Friday is the big day for Bronte's championship football team. The Longhorns will meet the Wilson Mustangs at 7:30 p.m. at Tiger Stadium in Snyder to decide the Class B championship for this area of West Texas.

Wilson won the right to play in this game when the Mustangs defeated Vega, 41-0, in a bi-district playoff held on Thanksgiving Day. Bronte gained its berth in this contest when the Longhorns downed Fort Hancock, 48-0, last Saturday.

Mayor Royce Lee has proclaimed Friday as Bronte Longhorn Regional Championship Day, and the text of the proclamation is being run on this page of The Enterprise. The mayor pointed out that the activities of the

Longhorns this year have brought more recognition to Bronte than could have been had with the expenditure of any amount of money or the work of any chamber of commerce. He said, "Speaking for the citizens of Bronte, I am proud to congratulate every member of the team, the coaches and anyone else who has contributed to making this great football team what it is."

Still No. 1

The Longhorns will go into the regional playoff with its No. 1 rating in the State of Texas, a position it has enjoyed since the first Harris Ratings came out at the beginning of the 1967 season.

According to the Harris calculations, Bronte has a playing strength of 110.3. Wilson, Harris

says, rates the No. 10 spot among Class B schools of Texas, and has a playing strength of 89.7.

Coach Cecil Toliver said he didn't feel that the playing ability of the two teams was as far apart as indicated by the ratings. In fact, he told The Enterprise Tuesday that his club would be playing a team "as tough as anybody we've played this season."

"They've got a good ball club," the coach continued, "and have a 10-1 record this season." The Mustangs' only loss was a 27-20 defeat by Anton. Toliver said the Wilson lads do lots of passing. He expressed confidence in the ability of his boys to cope with the situation, however.

Head coach of the Mustangs is Bobby Davis and assistants are Al Mitts and Mickey Rundell.

Bonfire Thursday

A bonfire and pep rally will be held Thursday at 7:45 p.m. on the parking lot north of Stephenson Field. Students will start gathering material for the big rally and fire Wednesday afternoon.

Another pep rally will be held in the school gymnasium at 1:40 p.m. Friday. School will be dismissed immediately following the rally. The football bus will leave at 2 p.m., followed by the band and cheerleader buses at 4 p.m. Route to be used will take them through Sweetwater, Roscoe, Hermleigh and on to Snyder.

Plans call for the football boys to eat at Sallie's restaurant, while band members will eat at Ballard's Cafeteria.

Carlos' Little Mexico Restaurant called the Enterprise and extended a special invitation to Bronte fans to eat there. An ad in this issue gives details. Supt. C. B. Barbee said that a number of nice eating places can be found in Snyder.

Bronte merchants are loading their stores with Christmas gift items. Look them over early.

