Senate passage of a muchamended $\$ 1.25$ an hour minimum wage bill, with a push from Lt Gov. Ben Barnes, highlighted the action. Bill survived Senate filibusters. Now it goes to the House where Speaker Gus Mutscher reports its fate will be decided in a floor battle.
Also triumphant over filibusters was the bill to set up Texas State Technical Institute under a separate governing board with Waco, Harlingen and Amarillo areas.
