Methodists Plan Special Services During Weekend

A "Lay Witness Mission" will begin Friday night at First United Methodist Church in Bronte. The mission will be conducted by eight or nine young people and five adult couples from Abilene, Palestine and Wichita Falls.

The church pastor, the Rev. Austin Masterson, said "a lay witness mission is just that: laymen witnessing to Christ in their lives." The mission will be the first in this area, other than one or two in Abilene.

First event in the program will be a covered dish dinner at 6:30 p.m. for the entire church membership. After dinner, those present will break up into small groups with a lay witness mission team member in charge of discussion.

E. L. Hurley, general chairman for the local church said, "Our people have been preparing themselves in prayer since early September for this mission, and we expect great things to happen for the glory of Christ and His kingdom." Hurley also reported that the work of some 11 committee chairmen has been very effective in getting ready for the mission.

Tom Leeth of Abilene, coordinator for all team members of the mission, has participated in several such efforts. He is a business man in Abilene. His wife and daughter will also participate.

These are certainly not all the events that took place, nor are they necessarily the most important — just the ones that caught our eye as we looked at the files.

January

Just before the new year, during the holidays, the Bronte Longhorn basketball team captured the crown at the BCD Christmas Tournament in San Angelo. The Bronte school was taking its annual census. Politics started early with O. B. Jacobs and Melvin Childress announcing they would run for reelection for the tax assessor and sheriff's jobs. Pete Nutter was asking election as Justice of the Peace, and Hiram Brock as constable. The Bronte girls junior high team won consolation at their own tournament. The county stock show was held in icy weather but was considered a good show, attended by more than 300 persons. Doug McCutchen, Brian Richards and Davis Corley were named to four spots on the All-State football team. Funeral services were held for Joe Lee Scott, 38. Mrs. T. G. Stinebaugh celebrated her 90th birthday and Mrs. Mary Phillips was honored on her 86th birthday. Coach Grant Teaff of Texas Tech was speaker for the annual all-sports banquet. Rains, totaling up to 4 inches, fell near the end of the month. Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Denman bought the White Auto Store from Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Bruton.

February

Coke County registered 1691 voters by the deadline January 31. Catholic funeral services were conducted for Leocadia Lopez (Calla) Guitierrez, 49. Bob Fields of Robert Lee entered the race for Coke County sheriff. Don Hageman, Keith Morris and David Glenn were selected on the all-West Texas Academic football team. Three Bronte Longhorns signed to play football with Texas Tech, Doug McCutchen, Brian Richards and Davis Corley. Freezing rain and sleet created hazardous conditions about mid-month. The Longhorns basketball team won the district championship in a playoff game with Forsan. An audit showed the county's finances in good shape. The Enterprise received a letter from Ron Johns, former Bronte boy then on duty with the Marines in Vietnam. The engagement of Carolyn Kemp to Robert

Emmett Marcato of New York City was announced. Rain fell near the end of the month. Funeral services were held for Mrs. Mamie Epperson.

March

The engagement of Dannah Jeanne Holcombe to Charles Payne was announced. The Longhorn cagers continued their march by winning the regional crown to earn a berth in the state tournament where they fell to Friendswood, 62-48. The Brownwood firm of Herman Bennett Co. was low bidder on the low rent housing project with a bid of \$209,890. The weather ran the gamut about the middle of the month with warm, cold, rain, snow, strong wind and hail. James Arnold Tidwell bought the Hurlin Lee Humble Station. Davis Corley and David Glenn were placed on the all district basketball team. Last rites were held for Mrs. Ida Warner, 84. Sharon McCutchen exhibited the champion gilt of the six county Sears Foundation Swine Contest in San Angelo. Mrs. J. M. Rutherford was 94 years old on Friday, Mar. 29.

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Young Stockmen To Show Animals At County Show

The annual Coke County Stock Show will be held Monday, Jan. 5, in the County Showbarn in Robert Lee. Fifty FFA and 4-H Club members with 165 animals will be competing for show honors and a place in the premium sale.

