end in Lubbock. The golfers turned in a low 312, 20 strokes below second place winner Anton.

Monico Flores, 82; Ronald Cooper, 84; Otis Rolls, 86.

The win at Lubbock permits the Bronte golfers to compete in the state meet which will be held in May at Austin.

Scores of other teams ran from Anton's 332 on up to 454. Competing against the Bronte lads were teams from Anthony, Amherst, Anton, Booker, Estelline, Forsan, Follett, Fort Davis, Jayton, Grandfalls Loraine, Matador, Meadow and Tornillo.

Coach Clint Low said he was well pleased with the showing made by his charges, and added that they are all looking forward to competing for the state championship.

Bronte Hi Senior To Try for Award

Bennie Carol Oglesby has been named by school officials as the Bronte representative in the "Outstanding West Texas Scholar" award program, sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

She and other nominees from this area will be honored at a luncheon on May 10 in the cafeteria of Angelo State College. Also planning to attend the luncheon are Prin. James Golson and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Oglesby.

A letter from the San Angelo Board of City Development stated: "The nominations were based on the students' exceptional scholastic achievement, character and citizenship while participating in school activities."

Clarence E. Arrott, well known Coke County rancher, was honored at the regular meeting of Bronte Noon Lions Club last Thursday when he was presented a plaque naming him the Outstanding Soil Conservationist for 1968.

Arrott, who operates 6,079 acres with his son, LeDrew, lives seven miles southwest of Bronte. He has been a cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District since its beginning 20 years ago.

Arrott owns 1600 acres and has under lease about 440 acres of land. His primary work in conservation has been brush control and range management practices. He is furnishing land on which trial plots have been established for carrying out chemical and mechanical control of brush along with deferment. He is always ready to show these areas to individuals or groups who are interested in seeing the results of conservation practices. One of the main points in which he believes in range management is resting pastures during and following

brush control work.

Arrott's leased land receives conservation measures just the same as he gives his home place. Recently when he leased a ranch that was about denuded of cover, he let the pastures rest for six months in order to start recovery of better grasses.

"Clarence Arrott has been a big help in getting range management practices accepted in the district," said W. E. Jacoby, county conservationist.

Included among the practices which won Arrott the plaque and the title of Outstanding Conservationist were: brush control on 1800 acres; construction of cross fences, 6000 feet; stockwater ponds, three; water well, six; deferment, 2400 acres; proper grazing use, 5363 acres; terraces, 7500 feet.

In addition to his farm and ranch work, Arrott is a member of the local ASCS Committee and a director of the Federal Land Bank.

He and his wife, Marie, are active workers in the Coke County Farm Bureau and spent many years as 4-H Club leaders in working with the youth of the county. Mrs. Arrott is secretary of the local Farm Bureau and active in home demonstration work.

They are active members of the First Methodist Church in Bronte and he is a member of the Lions Club.

Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Arrott and Mr. and Mrs. LeDrew Arrott were guests of honor at the meeting last week. Joe Antilly of Abilene, a member of the state SCD board of directors, presented the plaque to Arrott.

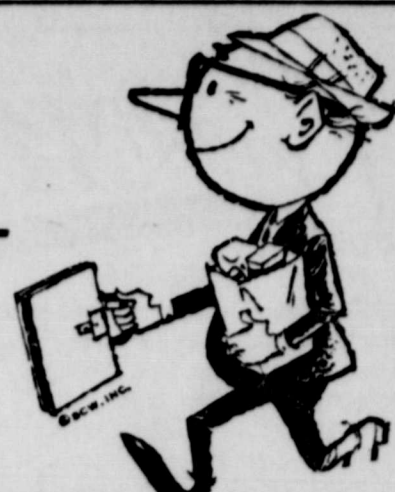

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AUSTIN, Tex. — Nine proposed constitutional amendments, headed by a recommended boost in the welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million and a \$3.5 billion water bond proposition, are ready for an August 5 ballot.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. supervised drawing to determine ballot positions as soon as the legislature cleared the measures.

Here are the amendments as they will appear on the ballot:

HJR 3 — to delete obsolete provisions from the constitution.

HJR 9 — to authorize a \$3.5 billion water revenue bond issue for financing the state's share of a \$9 billion statewide water plan.

SJR 31 — To raise the present \$4,800 a year salary of state legislators to the state-paid maximum level of district judges (\$18,000) and give the lieutenant governor and house speaker half the pay of the governor (about \$20,000 a year).

SJR 6 — to exempt non-profit water supply corporations from taxation.

SJR 8 — to raise the public welfare outlay limit from \$60 million to \$80 million a year.

HJR 7 — to raise the constitutional interest rate limit on some state government bonds.

HJR 4 — to provide for assistance payments to survivors of volunteer firemen, police and Texas Youth Council employees killed on duty.

HJR 50 — to authorize an additional \$200 million in Texas Opportunity Plan student loan funds.

HJR 8 — to provide for annual legislative sessions.

Voters last November rejected a raise in the welfare ceiling to \$75 million which has resulted in two cuts in benefit payments) and a hike in lawmaker pay to \$8,400 a year.

LEGISLATIVE ACTION — Controversial constitutional amendment to legalize sale of liquor-by-the-drink in Texas has been cleared for statewide vote on November 3, 1970.

House voted 101-44 for submission of the issue approved by the Senate last month.

