Carpets are too expensive toa infrequently purchased for buyers to select by trial and er ror experience. Consumers in the market for carpeting should learn the basic facts which apply to all carpets.

Carpet price is determined by two things: basic material and care and artistry used in manufacturing. The more of either element put into a carpet, the higher the price.
For example, carpet containing nylon wears very well. But ny lon carpeting can cost $\$ 6$ a yard.
To understand differences in carpets, one should understand construction. A carpet is made of a series of layers, each effects a luxurious feeling of the carpet. Quality of the pile is determined by the height of the tufts and their density. Balance between these affects the ability of pile fibers
use. use.
Below pile is the primary backing to which the pile is attached. Secondary backing is the last
layer. It is recommended with most tufted carpets. Latex apmost between the two backing players locks the individual fibers lo prevent pubbing out to prevent pubbing out.

Ted F. Mocllering, disrtict manager of the San Angelo Social Security office, said recently that so the priment of benefits is alSecurity Administration Social ever, he pointed out, the law re quires that certain facts be established in each claim for social
security benefits. security benefits. Thus, em-
ployees of the Social Security Administration have a Security responsibility - to see that claims are paid promptly, but in Moellering listed three areas Moellering listed three areas that cause problems and delays in the processing of social security claims: (1) lack of sufficient evidence of age; (2) employees ported or not reported at all; and
(3) self-emploved persons who do (3) self-employed persons who do
not file their tax returns correct-
y or do not file returns at all. All of these matters have to be cleared up before a claim can be completed.
It is very important, Moellering said, that anyone who has any doubt about the evidence of his age, or about his status as an employee or self-employed person, contact a social security re presentative before time to file a claim so that problems can be leared up in advance.