Activities will begin on Sunday afternoon with the animals being brought to the showbarn between 1 and 4 p.m. Weighing, classifying and the last grooming work will take place Sunday afternoon and night.

The judging will start Monday morning at 9 a.m. with the judging of the breeding swine. Through the day the market swine, market lambs, breeding sheep, then cattle will be judged. The sale of premium lambs and pigs will be held at 3 p.m.

Judging of the 1969 show will be done by three area vocational agriculture teachers. Louis Bridges, of Eden, will classify the lambs; Frank Brownfield of Colorado City, will judge the sheep; while Albert Mayberry, of Trent, will judge the swine classes.

Directing the 1969 County Show will be the Coke County Stock Show Association directors. LeDrew Arrott is president of the association; J. W. Service Jr., is vice-president and Roy Tinkler is secretary. Directors are Waymon Percifull, J. Lee Ensor, D. J. Walker, Jr., Frank Percifull, J. F. McCabe, Jr., H. H. Brunson, Joe McCutchen, L. E. Wink, Glenn Waldrop, Bill Magness and B. A. Boykin. Edward Cumble will be the auctioneer for the sale and Garland Davis will be show clerk.

Susan Arrott and Lynn Lawhon were tops in the eighth grade class being promoted into high school. A May garden theme was carried out for the annual junior senior banquet. Announcement was made of the engagement of La Jan Kiker to Tommy Joe Walter. Mrs. Royce Fancher was installed president of the Sorosis Club. The new Baptist parsonage was dedicated and an open house held. Business house took a holiday on Memorial Day.

June

Cpl. Tommy Hallmark was selected Marine of the Month at the Marine Corps Air Station at Yuma, Ariz. Rev. A. S. Masterson was returned as pastor of First Methodist Church after annual conference. City fathers adopted a \$60,000 budget for the year. Funeral services were held for Linton Crow, 72. Martha Ellen Mills and Roy Lee Carlisle were married in Austin. The school at Norton burned and public meetings were held to determine the fate of the school. Gaylon Woodward was elected new assistant coach of the Bronte Longhorns. Pvt. Larry Corley left for Army duty in Germany. Bronte boy scouts were at Camp Sol Mayer. M. E. Ruby Jr. Inc. of Austin submitted the low bid for building the new highway between Bronte and Robert Lee.

July

A consolidation election between Norton and Bronte school districts was set. The Bronte delegation to the Lions International Convention in Dallas included Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hurley, Austin Masterson, Bill Landers and Charlie Taylor. Bob Sanders was assigned to Bronte as a patrolman with the Texas Department of Public Safety. Soaking rains early in the month helped the crop outlook. Keith D. Noe resigned his position as science teacher here. Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Alexander sold their Bronte Floral shop to Mrs. Margaret Brunson, who incorporated it into her shop, Margaret's Flowers & Gifts. Last rites were held for Miss Ada Woullard. Highlight of the month came with the visit to Bronte by Governor John Connally. A reception was held for him at the city hall and the Governor, touring the Texas Forts Trail, made stops at Ft. Chadbourne and at the construction site of Robert Lee Reservoir. Norton voters defeated the consolidation proposal

while Bronte residents voted in favor of it.

August

Douglas McCutchen played in the North-South High All-Star game at Amon Carter Field in Fort Worth. Dr. Guy D. Newman and V. F. Forderhase held a revival at First Baptist Church. The housing project was reported 52 per cent complete. Coke County Roping Club held a junior rodeo with about 1000 in attendance. Bronte schools started with 316 first day enrollment, down slightly from a year before. Buddy Walker returned home after serving in the U. S. Army, the last year in Vietnam. Preview of the 1968 football team was given in a scrimmage at Winters.

September

Over 700 persons attended the Labor Day barbecue in the park, when L. T. Youngblood was honored for his long service to this area. Engagement of Sharon McCutchen to Norman Craig Taylor was announced. William A. Spiller, 29, died in a Fort Worth hospital. Tommy Lee was elected president of a newly organized chapter of Coke County Jaycees. First screwworm case in the county in many years was reported at Silver. 1969 model automobiles were out and Caperton Chevrolet showed their new models and celebrated their 20 years in the business at the same time. A 2-inch rain seemed to be a boost to fall grazing. Edwin McDaniel was serving in Vietnam with the Navy. Funeral services were held for Bailey A. Bill, who died after a long illness.

