Noah Pruitt Sr. was election judge for the balloting which was held in the city hall. Fifty-six votes were cast including two writes.

Snead and Parker replace Marvin Bryant and Horace Grigg on the city council. Holdover council members are Mayor Royce Lee, and Aldermen Martin Lee, Bill Clark and Cecil Kemp.

The picture which accompanies this column this week is one which Clyde Lee confiscated from an eager camera bug during World War II when he was assigned to the headquarters of General Dwight D. Eisenhower as a military policeman. This picture was made when the Allied Forces were making final plans for the moving of the greatest mass of fighting men and materiel ever assembled from bases in England onto the mainland of Europe.

Lee said just about all the "big shots on our side" were there the day this picture was made.

Lee told us earlier that his recollections of associating with General Eisenhower were most pleasant and the general, in spite of the tremendous responsibility he had as commander of all the allied forces, always managed a friendly greeting and warm smile.

I also had the pleasure of meeting Eisenhower when he was President of the United States, and was making a tour of this area during the big drought of the 1950s. At that time, he continued to carry his pleasant smile and warm greetings. His handshake was strong and he was ramrod straight.

There are varied opinions about the kind of president General Eisenhower made, but it's extremely difficult to find somebody who can find fault with his ability as a military commander or as a man and a warm human being. Few people in all our history have had the confidence of the American people he enjoyed. Everybody trusted Ike because they knew he was honest.

The nation and all its people will miss him.

Students Preparing for Regional UIL Contests

Bronte High School's contestants in regional UIL competition are hard at it this week in an effort to improve their talents and be at their best when they go to Lubbock the weekend of April 18 and 19.

The school will have three students competing in literary events. Randy Barbee will represent this district in the typewriting contest; Kenneth Stroebel will compete in the ready writing contest; and Paula Landers will participate in the

spelling and plain writing contest.

The literary contests will be held April 19 on the Texas Tech campus with the following schedule: ready writing at 9 a.m. in the Administration Building; typewriting at 9 a.m. in the Business Administration Building; spelling and plain writing

at 11 a.m. in the English building.

Track Entries

Bronte trackmen will enter four events at the regional meet. Manfred Thompson is the big gun on the team, as he will enter two events individually, as well as being a member of the sprint relay team.

Roger Graves is Bronte's only entry in a field event by virtue of his first place win in high jump.

Preliminaries in track will be held April 18 on the Texas Tech track field, located south of the Coliseum. The 440 team, composed of Randy Barbee, Nicky Arrott, Willie Zuniga and Thompson, with Bobby Skelton as alternate, will run their preliminary qualifying race at 12:30 p.m.

Thompson will try for a spot in the finals in the 100 yard dash at 1:15 p.m. and in the 220 yard dash at 2 p.m. Finals will be on April 19 with the same time schedule.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said Wednesday morning that he is hopeful the school will have representatives in regional competition from among its golf and tennis players.

Golf contests were held Wednesday in San Angelo, but the results were not available in time for publication. Tennis contests will also be held in San Angelo, Thursday and Friday.

If the golfers qualify for regional, they will play at the Meadowbrook Golf Course in Lubbock on April 18. The regional tennis contests will be held April 18 and 19, with boys contests on the Coronado High School Courts and girls on the Texas Tech courts.

Superintendent Barbee said that Mrs. Royce Fancher, spelling coach; Miss Sandra Pollock, ready writing coach; Miss Linda Jones, typewriting coach; Cecil Toliver and Gaylon Woodard, track coaches, will attend the meet. If the golfers qualify, Coach Clint Low will go with them, and if tennis players make it to region, they will be accompanied by either Coach James Golson or James Raughton.

Crusade of the Americas Revival At First Baptist

A series of Revival Services will be conducted by the First Baptist Church in Bronte next week, April 13-20.

The Rev. Kenneth W. Vaughan, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Eldorado, will be the evangelist. He has been pastor there for six years and prior to that time was pastor of First Baptist Church at Eden for six years. He received his B. A. degree and M. Ed. degrees at Howard Payne College in Brownwood and graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth with a M.R.E. in 1956. He is married and the father of three children.

Walter Johnson, Music Director of Park Heights Baptist Church in San Angelo will be in charge of the singing.

Mr. Johnson, a native of Austin, is a graduate of Baylor University in Waco and Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. He has served as minister of music, youth and education in Arlington Heights Baptist Church, Fort Worth; First Baptist Church, Portales, N. M.; Heights Baptist Church in Albuquerque, N. M. and College Ave. Baptist Church in Fort Worth. He has been with the San Angelo Church since 1958.

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Game Law Violations Up in Texas

AUSTIN — Game management officers of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department cleared 932 game, fish, and water safety violations during February, 1969, a 12 per cent increase over the 833 violations cleared during February, 1968.

The figure "conforms to the upward trend of law violations reported nationally," says J. B. Phillips, law enforcement co-ordinator of the department.

Heading the list were hunting violations, with 508. Of these, 82 were for hunting at night, 65 for no hunting license, 47 for discharging a firearm on a public road, and 40 for trespassing to hunt.

