## City Dads Adopt Budget Of \$60,000 For Year

A budget which totals \$60,477.46 was adopted by Bronte city council in a meeting last Friday night. This amount is the total expected to be spent from all funds which are set up for city operation.

The budget covers expenses of the city's fiscal year which runs from April 1, 1968, to March 31, 1969.

Total available funds for the city during this period is \$73,255.74, which is the total of balances on hand at the beginning of the year and expected income.

The city operated the following funds: waterworks, interest and sinking, general, sanitary sewer system, contingencies, social security and special sanitary sewer system.

## Services Held For Linton Crow, 72, Retired Engineer

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Friday in First Methodist Church for Linton Crow, 72, a resident of Bronte for the past nine years. He died late Wednesday after suffering an apparent heart attack.

The Rev. A. S. Masterson, Methodist pastor, officiated at the services and burial followed in Fairview Cemetery, under direction of Williams Funeral Home. Masonic rites were conducted at the graveside.

Mr. Crow was born Dec. 20, 1895, at Bastrop. He was married to Miss Mayme Franks June 27, 1919, at Elgin.

As an engineer with M. W. Kellogg Co., Mr. Crow's work took him all over the United States and to two foreign countries. Some of the places recalled by his family include Illinois, Ohio, Kansas, Indiana, Louisiana, California and Oklahoma. He also worked in Canada and was plant engineer in the construction of a refinery for a British oil company in England. The work in England was the last job he was on before his retirement about nine years ago, when he and Mrs. Crow moved to Bronte.

During World War II, he worked with the Atomic Energy Commission in Tennessee.

Mr. Crow was a veteran of World War I and was discharged as a lieutenant. He was a member of the 320th Tank Corps which was organized by the then Maj. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Mr. Crow was a member of the Christian Church and was a 32nd degree Mason.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Royce Lee of Bronte; one sister, Mrs. A. C. Bain of Medina; two grandchildren, Royce Linton and Melissa Lee.

## Robert Lee Woman In Critical Condition Following Shooting

(From Robert Lee Observer)

Mrs. M. J. Thomason, 39, of Robert Lee is in critical condition in a San Angelo hospital as the result of a gunshot wound in the lower abdomen. Her son, Richard Perry Thomason, 18, was charged in the court of Justice of the Peace Roy P. Ross with assault with intent to murder, in connection with the shooting.

The incident took place about 5:45 p.m. last Friday at the Thomason home in Robert Lee. Young Thomason was taken into custody shortly after the shooting and is in Coke County jail. His bond was set at \$5,000.

According to information gath-

ered by Sheriff Melvin Childress, who investigated the incident, shooting followed an argument over the use of an automobile.

Also injured was the youth's father, M. J. Thomason, who received head and ear injuries in a scuffle which preceded the shooting. Young Thomason also received a shoulder wound. He was treated at West Coke County Hospital and released to the custody of the sheriff.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Thomason received emergency treatment at West Coke County Hospital and then were transferred to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo, where Mrs. Thomason underwent sur-

gery.

Sheriff Childress has in his custody a .30.06 caliber rifle, which is the weapon alleged to have been used to fire the bullet which struck Mrs. Thomason. He also has a .22 caliber pistol, which was loaded with pellets.

The case will be brought up before the next session of the 51st District Court grand jury, which is scheduled for some time in August. However, there is a possibility that a grand jury will be called before that time.

The elder Thomason is an employee of Pan American Oil Co. and Mrs. Thomason is an employee of West Coke Hospital.

## Rabies Vaccination Set for Monday

Coke County 4-H Clubs will sponsor a rabies vaccination program next Monday, June 17. A veterinarian will make stops in both Robert Lee and Bronte as a convenience to pet owners with pets they would like to have immunized against rabies.

A licensed veterinarian from San Angelo will be in Robert Lee next Monday from 9-10 a.m. He will be located at the county show barn. He will move on to Bronte and be there from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. in the County Park.

This public health preventive measure is sponsored annually by Coke County 4-H Clubs. In order to help control the incidence of rabies, annual inoculations of pets with rabies vaccine is suggested.

Washington, D. C. — ON AUGUST 25, 1959, I introduced a Resolution in the Congress which would permit two companies of Marines to patrol the streets of Washington, which, of course, is a Federal City, in conjunction with the police.

AGAIN ON FEBRUARY 26, 1963 and July 14, 1965, the same Resolution was introduced and each of these was referred to the Armed Services Committee where it was opposed by the Defense Department. In fact, Departmental reports, including the District of Columbia Commissioners, were adverse to the passage of this measure.

AS TIME WENT ON it is common knowledge as to what happened and, finally, the Marines and Soldiers were called in to quell riots and looting.

