been purchased and new carpeting and pew cushions have been added.

The name of the church was changed in 1962 from Kickapoo Baptist Church to Central Baptist Church.

Members told The Enterprise this week that the building and all furnishings are free of debt, and they feel this is a good time for the Thanksgiving and Dedication Services.