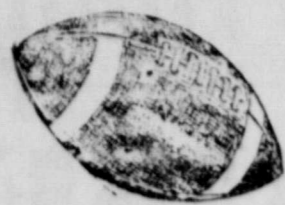
Basketball Getting Off The Ground

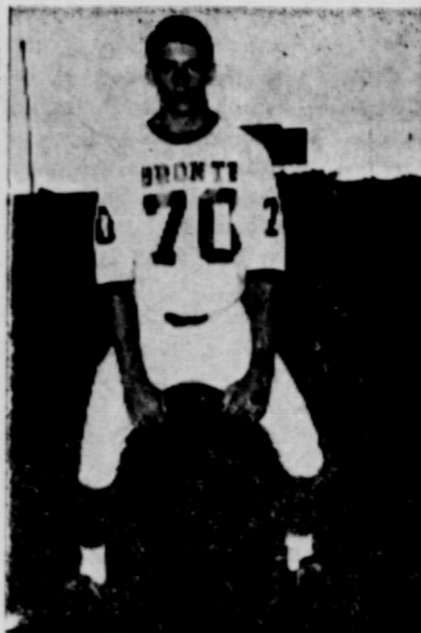

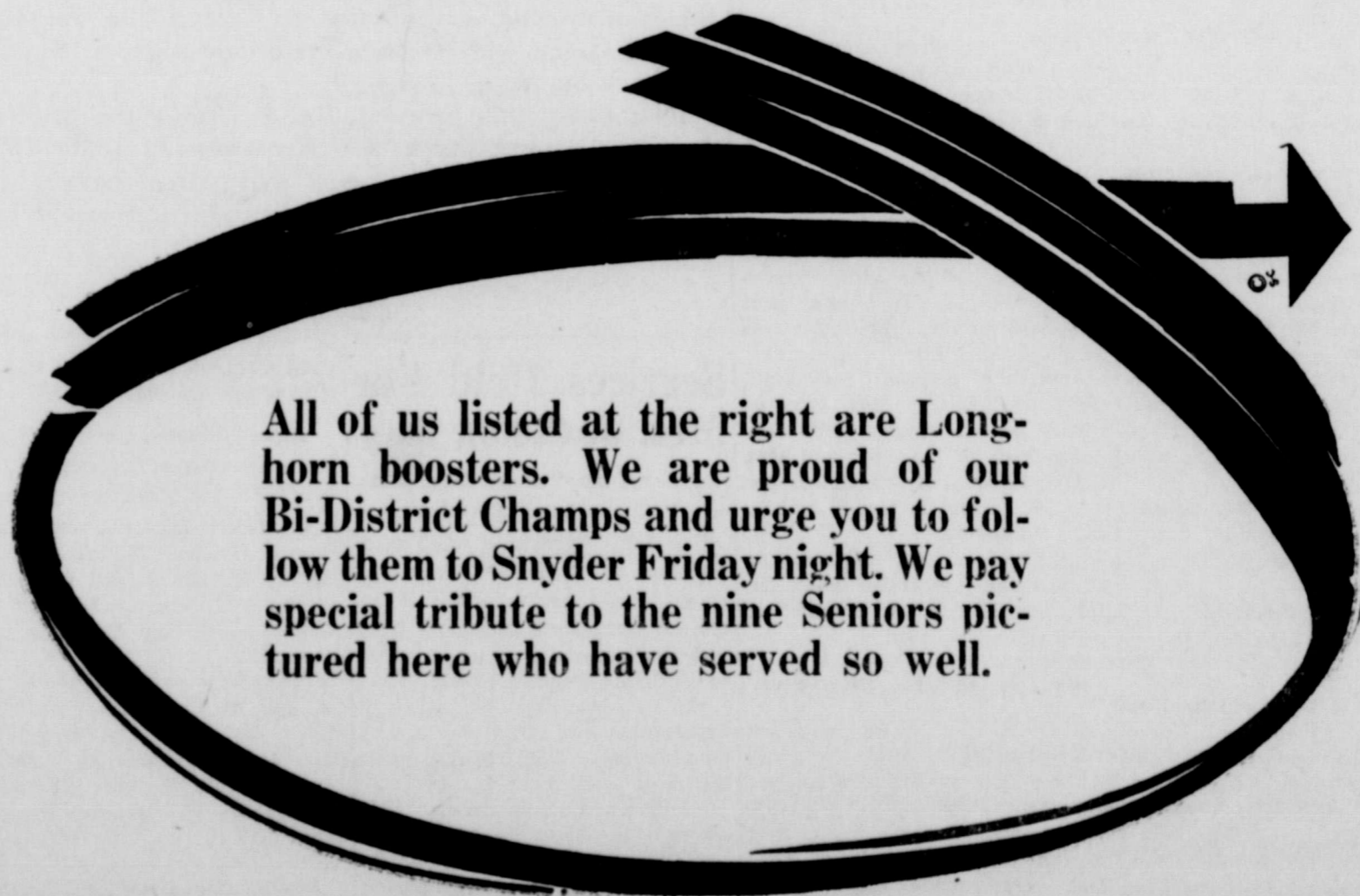

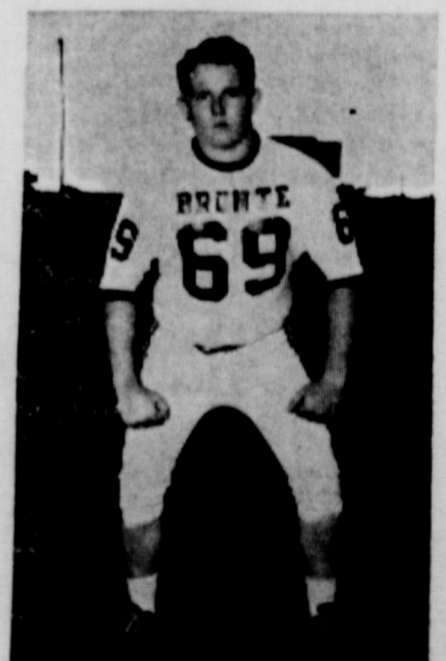

Longhorns Capture Bi-District Crown

The mighty Longhorns continued their winning ways last Saturday in Estes Memorial Stadium at Monahans, where they wiped out the Fort Hancock Mustangs, 48-0, in a bi-district playoff. The win paved the way for the Longhorns to meet Wilson in a regional championship game which has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Friday in Snyder.