ON THREE DIFFERENT occasions the House of Representatives passed legislation which would have the effect of nullifying many of the Supreme Court's decisions affecting arrest and prosecution of criminals. The Senate did not act.

AT LAST, THEY HAVE done so, and last week a bill was passed which has as its purpose to override certain Court judgments which have handicapped law enforcement and providing assistance to police enforcement in the States.

TITLE 1 of the bill provides planning grants and action grants to State and local law enforcement agencies to develop and strengthen the total service. Title II of the Bill seeks to give authority back to the trial courts that they may not be handicapped by these decisions which have given encouragement to the criminal as against the public interest. The tendency of the Federal Courts, and especially the Supreme Court, to disrupt the finality of State court decisions has eroded respect for law and diminished the fear of punishment.

ANOTHER IMPORTANT part of Title II says that the Supreme Court can not review the question of the voluntariness of a confession when the voluntary aspect has already been settled by the highest court of a State. Under the proposed legislation, the standard for admitting confessions as evidence will return to the time-tested standard of true voluntariness. It sets aside the inflexible and technical rules established in the so-called Mallory, Escobedo and Miranda cases.

TITLE III, TO WHICH much opposition developed, is concerned with permitting wiretapping in the investigation of serious Federal crimes. This section allows a court to order electronic surveillance under the "lawful search" provisions

of the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution. This power will give much needed assistance in the war on organized crime. The Justice Department has identified an estimated 5,000 members of the Cosa Nostra but has succeeded in indicting only 200 and convicting about 100 since 1961.

TITLE IV PROHIBITS interstate mail order sale of handguns. It does not affect rifles and shotguns and does not limit the right of the person under the Constitution to keep and bear arms. It does prohibit all sales of handguns to persons under 21 and to nonresidents of the State. It requires gun dealers to be licensed by the Federal Government and to keep records of acquisition and disposition of their sales.

THIS IS A SECTION which gives considerable concern to many of us who have been opposed to the Federal Government injecting itself into this Constitutional right of the individual but as a "take it or leave it" proposition, with the other desirable provisions of the Law, it was acceptable to the House of Representatives. Personally, I would prefer not to see this sort of license power given to the Federal Government, feeling it is a "foot in the door." On the other hand, the so-called Dodd Bill in the Senate imposes far-reaching restrictions, and the action in the Bill approved by the Congress and sent to the President may stop this further infringement by the Federal Government on gun control.

THE OMNIBUS CRIME Control Act already bears the imprint of many restricting changes and additions. If America is to be made safe for its citizens, this is a long step in the right direction.

Lee and Mr. and Mrs. Ivey were accompanied to Dallas by Melissa Lee, Sallie Richards and Patti Lynn Ivey. Melissa was to attend a school for drum majors in Arlington this week.

Lee said there was no big difficulty in getting the Texas delegation to pledge support to Gov. John Connally as a favorite son candidate for President. "There was lots of noise and a few boys with long hair and girls with short skirts who protested, but there was no real problem," he said.

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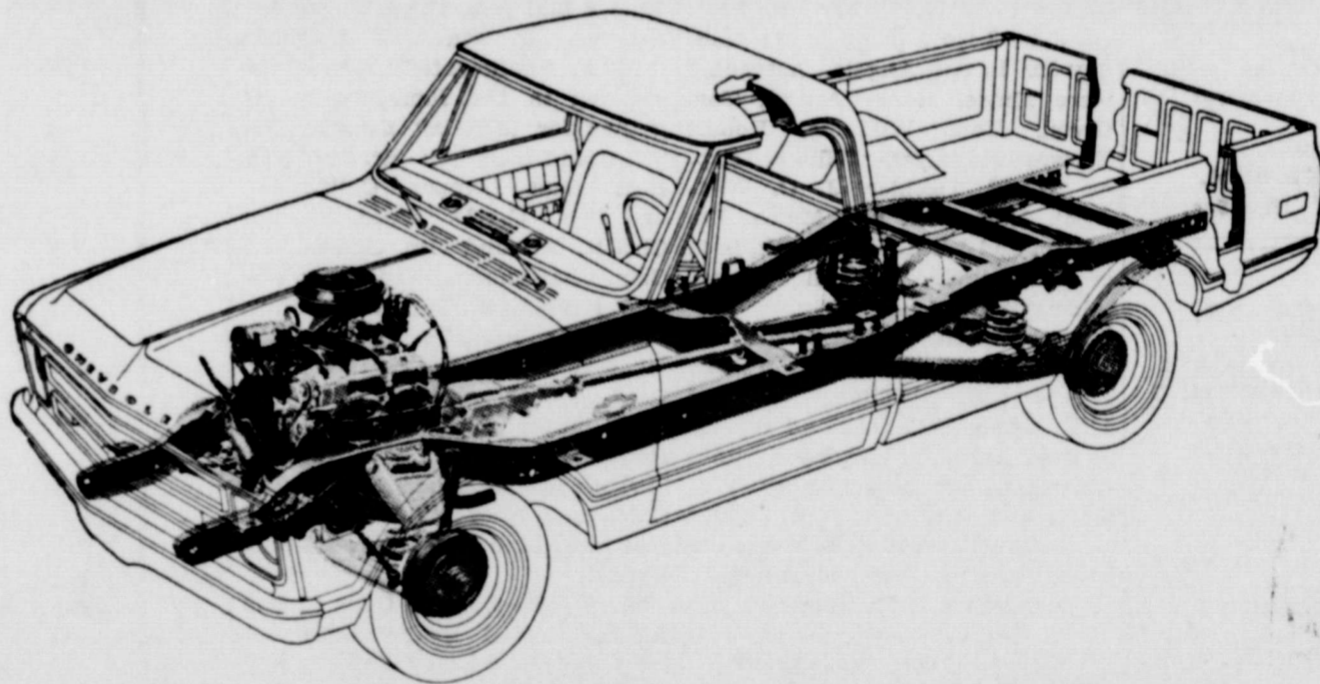

