The condemnation suit appeal which was heard by a six-man jury resulted in lowering an earlier award some \$347,859.84. The appeal, which was made by the Colorado River Municipal Water District, in its suit against Mrs. Helen Harris Wilcockson, et al, for 4,014.43 acres of land needed for the Robert Lee Reservoir, came after a three-man board awarded the defendants \$916,685.-95 last September.


CRMWD attorney James Rosser of Snyder filed an enhancement amendment claiming value presence of the lake. The jury awarded no damages to the remaining acreage because of the
