Three groups of Bronte young people went to the State Fair in Dallas last weekend. They were FFA boys, FHA girls and a group from th MYF of the Methodist Church.

The boys were sponsored by J. T. Henry, the girls by Mrs. Royce Fancher, and the MYFers by Louis Thornton and Martin Mayer.

Supt. C. B. Barbee told us Monday that all four of the sponsors had nothing but good reports on the behaviour of the young men and women who attended the fair. The superintendent said reports of the sponsors made him extremely proud of Bronte youth and added to his belief that children raised in good small towns are automatically indoctrinated with common courtesy and other good qualities which are hard to find in some places.

Information contained in the item above makes us wonder about all the plans going on in Austin to do away with small schools of Texas. It makes us wonder if these plans shouldn't be given a most careful study by our legislators before they are approved or rejected.

There can be no argument that larger schools can be academically superior to small ones; that the offering of different courses is much better; and that tax money could be spent to better advantage in some ways.

However, as noted above, children receive things besides book learning in schools. They also receive character-building influences, maybe good, maybe bad. Apparently, our youngsters have learned how to behave, respect for other persons and their property and for themselves.

We know of youngsters, on the other hand, who, in hotbeds of delinquency in large metropolitan school areas, have become seasoned alcohol and pot addicts by the time they were 14 years old. We read of youngsters who think nothing of committing thefts for their spending money, rather than working for it.

The point is that academics is not the only consideration in the operation of a school. We would even go as far as to say it is not even the most important consideration.

We certainly are not against improvement of our schools and our children's educational opportunities. But, we are against sacrificing something of great importance so a high school student can take four years of Latin or learn to finger paint.

The proposals of the Governor's Committee are surely worthy of careful consideration, but we believe they should be approached with caution.

Through an arrangement with West Texas Utilities Co., they will make a fair profit on the merchandise, and it will be used to buy equipment and pay other expenses necessary to the operation of the department.

Fire Chief Vernon Jackson and President Elmer Hurley said the firemen are soliciting the light bulb business of every person in Bronte and the community. "We are offering high quality bulbs at regular prices and we believe every citizen should patronize the firemen," they said.

"This project gives everybody a chance to help the firemen provide better protection for the citizens of Bronte and their property," the volunteer firemen added.

Late Score Gives Wall Victory Over 'Horns, 9-7

Things looked good last Friday night in the last quarter of the Longhorns' contest with the Wall Hawks, as they scored and had the visitors down 7-3 with 4 minutes, 29 seconds left in the ball game.

However, the lead was short lived, as the Hawks took the kickoff and marched from their own 34 for a touchdown which gave them 9 points when added to their first quarter field goal.

First Quarter

Frank Holik kicked off for the Hawks to start the game. It went to Manfred Thompson on the 5 and was returned to the 33. Steve Williams and Thompson carried three times but couldn't make 10, so Randy Barbee punted to the Hawk 35 with no runback.

Glenn Dierschke, Wall's big quarterback, carried twice for a 1st on the 50. Ronald Cooper stopped Marcus Kochich for no gain, then Wall was penalized 5, making it 2nd and 15. On the next play the Longhorns got the first of several good breaks when Tony Holland recovered a Hawk fumble on their 42 yard line.

Once again, Wall held and Barbee had to punt. It went out on the 13. A long pass from Dierschke to Eddie Holik was good for long yardage and a 1st on Bronte's 47. A second pass to Holik was good for another 1st on the 30. Holik made 8 more on the ground and Dierschke went for the 1st on the 20. Things were looking a little bad for the Longhorns so the defense tightened up, as Roger Graves, Nicky Arrott and James Vaughn were key tacklers in stopping Kochich for a 1 yard gain on two carries. An incomplete pass brought 4th down, so Coach McCain sent in field goal equipment and Frank Holik booted the ball for a three pointer.

Holik then kicked off and Bronte had the ball on their 37. Cooper went for 5, but that was it, so Barbee punted to Holik who was stopped on the 40 by Tony Barrett.

Dierschke got loose for 38 yards and was finally stopped by Keith McCutchen on Bronte's 22. The Hawks made 5 yards in three plays, and a 4th down pass was intercepted by Vaughn on the 10. Cooper and Williams moved out to the 21 for a 1st down and picked up 8 more yards to end the quarter.

Second Quarter

McCutchen kept on an effort to make the 1st but wound up short. Barbee's punt went to the Hawk 39 where it was fumbled and recovered by Cooper for the Horns.

Again the Bronte lads were stalled and Barbee punted out on the 15.

The Longhorns said no to a first down, so the Hawks punted to Bronte's 33. Cooper and Barbee went for 6 and a pass from McCutchen to Arrott was good for 7 and a 1st on the 46. The next series of downs was no good and Barbee punted to the 34 of Wall.

Dierschke went for 16 at midfield, Kochich made 7 more and then caught a pass for a 1st on the 18. Kochich carried three times and Dierschke once for a 1st on the 8. A penalty moved the ball back to the 13, and on the second play, Cooper recovered a Hawk fumble on the 27.