As nice weather sends children out doors they track dirt inside—on the floors!

Floors and floor coverings last longer and look better if they receive proper care. Ground in grit and grime wear away, scratch and roughen the surface of floors making them look dull.

To make floor cleaning easier, try these suggestions: keep dirt out of the house by sweeping steps and sidewalks often, using a foot scraper or doormat, and storing wraps, rubbers and boots near the entrance. Clean often to prevent dirt from being ground into the surface. Avoid overdoing by using a regular cleaning schedule. Work for short periods, and then rest.

Use long handled tools and energy saving motions. Avoid too much stretching, reaching and stooping as you work. Get your family to help keep the floors clean. Involve them in daily, weekly and periodic cleaning.

You can bet the head man of the house will welcome tempting homemade ice cream on "his day."

Whether you use the freezing compartment of your refrigerator, an electric ice cream freezer or the hand crank variety, ice cream of your vry own making is sure to please Dad — and the rest of the family, as well.

Ice cream had its place in the annals of history. It was once a "state secret" reserved for exclusive use of the royal table of Charles I of England. The King ordered his French chef to keep the recipe forever to himself and pensioned him with 500 pounds a year. When Charles was behead-

ed in 1649 the secret of the "frozen milk" already had been divulged.

It's an especially good time to enjoy ice cream. Milk, ice cream and other dairy products are in plentiful supply.

If you have an ice cream freezer, try this recipe for:

**Homemade Vanilla Ice Cream**

- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 5 eggs, separated
  - 1 can evaporated milk
  - 2 cups whole milk
  - 1 pint half-and-half
  - 2 teaspoons vanilla flavoring
- Enough additional whole milk to fill freezer insert.

Beat egg yolks in mixing bowl until thick. Then mix 1½ cups sugar and cornstarch together and add to the yolks. Continue beating mixture and add evaporated milk and 2 cups whole milk. Place in top of double boiler and cook over boiling water until mixture starts to thicken. Remove and cool. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Beat in ½ cup sugar and fold into the cooled milk mixture. Add vanilla, half-and-half and enough whole milk to complete filling the insert. Freeze. Makes one gallon.

**Consumer Clips**

Want a thin, more translucent gravy? Substitute one tablespoon cornstarch for two tablespoons flour in each pint of liquid. To avoid lumps disperse the cornstarch in cold water or fat before adding to the hot liquid. Stir while cooking.

Make soups and salads sparkle. Garnish them with croutons made from day-old bread. Spread sliced bread with butter — plain or seasoned with garlic. Cut into cubes and spread on cooky sheet. Bake at 350 degrees F. until brown.

Dairy foods really "take the cake" when it comes to baking. Why not try a butter cake with

butter icing? Or tempting cheese snacks? Dairy products are plentiful.

**Good Progress Made on Dam**

(From Robert Lee Observer)

A report issued this week said that work on the Robert Lee Reservoir is 73.87 per cent complete. Work on the spillway is running behind dam construction and is 69.44 per cent complete.

The report said that more than 9.5 million cubic yards have been moved so far in construction of the massive dam.

Progress is also being made on the construction of oil well mounds in the lake basin. However, none of the rock rip rap has been placed on the mounds because of a court dispute over a lease involving the rock to be used.

About 10 per cent of the work on a diversion dam in Mitchell County is complete. This structure is being built to keep unsuitable water from flowing into the reservoir.

Colorado River Municipal Water District, builders of the dam, also reported that 13 miles of the 33 mile pipeline from Big Spring to the Martin County line is complete.
