Sheep in the Texas Hill Coun－ try and Edwards Plateau have of lice during the winter and early spring．
The tiny chewing pests live on and wool products，and cquse in－ tense irritation as they feed in tation results in the sheep biting and pulling at the wool and rub－ bing vigorously against posts，
trees and other nbjects．The fleece becomes ragged and torn and is greatly reduced in value． Biting lice usually spend their entire life on the sheep，leaving
only to transfer to another ani－ only to transfer to another ani－ mal upon contact．Peak numbers
occur during the winter and may persist to spring shearing，after which the population declines． Small populations of lice sustain
themselves on the animals during the summer and may begin to in－ crease quickly with colder wea－ ther during the fall and winter
when considerable damage oc－ when considerable damage
curs，according to the entomolo gists．
Louse control is difficult when animals are in heavy fleece．In－ secticidal sprays furnish partia control，but they generally ach
much slower than desired．Dip－ ping when animals are in full ping when animals are in full
fleece is impractical and is not obtained from Best results are obtained from insecticidal treat following shearing．
Treating within 30 days after shearing destroys lice which ing the summer，and produce da－ maging populations the following fall and winter．Such trentments will practically eradicate lice from individual flocks．Other ani－ mals placed in the flock after treatment should be sprayed thoroughly to prevent reinfest－ ing the treated flock．Two treat－ ments，the second one two to
three weeks after the first should give more positive con－ trol．Do not spray and drench the same day．

the 61st legislative session and the pace is beginning to quicken visibly.
More than $\mathbf{1 , 2 0 0}$ House bills and some 700 Senate bills (plus nearly 100 proposed costitutional amendments) were filed by Friday, the deadline for free introduction of bills. A four-fifths majority now is required.
Although floor sessions are brief, a lot of legislation is get-
ting passed - 63 bills last week ting passed- 63 bills last week
alone, including some of the ses alone, including some of the session's major business.
And the lights burn bright at the state capitol after midnight for some committees which
chedule hearings on as many as chedule hearings on as many as a dozen bills at a time. Other committee meetings begin as early as 9 a.m. and last until floor action starts in the House and Senate.
So far, the Senate has reversed its usual form. It is crank ing out general bills faster than the House, where the representatives are pursuing a more-me thodical,
procedure.
