BAND UNIFORMS OKAYED

Bronte Longhorn Band Director Louis Thornton is hoping his charges will step out in style at next fall's first football game. He is now in the process of working up the specifications for and receiving bids on 65 new uniforms which were authorized at a meeting of the school board last Thursday night.

A sample of the new uniforms on display this week shows that they will be in two parts, with a maroon suit for concert appearances and a white plastic overlay for use in marching. The overlay has "Bronte" printed diagonally across the front and a Longhorn on the back.

New hats will also be a part of the new uniforms.

Bronte School trustees, in a meeting last Thursday night, awarded two-year contracts to 13 teachers and accepted resignations of two.

Contracts extended earlier in the year included those of Supt. C. B. Barbee, Principals James L. Golson and James N. Raughton and Coach Cecil Toliver.

The board has yet to act on hiring auxiliary personnel and they will be considered at its April meeting.

In other action the board:

*Inspected samples of band uniforms and agreed to the purchase of approximately 65 new uniforms with the hope for late summer delivery.

*Heard a presentation from Prin. James Golson outlining the practicality of changing the school schedule from a seven-period to six-period day.

*Approved an advertisement for bids on a 1962 48-passenger school bus.

*Approved the 1968 delinquent tax roll; reviewed the 1969-70 local fund assignment; approved the final application for foundation funds and amended the 1968-69 budget.

*Ratified the 1969 report of the state textbook committee.

*Completed a survey for the Committee of Ten on tax matters in the district.

*Adjusted salaries of teachers who were rehired.

The board had a long session which ended at approximately 2 o'clock Friday morning.

WHEREAS this school district has fewer than 500 scholastics and is subject to the terms and provisions of Article 2746a; and

WHEREAS on the first Saturday in April, 1969, being April 5th, 1969, a trustee election will be held in said School District for the purpose of electing 3 members to the Board of Trustees of said School District,

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BRONTE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

That an election be held in said School District on April 5th, 1969, for the purpose of electing 3 members to the Board of Trustees of said District.

That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and filed with the County Judge of the county in which this district is located not later than 30 days prior to date of said election.

That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election.

At City Hall Building, in Bronte, Texas, in said School District with Mrs. Otis Smith as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Dwain Pruitt and Mrs. Royce Lee, Clerks.

Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, County Clerk is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and her staff are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the County Courthouse within the boundaries of the above named District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the Election Code of this state, and the County Judge shall furnish, at the expense of this School District, all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the results thereof to the County Judge and return the ballot boxes and other supplies of said election to the County Judge for safekeeping, and the Commissioners' Court shall canvass the returns of said election and notify the candidates and this Board of Trustees of the results thereof.

A copy of this order shall serve as notice of said election, and be posted in three different places in said School District,

which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date of said election. The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall also cause a notice by publication of this election to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located, which publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before said election.

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County Agents News Column

The Houston and San Angelo Stock Shows are history now. With their completion the show year for Coke County ends.

A total of 29 club members exhibited 46 animals in the two shows this year. The results obtained were pleasing in some cases, not so pleasing in others.

Marvin Ensor, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Lee Ensor, exhibited the champion rambouillet buck of the junior show in San Angelo. This is a tough one and a great pleasure to win. Marvin also exhibited the 5th and 6th place yearling ewes and the 4th place group of three.

Audrey Walker exhibited the first place heavy weight and Reserve Champion Duroc of the Angelo Show. The Walker sisters had another pig in 7th place in the same class. Rhonda Askins placed her heavy duroc fourth in the same class.

Edwin, Sue and Lesa Lindsey placed in several categories with their Hampshire sheep. In San Angelo, they had a 1st place aged buck, 2nd place exhibitors flock and 9th place ewe. In Houston they had 5th and 9th place ewes and a 3rd place exhibitors flock. Edwin Lindsey had a 6th place

finewool lamb in Houston.

Harvey Wink competing in the Junior and Scramble Shows with his shorthorn heifer placed 5th and 6th. Terry and Harvey Wojtek placed 5th with a heavy weight crossbred pig, while Darrel Pitcock placed 11th in the heavy weight duroc class.

The Coke County livestock judging team came close in the San Angelo contest, but lacked a few points in reaching for the select circle. Edwin Lindsey was high individual in livestock judging and fifth high in the contest. The club members will begin this week practicing for the District judging contests to be held in late April.

A total of 91 pets were vaccinated in the 4-H sponsored rabies immunization program last week.

The Apollo 9 astronauts may bring information that could help some of the problems in agricultural crops. By using a battery of cameras, they have photographed farm lands in the United States. From these photos, it is hoped information can be derived that will show signs of disease and drought on crops and also on timber and grazing lands.

Sheep in the Texas Hill Country and Edwards Plateau have had unusually heavy infestations of lice during the winter and early spring.

The tiny chewing pests live on skin scales, scurf and other skin and wool products, and cause intense irritation as they feed in the wool. The itching and irritation results in the sheep biting and pulling at the wool and rubbing vigorously against posts, trees and other objects. The fleece becomes ragged and torn and is greatly reduced in value.

Biting lice usually spend their entire life on the sheep, leaving only to transfer to another animal upon contact. Peak numbers occur during the winter and may persist to spring shearing, after which the population declines. Small populations of lice sustain themselves on the animals during the summer and may begin to increase quickly with colder weather during the fall and winter when considerable damage occurs, according to the entomologists.

Louse control is difficult when animals are in heavy fleece. Insecticidal sprays furnish partial control, but they generally act much slower than desired. Dipping when animals are in full fleece is impractical and is not recommended. Best results are obtained from insecticidal treatments applied within a few days following shearing.