Wall drew another 5 yarder to give the Longhorns a 1st and 5. Cooper went up the middle for 10 yards and a 1st on the 42. McCutchen then tossed a pass to Willie Zuniga who shook off several Hawks and cautiously made his way to the Wall 42, a gain of 16. Three incomplete passes later, however, the Horns still needed 10 yards, so Barbee punted. Wall took over on their 30. Some good ground gains and pass completions by the Hawks moved the ball to the Bronte 37 to end the half. Score: 3-0.

Third Quarter

David Scott kicked to Kochich who was pulled down by Garland Richards and Scott on the 37. The Hawks couldn't get off the ground and a punt was in order. A long kick sent the football into the end zone and Bronte had the ball on the 20.

Cooper went for 8 and Barbee added 6 for a 1st on the 34. The Longhorns lost on the next series and were faced with a 4th and 16. Barbee punted, but Wall drew a 15 yarder for roughing the kicker. However, the Longhorns still had to punt and the Hawks took over on their 34.

A long pass was intercepted by McCutchen on his 45 and was run back to the Hawk 49. It was three plays and punt for the Hawks, and Bronte had the ball on their 48. The Longhorns drew a 5 yard penalty and a pass to Barbee was good for 12. Cooper made it a 1st on the 40. Williams dashed for 6 and Thompson added 2. Cooper made the first down on the 28. The drive moved to the 19 in four plays, a yard short of a 1st, so Wall took over.

The Hawks moved the ball out almost to midfield where a fumble was recovered by Zuniga on the 40. Williams made 9 yards and Cooper added 7 more for a 1st on

the Wall 44. Williams picked up another 5, but a holding penalty was assessed the Longhorns, placing the ball on the Bronte 42.

Fourth Quarter

A pass to Barbee was a 15 yard gainer and brought up 2nd and 10. Then a beautiful pass play from McCutchen to Arrott moved the ball to the Wall 19 for a 1st down. McCutchen and Williams moved the ball down to the 12 and then the Horns were pushed back to the 20 on the 4th down.

Wall took over and drove to the 41 where a jarring tackle by Richards loosened the ball, for Scott to recover.

Cooper drove for 6 and Williams went around left end for 9 and a 1st on the 13. Williams then sped through the Hawk defenders for 10 and another 1st on the 3. Cooper carried twice for about 2½ yards, then McCutchen went across the double stripe on a quarterback sneak, for the Longhorns' only tally of the game. Scott kicked the extra point and the score was 7-3.

Scott's kick gave the Hawks the ball on the 34. The Hawks failed to make the needed yards in three downs and a crucial fourth down pass play was good as Jerry Sefcik completed it on the Bronte 36. The Hawks were definitely on the move with Holik making 4 and a pass to Bruce Grosshans completing a pass on the 17. Darrel Fischer went for 6 and Dierschke carried twice and came up with a 1st on the Bronte 3 yard line. Fischer made 2 of the needed yards, then Dierschke kept the ball to go over

the double stripe. Try for points was no good, but the Hawks were out in the lead 9-7.

The short kickoff went to Zuniga who was downed on the 33. McCutchen tried four passes but the last minute effort was unsuccessful. Wall took the ball and got off a couple of plays before time ran out. Final score: Wall 9, Bronte 7.

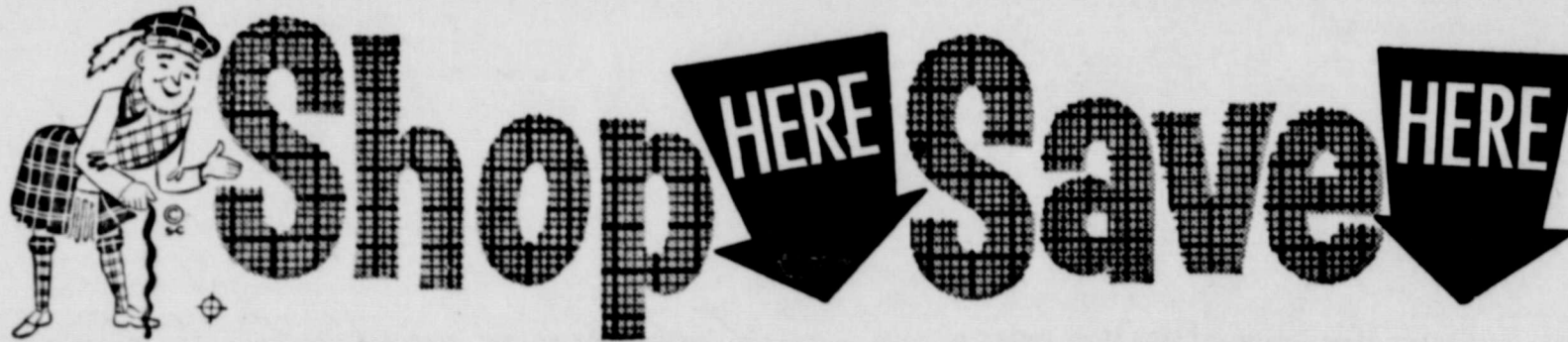