Bronte Tailback Doug McCutchen had a better than average day as he ran roughshod over the Mustangs. His superb ball carrying behind the season's outstanding job of downfield blocking netted the Longhorns 42 points. The other six were made on conversions, two by Quarterback David Glenn and one by Wingback Charles Mas-

erson. McCutchen's dashes for paydirt came on carries of 1, 6, 52, 31, 58, 10 and 84 yards.

The Longhorn defense held the Mustangs to 144 yards rushing and 36 yards passing. Bone jarring tackles shook the Fort Hancock lads loose from the ball three times, resulting in Bronte recoveries.

First Quarter

The Mustangs won the toss but elected to take the wind and give the Longhorns the football. Masterson took the kick but got tripped up on the 13 with almost no return. The local lads set up their operations at that point and marched down the field with steady gains on every carry. A total of 17 plays covered the needed yardage, with two 5 yard

penalties against the Mustangs and one on the Longhorns occurring on the drive. McCutchen, Glenn and Masterson pretty well took turns carrying the ball and chalked up five 1st downs. With a 1st and goal on the 9, McCutchen went to the 2. There the Mustang defense tightened up as Glenn went only a yard and McCutchen a couple of feet on 2nd and 3rd. However, McCutchen's 4th down try was sufficient, as he plowed across from the 1 foot line. Glenn went around the right side for the extras, and the score was 8-0 with 5:25 left on the clock.

McCutchen's kickoff went to Robert Galindo, who fumbled the ball but recovered and was nailed on the 24. Porky Jimenez was

calling signals for the Mustangs, and the 1st offensive play of the game for them saw Bronte draw a 15 yard penalty and move the ball to the 42. The Mustangs' try, however, was cut short when a fumble was recovered by Masterson on the FH 49 yard line. A penalty helped the Longhorns to the 44, then Glenn was apparently down behind the line of scrimmage, but the second effort paid off as he got loose and went 11 yards to the 33 for a 1st. McCutchen went for 4, Masterson for 6 more on the 23, Manfred Thompson picked up 3, then a recovered fumble moved the ball back to the 26 and gave the Longhorns a 3rd and 13. The next play saw Glenn do a beautiful piece of faking as he got off a nice pass to Masterson for a 1st down on the 6. The next play was all McCutchen wanted for another Longhorn touchdown. The try for points was another pretty fake, as the Mustang defense all went for Masterson and Glenn skipped around the left

end untouched for 2 points. Score: 16-0.

The kickoff went to Freddy Alvarez and Keith Morris saw to it that he was placed in a prone position on the 9 yard line. Craig Miller went for 4 before Brian Richards pulled him in, then Banny Parada carried for 4 and Richards and Victor Brock nailed him. Miller carried for almost 2, but it was short of a 1st. The Mustangs gambled and went for the 1st, as Parada scooted to the 28 to make it good.

Second Quarter

The Mustangs had a drive going as a couple of yards were picked up, then a pass to Parada was good for another 1st on the 41. Apparently the Mustangs felt they had to pass, for another aerial to Frank McCoy was good for another 1st down on the Bronte 33. Once again the tough Longhorn defense jarred the ball carrier loose and Davis Corley recovered for the locals on the