Treating within 30 days after shearing destroys lice which would remain on the sheep during the summer, and produce damaging populations the following fall and winter. Such treatments will practically eradicate lice from individual flocks. Other animals placed in the flock after treatment should be sprayed thoroughly to prevent reinfesting the treated flock. Two treatments, the second one two to three weeks after the first one, should give more positive control. Do not spray and drench the same day.

Some of the products that are used to control lice are as follows: Sevin, Co-Ral, DDT, Diazinon, Delnav, Lindane, Malathion, Methoxychlor, Korlan and Toxaphene.

AUSTIN — Texas lawmakers are nearing the halfway mark of the 61st legislative session and the pace is beginning to quicken visibly.

More than 1,200 House bills and some 700 Senate bills (plus nearly 100 proposed constitutional amendments) were filed by Friday, the deadline for free introduction of bills. A four-fifths majority now is required.

Although floor sessions are brief, a lot of legislation is getting passed—63 bills last week alone, including some of the session's major business.

And the lights burn bright at the state capitol after midnight for some committees which schedule hearings on as many as a dozen bills at a time. Other committee meetings begin as early as 9 a.m. and last until floor action starts in the House and Senate.

So far, the Senate has reversed its usual form. It is cranking out general bills faster than the House, where the representatives are pursuing a more-methodical, look-'em-over-carefully procedure.

Last week, for example, the Senate banged through 34 bills on its regular calendars, some so fast there was no time for explanation, let alone debate. Across the rotunda, the House passed only 13 measures on major calendars, but representatives reduced the gap considerably cranking through 16 local bills at a single hour-long sitting. Gov. Preston Smith signed six more into law.

One thing is sure... as the second lap of an historic legislative session begins, things will get a lot faster and a lot more hectic before early June when adjournment is scheduled.

MAJOR BILLS MOVING — The Legislature has completed and handed the governor, a tough new measure providing fines up to \$200 and jail terms up to six months for disruptive activity on college campuses. Bill won't take effect until the start of the new school year.

Senate passed key bills to put sharp teeth in air and water pollution controls, require breath tests of suspected drunk drivers, require public agencies to give three days notice of their official meetings and provide tougher controls over teen-age drinking.

Other Senate bills would authorize payment of up to \$5,000 for moving homes and businesses displaced in highway right-of-way condemnation proceedings, remove the \$2,400 salary ceiling on which teachers contribute to retirement, establish a temporary Governor's Human Relations Committee, set up a new commission to regulate credit unions and request the U. S. Congress to ease restrictions on cable television.

Both houses have passed their own version of bills to permit schools to teach in a foreign language those students who have difficulty with English in elementary grades, to lower from two years to one year the minimum time between elections to adopt or abolish city sales taxes and to close some public roads on state-owned land held for use of the Texas Department of Corrections.

House approved creation of a new Texas Technological College of Medicine at Lubbock and voted to strike down immunity of government units from lawsuits for damages. Representatives gave strong support to a bill to give the Legislature the right to set Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, & Columbus Day and Veterans Day holidays on Mondays to conform to the federal holidays.

Another House bill sent to the Senate would permit the state's 14 courts of civil appeals to issue writs of habeas corpus in domestic-relations cases.

Senate has adopted an amended version of House bill to permit a statewide cooperative network of local libraries. Governor Smith now has the bill.

BILLS RUNNETH OVER — Several education bills have been

filed in the last few days. Rep. Guy Floyd of San Antonio wants the Attorney General's office to assist school districts threatened with the loss of Federal funds.

Rep. David Evans of San Antonio wants the state to contribute as much money to private school students as it does to public school students through the minimum Foundation School Program.

Rep. Jim Nugent filed a bill to prohibit the Legislature from enacting an individual state income tax.

Rep. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi has a constitutional amendment to remove the ceiling on welfare payments.

Rep. Neal Solomon of Mount Vernon has a bill to allow the agriculture commissioner to prohibit the sale of any milk not meeting agriculture department standards.

Rep. David Allred of Wichita Falls introduced a one-bill package prohibiting racing a car motor, sudden stops or starts, unnecessary horn-blowing, contesting speed, fighting, indecent language, throwing things, littering, loitering or intoxication on shopping center parking lots.

TAX TIME — House Speaker Gus Mutscher has been talking with legislators to see what sort of tax program they will support to pay for the new programs which they pass. Governor Smith's tax program was introduced by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas. It also puts a \$10 "superfine" on all who violate the traffic laws where motion is involved.

COMMITTEES AT WORK — House State Affairs Committee got into the basic philosophies of rural life and business economics while considering a bill by Rep. Neal Solomon of Mt. Vernon. It would require telephone companies to maintain an office in every county seat they serve. Bill was sent to a subcommittee for further study. Rep. Jack Blanton of Carrollton chairs the subcommittee.

Senate Affairs Committee acted favorably on Sen. Tom Creighton's bill to cut the time between local elections on the optional City Sale Tax from two years to one. It has gone to the Senate floor.

Also reported favorably by the Senate committee and tentatively approved by the Senate was creation of a temporary Governor's Committee on Human Relations. It was sponsored by a triumvirate of liberal senators. Sponsors, however, lacked the endorsement of Sen. Joe Bernal of San Antonio—a leading liberal. He introduced a measure calling for a permanent state organization on human relations.

Auto Inspection Deadline Nears

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today reminded motorists that only one month remains before the 1969 motor vehicle inspection deadline.

To date an estimated 28 million vehicles have received the inspection required by state law. The Department of Public Safety said some 3.2 million additional vehicles remain to be inspected prior to midnight, April 15.

Speir said 42.2 per cent of the vehicles inspected so far required mechanical adjustments prior to issuance of an inspection sticker. The defect found most often has been misalignment of headlights.

The Department of Public Safety urged motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines which will develop at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

Texas has 5,466 licensed inspection stations. The required inspection fee is \$1.75.
