



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

## **Preschool Sessions** Set for Summer

Supt. C. B. Barbee announced this week that a Preschool Program will be in operation here this summer. The program will operate under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

The superintendent said that no preregistration will be required of students who are eligible to attend.

A priority system for selecting children who may attend the school has been announced, and anyone who has a question regarding the eligibility of his child should contact the school office. Barbee said he expects more applicants than the class will be able to accomodate; therefore, a priority system is necessary to select students who are in the greatest need of the special training.

The school will operate from June 3 to Aug. 2, with the exception of the week of July 7-12. There will be no expense to students. All needed material and a mid-morning snack will be furnished. Parents of students who attend will have to provide transportation to and from the school.
