

Reception To Honor Governor Connally

Everybody in this area is invited to be at Bronte city hall Tuesday morning to meet Governor John Connally. The governor will stop here while he is on a dedicatory tour of the Texas Forts Trails which runs through Coke County.

A reception is being planned for the governor and those accompanying him on the tour.

Some 30-40 state officials and other dignitaries will be with him on the tour bus.

Mayor Royce Lee is coordinator of the governor's tour through this county. It will start Tuesday morning after he leaves Abilene and come through Tuscola and back through Wingate to the Coke County line. The caravan will be met there by the mayor,

Coke County law enforcement officials who will provide an escort. First stop in Coke County will be Fort Chadbourne. From the old fort, the group will move on to Bronte, where the tentative arrival time is 10 a.m.

A meeting was held Monday night to make plans for welcoming Connally to Bronte. Several women were present and were

named to head a committee to work on decorations and preparing refreshments for the visitors and those who come to welcome them.

The governor's stay in Bronte will be short and he will move on to Robert Lee for an inspection of the dam construction project after leaving here.

Mayor Lee said that everybody

in surrounding towns is invited to come and meet Governor Connally. "We are extremely happy to have the governor coming to Bronte, and as mayor of the town, I extend a special invitation to citizens of Robert Lee, Norton, Blackwell, Winters and other nearby cities to join with us in welcoming him to this area of West Texas," Lee said.

Immunizations Scheduled Today

Bronte area residents are reminded that today (Thursday) is the date set for the local portion of Texas' statewide immunization project at John Harris Clinic.

Two-dose polio immunizations will be given to persons of all ages. The first dose will be given with the date for the second to be announced.

Measles and DPT (diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus) vaccines will be available to all children through the third grade. However, those participating in the polio series cannot receive the measles immunization until a later date.

A 25c fee will be charged to offset the cost of administering the measles and DPT vaccine only.

P. O. Curtails Saturday Service

Effective Saturday, July 28, all Saturday window service will be discontinued at the Bronte post office with the exception of handing out general delivery mail and parcel post from 9 until 10:30 a.m.

There will be no stamps sold, no money orders issued, or any other service which requires a financial transaction. There will be no change in window service hours currently provided Monday through Friday.

Also there will be no change on star route delivery service.

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. made the announcement this week of the discontinuance of part of the Saturday service offered by the post office.

The cutback is part of a curtailment of postal services throughout the country which was announced following an order to cut expenses.

The expense cutting resulted from insistence by the Congress that federal spending be cut along with passage of the new 10 per cent surtax on all income tax paid.

Qualified voters of Norton and Bronte School Districts will go to the polls Saturday to decide if the two schools are to be consolidated. Voting boxes will be set up in Bronte city hall for residents of the Bronte district and in Norton gymnasium for residents of that school district.

The elections were called after Judge W. H. Rampy of Runnels County and Judge W. W. Thetford of Coke County had petitions filed in their offices requesting them.

Matthew Caperton will be presiding judge for the Bronte box, while Cecil Roper will be presiding judge for the Norton box. The election will carry if both districts pass it by a simple majority.

Residents of the Norton district are confronted with rebuilding their school following a fire earlier this summer or joining Bronte, Ballinger or Winters schools.

A meeting was held in Bronte School auditorium Saturday night, July 13, to discuss the school consolidation question. A large group was present to hear Supt. C. B. Barbee's presentation of what Bronte School has to offer Norton students and patrons.

Footballers Must Get Polio Vaccine

Bronte High School boys who plan to play football this fall must take the polio immunization vaccine today (Thursday) at the John Harris Clinic, Coach Cecil Toliver announced Monday.

"The polio immunization is a must," the coach said, "for every boys who plans to come out for football."

Toliver also announced that a meeting will be held Thursday at 8 p.m. for all prospective players. Scheduling will be set up for the boys to take their physical examinations. The examinations will be given at the local clinic, starting Aug. 5.

Aug. 19 is the date set for workouts to begin, the coach said. He has tentatively set the time for daily workouts at 9:30 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Toliver announced that Colorado City and Winters will scrimmage here Aug. 27 at 6 p.m. The Longhorns will scrimmage Merkel on the local field at 8 p.m. Sept. 6. It is expected that the Bronte lads will also scrimmage Santa Anna before the regular season starts but the date has not been confirmed.

Jimmy McCullough of Midland is visiting in the home of his aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Ogleby, this week.

He brought out the high quality of instruction in the local school and mentioned that up to date buildings and facilities are already available. He also talked at some length on the tax structure of the Bronte School, and pointed out that school taxes are much lower here than at Norton, Ballinger or Winters.

