This is accomplished through direct treatments, services, education, research, and cooperative efforts with all health agencies, private, state and federal. The Easter Seal Society does not duplicate services, but strives to fill all unmet needs of the disabled, he added.

The Texas Easter Seal Society is carrying out its fortieth annual Easter Seal Appeal to finance a program of rehabilitation services for crippled children and adults. The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 21 treatment facilities where children and adults are treated regardless of ability to pay. Physical therapy and speech and hearing programs are offered to help the disabled make their lives fuller, de-



Of this \$5.8 billion budget, \$69.7 million is recommended for support of the State Department of Public Safety, an increase of \$10.2 million over the current level of spending by that agency. Difference would pay for the hiring of 150 more highway patrolmen. 50 more narcotics agents and 10 additional intelligence agents, as well as \$864,638 for an addition to the Homer Garrison Jr. Police Training Academy in Austin.

Despite all its help, the Senate bill contained no funds for the anticipated \$220 million teacher-pay-raises, the contemplated \$30 million lift in the welfare ceiling, \$16.5 million for two new medical schools, \$7.5 million for a new dental school or \$6 million for planning new colleges.

Include these high-priorityitems and you are looking at a tax bill a lot closer to \$345 million than \$63.3 million.

However, House Speaker Gus Mutscher has called for an appropriations bill which will require no new revenue. It would include money for new medical school, dental school and college plan-

GAME MANAGEMENT OFFICER JOBS OPEN

Applications are being accepted from now until May 22 for the position of game management officer, a career opportunity in wildlife conservation and law enforcement, according to enforcement supervisor N. E. Glover of San Angelo.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Box 1590, San Angelo, has application forms that will be mailed upon request to men between the ages of 21 and 40 inclusive provided they meet certain specifications.

An applicant must be at least a high school graduate or have an equivalency, at least 5 feet 8 inches tall without shoes, and must weigh at least two pounds and not more than three pounds per inch of height. He must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Texas for at least one year prior to the date of appointment, and will be required

to pass a physical examination. Regional Director Henry Burkett advises that applicants who complete applications and qualioral examination. A background investigation of each successful candidate will be made. Those who rank highest in examinations will be called for an oral interview at regional level before being assigned to the 24th Annual Game Management Officer Training School at Texas A&M University.