There were 118 fishing violations, 109 for fishing without a license.

Commercial fishing violations numbered 25, and water safety violations numbered 76.

Dispositions of cases shows: 730 convicted, 80 dismissed, nine appealed to a higher court, five had the fine suspended, 78 had

money retained by the county, five found not guilty, one placed on probation, 16 juveniles and 8 voided.

The State retained \$24,826.22 of the \$33,389.76 in assessed fines. Total revenue to the state treasury, including \$1,031.77 in arrest fees, amounted to \$25,857.99. (Texas Parks and Wildlife News).

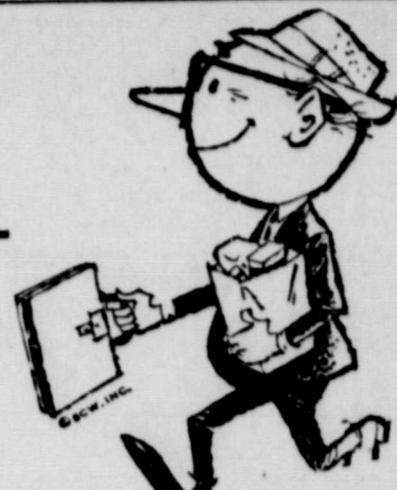

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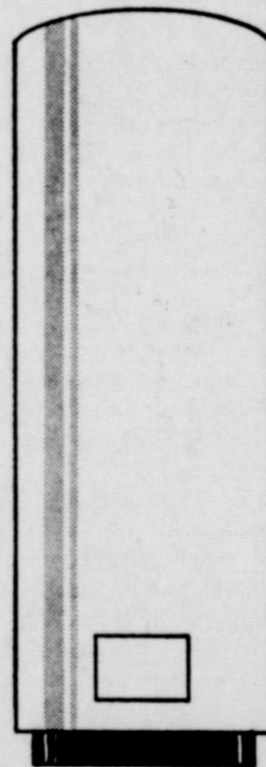

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. Preston Smith's first-state tax program fared unexpectedly well in its initial legislative test.

Anguished cries were raised at a House Revenue and Tax Committee hearing by beer, cigarette, coin-operated laundry and cable television interests at section of a \$175 million revenue bill directly affecting them.

Of the four, however, the coin laundries appeared to make the most impression on the Committee.

Surprisingly, not a witness appeared against Smith's proposal, contained in a separate bill, to place a \$10 state sur-tax on moving traffic violations. He estimated that would raise \$38.5 million.

Also it was a surprise that regular laundry, cleaning, dyeing, parking, repair and machinery rental concerns remained silent. This since they too, would go under the three percent state sales tax if Smith has his way. Naturally, this may or may not indicate consent. Extending the sales tax to include them would raise an additional \$57.8 million during the next two years.

Cigarette distributors claimed that the \$71 million bite they would suffer, if the per-pack tax is raised another four cents to a total of 15 cents, would drive away smokers and might result in a loss of state revenue. They also claimed that Smith's \$6 million tax addition for cigars and other tobacco products would lower consumption and virtually kill the Texas cigar business.

Beer industry spokesmen centered their attack on the fact that they already pay \$4.30 a barrel in state taxes, which is far more than most big beer-producing states charge.

Coin laundries argued they had no way to collect a sales tax in their washing machines' nickel, dime and quarter slots and therefore would have to have their machines revamped, at great cost, to take in pennies.

Cable TV spokesmen made no impression at all with their argument of discrimination.

Smith's proposed one half of one percent chemical products tax is expected to draw heavy fire from that industry in an April 16 hearing.

Floor vote on the tax bill is expected to be delayed about three weeks.

WELFARE DEMANDS GROW — Texans will be asked again—and again and again, if necessary — to increase or do away with the constitutional ceiling on state public-assistance grants to the needy, commonly called "welfare."

And they'll get their chance sooner than they think. Speaker Gus Mutscher and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes have agreed to ask the Legislature to call a special election for Aug. 5 to vote on at least five proposed constitutional amendments...and possibly eight.

In addition to expressing their views on increasing welfare funds, voters would give their views on providing death and disability benefits to volunteer firemen; the 3.5 billion Texas Water Plan; removing the constitutional interest-rate maximum on five types of bonds; and authorizing \$200 million more in bonds to finance the Texas Opportunity Plan of college-student loans.

Prime emergency is in the "welfare" situation. Texas' program of minimal assistance to families with dependent children

is growing thinner and thinner because of the constitutional spending limit of \$60 million.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) now gets \$6.15 million of the \$60 million. But grants to individual families are going down because of increases in the number of families applying.

These increases are due to court decisions broadening the program; a Medicaid requirement that applicants for that program be on welfare; and poverty workers informing poor people of their right to AFDC.

In September, the Department of Public Welfare had to cut maximum grants for a family with four or more dependent children from \$135 a month to \$123. Another cut scheduled for May will reduce benefits paid 8,234 families and will eliminate from the program another 2,470.

