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

It would be extremely difficult to list the many contributions Mr. Youngblood has made to his town and to this area of West Texas. We feel sure he has forgotten many of them himself. But for more than 45 years he has been the man to see if you want to get something done in Bronte.

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

In order to vote, he must possess all the qualifications required of electors under Texas law except the ordinary residence requirements, and it must also be shown that he was either a qualified elector in another state immediately before his removal to Texas or that he would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state where he formerly lived if he had remained there until election day.

Mrs. Waldrop said that a person who had been issued a voter registration certificate, voter identification card, or other document showing that he was a registered voter in the state from which he moved should take this document with him when he goes to the county clerk's office to apply for a ballot. If he does not have written proof of his registration, it will be necessary for the clerk to obtain verification of his voting eligibility from the voter registrar or other appropriate election official at the place of his former residence before he will be accepted for voting.

Applications must be filed with the clerk by 5 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 20. However, the voters will not actually vote until the period of Oct. 21 - Nov. 1, when they will return to the clerk's Mrs. Waldrop said that each applicant will be given written notice informing him whether his after the clerk receves a reply from the voter registrar in the state of former residence.

The one received last week asked that part of the district be detached from Ballinger and annexed to Winters. Two of the more recent petitions requested that no action be taken on the first petition.


The third petition received was signed by 21 persons in the south. west part of the old Norton District and requested that area be detached and annexed to Bronte School District.