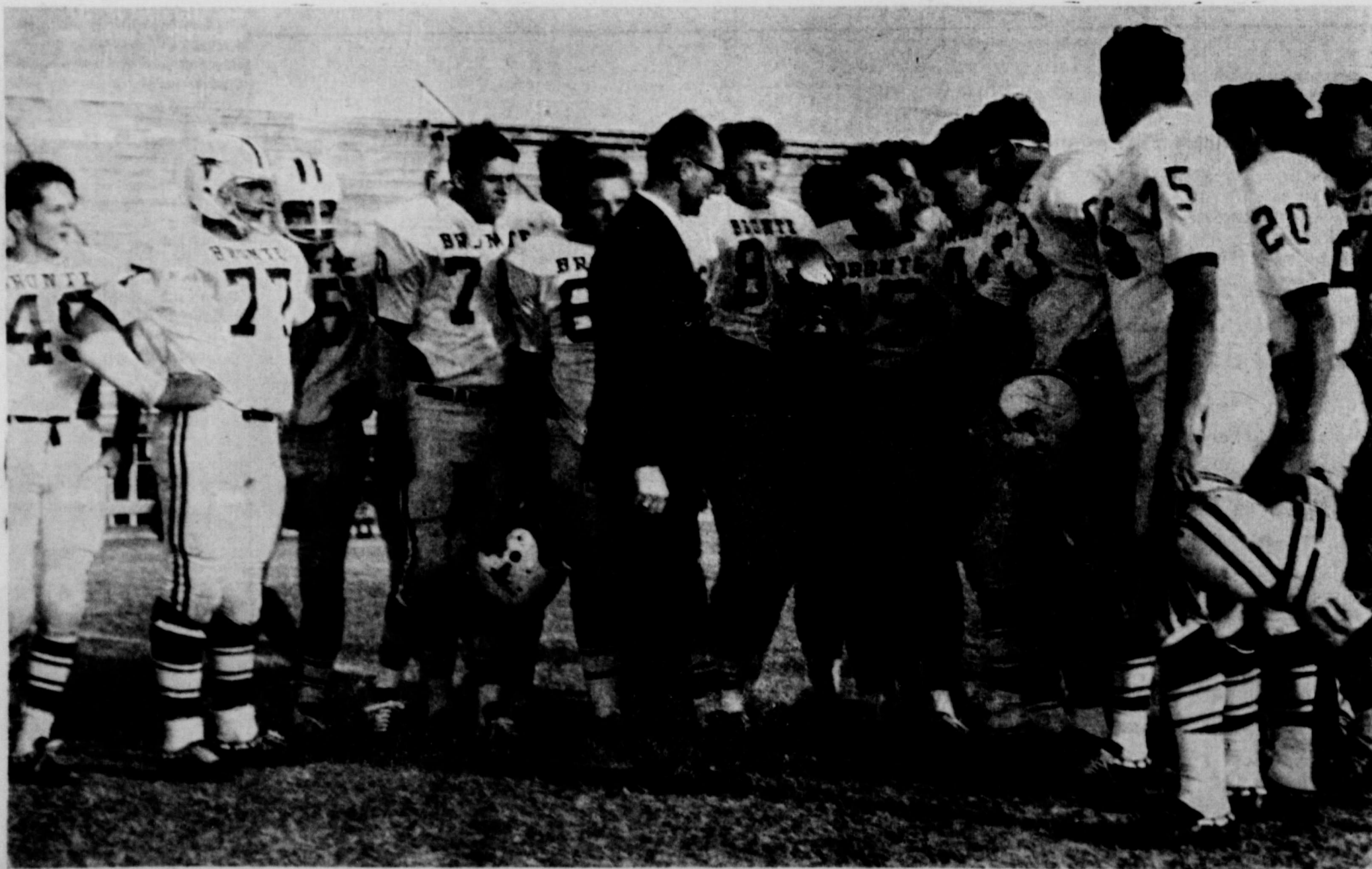

34. Glenn made 6 and McCutchen added 13 for the 1st on the Mustang 47. A penalty moved the ball back to the Longhorn 48 and an incomplete pass brought up 2nd and 15. The 52 yards to the double stripe looked like a long way, but McCutchen came around the right side, following some

fine blocking, and covered the distance with no sweat. Masterson went around the right side for 2 and the score was 24-0.

McCutchen's kick went to Miller on the 3 and he was pulled in on the 25. Masterson knocked down a pass, the center of the line held for no gain on 2nd down, and Victor Brock stopped Miller for 2 on the 3rd down. Dale Wiseman punted out on the Bronte 28.

Masterson went for 3 and Glenn went 10 more for a 1st on the 41. Bronte drew a clipping penalty to move the ball back to the 34. Glenn got off a beautiful run on the next down to travel 35 yards to the Mustang 31. This put the Longhorns in scoring position, as McCutchen took the ball and made the needed yardage. Try for points failed and the scoreboard read 30-0.

A kickoff went to Galindo who was downed on the 33 yard line. Rudy Luera took over the FH quarterbacking job and he immediately started having trouble with Corley. The lanky Longhorn end came through on two occasions to throw him for losses of 6 and 4 yards. The single gainer in the series was 3 yards by Alvarez. The punt went to McCutchen and the Bronte interference lined up ahead of him to mow down the defenders as he dashed up the east sideline for the full 58 yards for another Longhorn TD. It was sensational. A try for extra points was no good and the score stood at 36-0.