October

Band Booster club reported 118 members. Engagement was announced of Peggy Corley to John Scott Belew. Ethicon had their company picnic in the Bronte park for the second year in a row, with about 400 present. Mr. and Mrs. Sam Williams sold their funeral homes in Bronte and Robert Lee to Mr. and Mrs. George Newby of Ballinger, who moved to Robert Lee. For the first time in several years, Robert Lee Steers defeated the Bronte Longhorn football team in the unofficial battle for county championship. The Boy Scout drive for funds brought in \$800. Gerald Parker was back from Vietnam. Robert Lee golfers defeated Bronte golfers in the annual March of Dimes tournament, which netted \$120 for the MOD. George Wallace was winner of a presidential straw vote conducted downtown. Everybody regained an hour's sleep when daylight savings time moved back to Central Standard Time. Funeral services were conducted for Mrs. T. G. Stinebaugh.

November

Democrats made a clean sweep from the top to the bottom of the ballot in Coke County in the general election. Rev. Wayne N. Stout resigned as pastor of Central Baptist Church. Members of the Spanish club made a one-day trip to Mexico. A fair crowd attended annual Bronte school homecoming, with an unusual snowfall having some effect on attendance. Kately June Brown was wed to Airman Cecil P. Young of Boston, Mass. The Longhorns dropped the big football game, 40-6, to Trent at Trent. Applications were being taken for renters for the housing project which was completed. Bobby Skelton, Lynn Lawhon, Rance Brunson, Bruce Pruitt, Mike Arrott and Matt Caperton were members of the Junior Chapter Conducting team of the local FFA who made their way to the state contest.

December

An area of the Norton school district was annexed to the local school district. Coke County had heavy rain and more early snow. The newspaper press at the Bronte Enterprise suffered a major breakdown and the papers had to be taken to Miles for printing. Norma Pruitt was named local and district FFA Sweetheart. Johnnie Scott, 25, was killed in an oil field accident. Funeral services were held for Mrs. Elizabeth Carter, who died after a several months illness. It was announced that the Rev. A. S. Masterson would leave in January for a new pastorate at Pearsall, after serving First Methodist Church for six years. His replacement was announced as the Rev. Fred Brown of Agua Dulce. Bill Green was seriously injured in a freak auto accident near Evant but was making a good recovery at the end of the month. Tony Holland, James Vaughn, Nicky Arrott, Willie Zuniga, Garland Richards, Roger Graves and Ronald Cooper were named to the 7-B all-district football team. Santa Claus visited one afternoon as Bronte residents prepared for the Christmas holidays.

O is for Onions

And "O" can also stand for Out-of-the-Ordinary dishes using this tasty vegetable.

Expert cooks know how to use onions to give just the right flavor to so many popular dishes. Nothing new on the popularity polls, onions have been eating favorites for ages.

With plentiful supplies of onions at the market now, why not try some interesting new ways to use this old favorite?

For instance, Curry Creamed Onions will quite likely become a favorite with your family.

1 pound onions
1/2 cup milk
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
1/2 teaspoon curry powder.

Peel onions. Cook in boiling salted water 20 minutes, or just until tender. Drain. Stir in cream of mushroom soup, milk and curry powder. Heat slowly, stirring once or twice, until bubbly-hot and creamy smooth. Makes six servings.

Saucy Ham-Egg-Onion: Broil slices of onion with ham slices. Place onion on toasted English muffin, then ham slice and poached egg. Pour Hollandaise sauce over top.

Barbecued Onions: Cook peeled onions until almost tender in boiling salted water. Place onions in baking dish and pour a tangy barbecue sauce over them. Bake at 400 degrees about 45 minutes, basting several times. Serve with a sprinkling of chopped parsley.
