Last rites were held in Ballinger First United Methodist Church where Mr. Wylie was a member. Burial who came to Texas from Missis. was in Ballinger's Evergreen sippi in 1874. He attended school Cemetery, under direction of Allen Davis Funral Home.

Conducting the services were the Rev. Plez Todd, pastor, and the Rev. Wayne Reynolds, former pastor of the Ballinger church.

Mr. Wylie apparently suffered a heart attack Monday night short. ly after 9 o'clock and was dead on arrival at Hendrick Memorial Hos. pital in Abilene. He was at his home northeast of Bronte when

Primarily a ranchman, Mr. Wylie also had interests in the oil industry and in the banking business. He was probably best known for his philanthropic activities in Richards of Clearwater Beach. contributing to many worthwhile institutions of West Texas.

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