Coach Cecil Toliver sent in a fresh team to battle the 3B champs, and David Scott started the action with a kickoff to Alvarez who was bottled up on the

29. The Mustang offense got a good drive going and made four 1st downs as they moved down to the Bronte 22. The clock was ticking dangerously close to the end of the half, and a couple of desperation passes went incomplete to conclude the half.

Third Quarter

The Mustangs tried to outfox the Longhorns with an onside kick and they almost succeeded, but the Longhorns managed to keep possession of the ball. Three plays moved it to the Mustang 34 for a 1st down. Glenn went through for 13 and a 1st on the 21, and Masterson picked up 11 for another 1st on the 10. Once again it was scoring time as McCutchen went around left side for the counter. Conversion failed as the scoreboard said 42-0.

Scott's kick went to Dale Wiseman who was nailed with small runback by Jim Arrott. Two short gains were made, but 3rd down was unfruitful, so a punt was called for. It was a beauty as it sailed 51 yards to the Bronte 8. Masterson picked up good yardage, but a fumble on the next play on the 21 yard line gave the Mustangs their biggest break of the ball game.

Miller was the principal ball carrier as the Fort Hancock boys moved down to the Bronte 10. Luera faded to pass, but again Corley was a thorn in his flesh as he grounded the quarterback for an 8 yard loss. With a 4th down situation, the Mustangs set up to try a field goal. It was a deception, however, as the ball went to the would-be kicker who tried a pass. Masterson knocked it down for an incompleton. Thompson and Masterson carried to the 16. It was from there that McCutchen made his most sensational run of the afternoon. He went 84 yards as he swept to the left, then cut back upfield, leaving three defenders wondering what happened. Conversion was no good and the score read 48-0.

The kick went to Parada who was downed on the 41. A penalty moved it back to the 25, making the down No. 2 with 25 to go. Luera did most of the ball carrying, but good defending by Roger Graves and Danny Parker brought up a punting situation. Bronte was penalized for roughing the kicker, so FH retained possession of the ball. A couple of plays later another 15 yarder moved the ball to the Bronte 35. The drive was stopped on the 26 yard line, short of the needed 1st down.

Fourth Quarter

Bronte took over, and a pass from Glenn to Corley was good for 41 yards and a 1st on the Mustang 33. The Longhorns couldn't make their 1st down, so McCutchen tried a field goal but it was blocked. The Mustangs tried three times and punted, but B. Richards got in the way and blocked the try, giving Bronte the ball on the 9. A Bronte pass was intercepted behind the goal line and run out to the 19. Miller went for 9, and a 6 yard gain by Luera gave the Mustangs a 1st on the 25. There, a fumble was recovered by Glenn to give the local lads the ball.

A couple of plays later Fort Hancock recovered a Bronte fumble on the 43. Two incomplete passes and a tackle by Graves and Garland Richards, coupled with a 5 yard penalty, brought up a 4th and 16 for the Mustangs. They didn't punt, however, as Miller carried to the 46. It wasn't good enough for a 1st and Bronte took over.

The Bronte boys tried three times and couldn't make the needed 10 yards. Willie Zuniga punted into the end zone to give the Mustangs the ball on the 20.

Luera moved out to the 33 for a 1st. He then lost 4 when Jim Arrott smothered him. Miller picked up 4, then Graves shoved Luera back for a 7 yard loss to

give the Mustangs a 4th and 17. The punt went out on the Bronte 40. Quarterback Cooper kept for 3, the Mustangs were penalized to their 38 and a pass to Zuniga moved the ball to the 25 for a 1st down. The clock said the ball game was over and the scoreboard said the Longhorns were bi-district champs with a score of 48-0.

The Longhorns showed more polish and effort in this contest than they have found necessary to show for some time. The reserves gave the Mustangs a fine battle, as they ably defended the best efforts of their opponents.

Defensive work was kept to a minimum, as the Longhorns controlled the ball most of the game. However, excellent defensive performances were turned in by Corley, B. Richards, Morris, Brock, Don Hageman, Thompson, Randy Barbee, Glenn, Masterson, McCutchen, Scott, Zuniga, Jim Arrott, Graves, Parker, James Vaughn, G. Richards and Cooper.