House passed a bill to comply with the federal law and provide mandatory inspection and regulation of livestock slaughtering housed by the State Department of Health. Bill by Sen. Jim Bates and Rep. Rayford Price already had passed the Senate but since the House added two amendments — to define legally "inedible animal product" — and to allow "overtime fees" for inspections — the bill went back to the Senate for approval of the amendments.

House also completed action on its \$5.7 billion budget bill, moving it to conference committee to resolve differences with the Senate's \$5.8 billion version. Major interest centers on House riders, including proposed withholding of funds for largely-Negro Texas Southern University Law school and a curb on use of helicopters by Department of Public Safety for traffic policing.

Among other major measures cleared by the legislature were: HB 117, making Texas governmental units (except school districts) liable for damage suits due to negligent acts of personnel; SB 5 and SB 6 permitting criminal misdemeanor prosecution of corporations for air and water pollution.

BILLS — When the Supreme Court ruled the existing law on dangerous drugs out, Rep. Jack Ogg of Houston introduced a bill

to ban the use of LSD and hallucinogenic drugs. Ogg's bill provides for a jail sentence from 30 days to two years for the use of those drugs — or a fine of up to \$3,000.

Approval by Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah would allow students who graduate from an accredited Texas law school and have already gained a bachelor's degree to not have to take the bar exam before practicing. Bill is in subcommittee of the House State Affairs Committee.

Bill by Rep. Grant Jones of Abilene was given a favorable report by the House Judiciary Committee. It would keep any facts of settlement of a claim from being admitted into evidence in lawsuits involving personal injury damages arising from the same occurrence.

Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur has five bills to update and fortify the workmen's compensation laws. Four bills deal with compensation for employees of Texas A&M, Texas Tech and the U of T system. Last deals with municipal employees. All are in subcommittee for further study.

Senate has knocked a farm workers' exemption out of the \$1.25 minimum wage bill by Sens. Joe Bernal and Jim Bates. An amendment by Sen. Jack Hightower would have exempted all farm workers except those that do piece work. Bill went to the House.

CONGRESSIONAL Redistricting — Anticipating U.S. Supreme Court orders that Texas must redistrict congressional districts to mathematical exactness after that court ordered the state of Missouri to do just that, Governor Preston Smith asked the Legislature to create a 7-man fact-getting committee and present them to the 1971 Legislature. Committee will be headed by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. and will include three state senators and three House members.

Governor said he had been assured 1970 federal census statistics would be available in November of 1970 on computer tapes and proposed a committee budget of \$225,000 which would include data computer rents.

He reasoned that this preparation would enable the 1971 Legislature to redistrict realistically. In case the state is ordered to redistrict before the 1970 census, Smith said the committee would have current information ready for legislative use in a special session.

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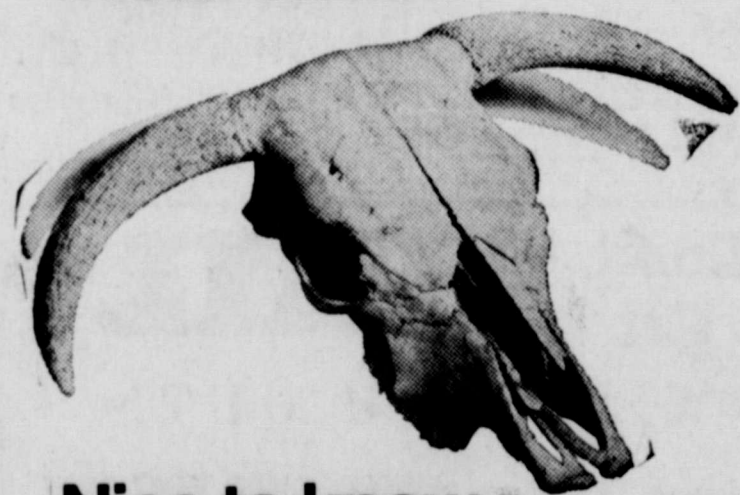

Coke Pioneer Day Observed in R-Lee

A large group of citizens gathered at the Community Center in Robert Lee Wednesday at noon to celebrate Coke County's 80th birthday. A covered dish luncheon was served at noon and a short program featured students of Mrs. Wilson Bryan, music instructor in Robert Lee Schools.

At 2 p.m. the group went to Robert Lee Cemetery where a historical marker at the grave of Cary Allen Gates was dedicated. Mr. Gates was a confederate veteran and moved to Coke County in 1906. He continued to make Robert Lee his home until his death in 1927.

The marker bears the following inscription:

"Cary Allen Gates (October 4, 1836-July 27, 1927). Born near town of Paint Lick, Kentucky. Came to Collin County, Texas, 1858. Joined Confederate Army at McKinney, October, 1861, as private in Army of Tennessee. Served in five divisions. Was in Battle of Chickamauga; hurt at Murfreesboro, Tennessee; shot through wrist at Spanish Fort, Alabama. Served till end of war. Married twice, he and first wife Mary Jane Sadler had ten children. Moved to Coke County, 1906. Spent rest of life here."

A resolution has been passed by the Texas Legislature congratulating the county and its citizens on this 80th anniversary. The resolution states in part: "Resolved that the House of Representatives of the 61st Legislature of the State of Texas hereby pay respect to the citizens of Coke County and to all those courageous men and women whose ideals and principles have

made an indelible imprint on Texas history, past and present."

The resolution was introduced by the county's representative in the legislature, George Baker of Fort Stockton, and was signed by Speaker Gus Mutchler and Chief Clerk Dorothy Hallmon.