The superintendent said this week that he feels a fair and factual presentation has been made to Norton School patrons. He said, "I know we have presented only facts and I hope Norton folks will see fit to join with us in our fine school system."

He added, "We have a good thing going here. We have a growing community and economy, a growing student body and growing involvement in what it takes to give young people a good education." Barbee pointed out that 42 new homes have been built in Bronte in the past 4½ years, and that the community's recreational facilities are among the best in the state.

Barbee urged that a large number of Bronte voters go to the polls and cast their votes. "We want Norton citizens to know that we want them," he said, "and the best way I know to do this is to get out a large vote in favor of this consolidation."

Junior Rodeo Set By Roping Club

Coke County Roping Club is making plans for a Junior Rodeo to be held in the Bronte arena at 8 p.m., Aug. 10. Young persons from 9 to 19 will be eligible to enter.

Four trophies will be given, one each to high point junior and senior boy and girl. Winning a division in the rodeo will not interfere with eligibility for Interscholastic League events.

Joe McCutchen, president of the roping club, said members hope for a large crowd of entrants and spectators at the rodeo. Admission price will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for youngsters under 12. An entry fee of \$1.00 for each event will be charged those participating in the events.

Events which will be held for both junior and senior girls are barrel racing, pole bending and flag racing. Events for junior boys will be steer riding, break away calf roping and barrel racing. Senior boys can compete in tie down calf roping, ribbon roping and bull riding.

McCutchen said, "We would like for everyone to keep the rodeo in mind and make plans to attend."



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

Judge Thetford Signs Farm Safety Week Proclamation

Judge Proclaims Farm Safety Week

County Judge W. W. Thetford proclaimed July 21-27, as Farm Safety Week in Coke County, at the request of Wayne Arrott, county Farm Bureau president. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety program.

Arrott said the accidental death rate for farm residents is steadily increasing.

"If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," he continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in this country today; but added, many of the present losses could be prevented with the use of safety tools such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, SMV emblems and tractor roll-guards.

In his proclamation, Judge Thetford said "the citizens of Coke County are proud of our farm families from whom come our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing the commodities needed by the entire population."

The proclamation said the special safety campaign is a coordinated effort by Farm Bureau and various local and state agricultural and safety groups. The judge urged farm families "to become more safety conscious, not only during Farm Safety Week, but every day of the year."

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas Liquor Control Board is studying new regulations for private clubs where "spirits" are sold.

Members won't reveal the recommendations that were submitted to them by Acting Administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr. until after careful study.

Last set of regulations banning cash sales in the clubs and curbing the issuance of guest cards by manager-members was knocked out by a district court order in May.

Humphreys termed the new rules "workable" but "not rigid."

Meanwhile, he submitted a long report on the steps taken to restore public confidence in the LCB which has been hard hit on investigation of irregularities.

Humphreys detailed steps taken to upgrade personnel and improve administration, case handling and record keeping.

At their July 18 meeting, the board also:

*Approved retirement for LCB Enforcement Chief A. R. Cartledge and named as his temporary replacement Don Fishell, 39.

*Announced that a permanent successor to resigned Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr. will be appointed in 30 to 60 days.

*Acknowledged that Stevenson told members he had received an expensive watch as a gift but they did not question his acceptance of it.

*Reported law enforcement activities and collections are on a substantial increase over last year.

"The future looks good," commented Chairman W. D. Noel of Odessa, who is scheduled to step down soon after 16 years of service.

TAX BILL LAW—Now there's no way out of paying those new taxes approved by the Legislature in special session. Gov. John Connally has signed into law the bill which is designed to raise \$160.2 million for 1969 state operations. It's effective October 1, and here's what it does:

*Raises the general sales and auto sales tax rates from two to three per cent statewide. In cities which levy 1% local option sales taxes the rate will be four per cent. (No change was made in exemptions.)

Increases the corporation franchise tax rate (collectible May 1) from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 of

taxable capital, surplus and undivided profits. Portion of the franchise tax on corporate debt will be reduced from \$2.25 to \$2.00 in 1969 and phased out in 1973.

TOURIST RECORD IN MAKING — Tourist travel is expected to far surpass all previous records this year, according to State Highway Department's travel and information division soundings.

One Highway Department travel bureau on Interstate Highway 10 near Orange reported "customers" for first half of 1968 more than doubled total for January-June 1967. Ninety per cent of the visitors were on their way to the HemisFair in San Antonio.

All eight established bureaus run by the Highway Department reported big increases. Total services went up 14.2 per cent for the first half of this year compared with the same period in 1967. Travel and information division said its mail inquires are up 27 per cent.

Last year Texas was visited by 20.6 million persons who spent \$1.2 billion. This was an eight per cent increase in visitors over 1966, and an 11 per cent jump in spending.