In 1967, the Legislature proposed raising the ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million, but the voters defeated the proposition.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRESS — Legislative pace slowed last

week as lawmakers devoted Monday to eulogizing the late President Eisenhower, and took off at mid-week for an Easter holiday.

Highlight of the week was final passage of the \$3.5 billion water revenue bond constitutional amendment which will go on the statewide election ballots August 5 along with several other proposals.

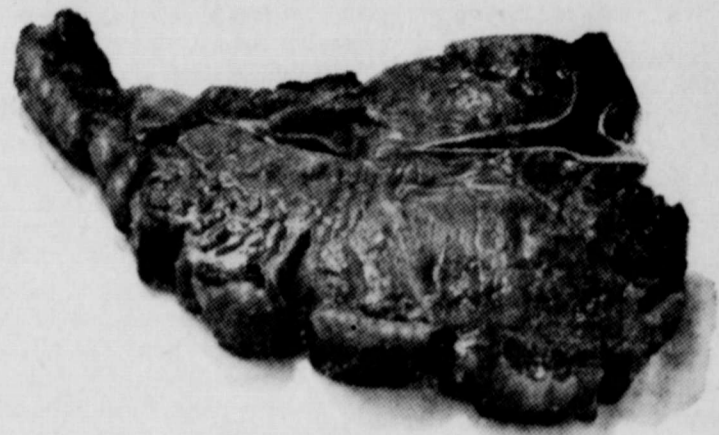
House also approved a resolution for an August vote on removing obsolete provisions from the State's constitution. Later, representatives passed a bill to create a University of Texas at Dallas.

Senate again took the workload prize. Among 45 bills it passed in a single day was a controversial measure to restore union bargaining rights of city bus company employees when taken under municipal control. Senate advanced key measures to implement water development plans, voted to raise retirement benefits of elective state officials 50 per cent and provided procedures for prosecution of corporations as water air polluters.

Senate education committee approved a \$220 million teacher pay raise bill. But the same measure was detoured to a House education sub-committee after hearings which drew the largest attendance of the session.

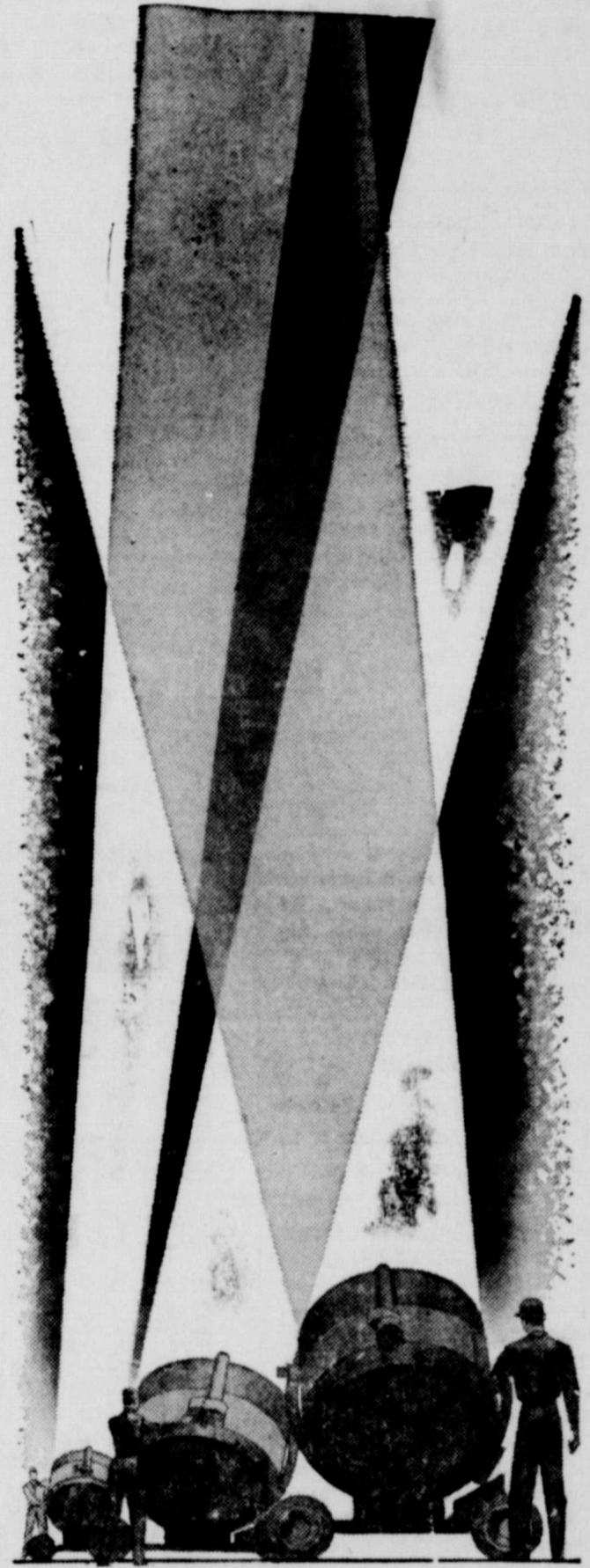
