### 3-Truck Collision Damage Heavy

A three-truck accident occurred about 10:45 a.m. Monday on Highway 277 northeast of Bronte. Damage to the vehicles was estimated at \$37,500, but no injuries were reported.

The accident occurred when a 1968 International truck and semi-trailer driven by Alton Crowley of Winters and a 1964 Chevrolet truck and trailer driven by Bobby Harris, also of Winters, parked alongside the highway. A Dr. Pepper truck, a 1968 GMC, driven by C. E. Steward of Abilene, collided with the two parked vehicles, scattering soft drink bottles over a 150 foot area.

Members of the team are Otto Sonnenburg, David Scott and Tony Barrett. The boys will be competing against some 375 boys from over Texas, who are, as Henry put it, "the cream of the crop."

Bronte's team won a spot in the state competition last weekend when members placed in the upper 10 per cent of those entered in area contests at Lubbock.

Henry said only eight out of the 80 teams in this area will be allowed to compete in the state contests on the campus of Texas A&M University. This year's team is the first from Bronte in several years to advance to the state level.

Included in the judging will be two classes of beef cattle, two classes of sheep and three classes of hogs. In addition to judging the seven classes, the teams will have to grade two classes of feeder cattle and one class of slaughter cattle.

The livestock judging team will stay at the Surrey Inn in Caldwell. They will return to Bronte Saturday night.

An interesting note on the area contest is that four of the eight teams qualifying for state are in the Concho District, and include Bronte, Robert Lee, Sterling City and Eldorado.

In the regional contest, McCutchen was medalist with a 72, and Williams was runnerup with a 74.

The golf team will stay at the Austin Motel, while they are in the capital.

### Phonies on the Phone

Crooked sales pitches via the telephone are on the rise. They trap people into buying things they don't need or into seeing salesmen they don't want to see. Tricks include free gifts, phoney surveys and how to get-rich-quick schemes.

Here are tips which may warn you of phonies.

\*The caller gives no identification.

\*He says he is making a survey and requests a personal interview.

\*He assures you he is not selling anything — just wants to interview you as part of an advertising campaign.

\*He describes a "special offer" that your common sense tells you is too good to be true.

\*He reels off prices, costs, offers and questions so fast that you cannot follow what he is telling you.

What should you do? The Better Business Bureau suggests replying: "Please send me a letter about the matter. I'll consider your offer after I've had a chance to investigate. Thank you for calling. Good-bye."

This way you discourage a gyp artist while not cutting yourself off from someone whose business is perfectly legitimate.

Legitimate callers also can be a nuisance, if they call at an inconvenient time or they refuse to take no for an answer. If you aren't interested — just say good-bye and hang up.

### Food For Thought

At least two cups of milk a day is recommended for all adults who need the calcium in milk for strong bones and teeth. "Eaten" milk counts toward this requirement and a good share of the day's milk can appear in soups, cereals, sauces, casseroles and dessert.

Evaporated milk is ideal "eating" milk as it contains twice the nutrients of whole milk. It blends easily with other ingredients and adds extra richness and creaminess to sauces and soups. Use it in soup stocks and with canned soups in place of water. Mash potatoes with evaporated milk for smooth and fine flavored potatoes. When scrambling eggs, add 1/2 cup evaporated milk for every 4 eggs.

The food dollar isn't what it seems. Today we actually spend less, percentage-wise, of our income on food than ever before. Percentage of income spent by average Americans for food declined from 20.7 percent in 1957 to 17.4 percent in 1967, down 17.2 percent in 1968, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture statistics.

## Coke Pioneer Day Observed in R-Lee

The fifth annual Pioneer Day sponsored by the Coke County Historical Survey committee was celebrated with a covered dish luncheon at the Recreation Center in the Coke County Park in Robert Lee, Wednesday, April 23, which was the 80th anniversary of the organization of Coke County, which took place on April 23, 1889.

Persons attending the affair came from every community in Coke County — Robert Lee, Bronte, Sanco, Silver, Hayrick, Edith, Tennyson and Divide.

Out-of-county towns represented included Abilene, El Paso, Happy, Houston, Lubbock, Roscoe and San Angelo.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, chairman of the survey committee, read a House resolution commending the citizens of Coke County and congratulating them on the 80th anniversary of the county's organization. Mrs. Yarbrough read to the group a letter from Mrs. Lula Newton Beeman, recently hospitalized in Sweetwater. "I've always been proud to call myself a Coke County oldtimer," Mrs. Beeman wrote, "I wish I could be with you today and I hope I can be there next year."

Entertainment was provided by Mrs. Wilson Bryan's music students from Robert Lee schools. Nineteen boys and girls dressed in red, white and blue vests and bow ties, sang songs from "up with people." Two solos were sung by Harold Carver, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Carver of Robert Lee.

Activities of the day were concluded by the dedication of an historical marker at the Robert Lee Cemetery, where the group assembled to pay honor to Confederate soldier, C. A. Gates, buried there. His daughter, the late Mrs. J. E. Roane, shortly before her death, contributed funds to the Coke C.H.S.C. for purchase of the marker. The soldier Cary Allen Gates, came to Coke County in 1906 and spent the remainder of his life here.

Unveiling the marker were Mr. Gates' descendants, Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Jacobs, Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Roane and daughter, Myna Kay.

## Historical Tour Extends Over 48 Miles

A 48-mile "Scenic and Historical Tour" sponsored by the Runnels and Coke County Historical Survey Committees was held Saturday afternoon, April 26.

A total of 50 persons, mainly adults who are interested in the early history of the two counties but including a few teen-agers who were interested in the soldier-Indian aspect of the tour, took the trip.

Leaving Winters Scout Hut at 1:30 p.m., they visited six sites, which are important landmarks in the history of the two counties, some of which are well-known and at least two of them not so well known.

Three miles northwest of Winters the group saw the lone grave of a Civil War Veteran, I. M. Barton, who was born Nov. 7, 1817 and died May 2, 1892. Mr. Barton built and operated a one-stand gin in Winters in 1890. Upon his death, he was buried at his home before there was a cemetery at Winters.

Passing by Pumphrey, a pioneer village, the caravan continued to Wingate cemetery, where Mayor Wade White told the story of the important battle between Rangers and Indians which took place at nearby Valley Creek. It was in that battle that the notorious Kiowa Chief Big Foot was killed.

From Wingate the tour continued via U.S. 277 to Old Fort Chadbourne on the C. H. Wylie Ranch in Coke. After circling the old Parade grounds at the old fort and viewing the ruins, they

made a stop in a liveoak grove near the Ft. Chadbourne Cemetery, where Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough related the history of the fort and the nearby cemetery, both of which were established in 1852. She then led the group to an Indian Rock Shelter near the cemetery. Here the group viewed Indian carvings still in tact on the ceiling of the cave-like shelter.

Between the cemetery and the rock shelter, Mrs. Yarbrough pointed out several rock-covered graves outside the fenced cemetery. According to the late C. H. Wylie, there are about 30 such graves scattered over the ranch, all unmarked except one. Its marker bears the name "M. Graham."

Last stop was to read a marker at Poe Corner on the return trip to Winters. The Coke group returned to Bronte as they had seen the Poe marker on their way to Winters.

Rankin Pace of Winters is chairman of the Runnels County Historical Survey Committee. Mrs. Yarbrough is chairman of the Coke County HSC.

AUSTIN, Tex. — After a slow Monday - Wednesday, legislators wound up last week in a blaze of speed, turning out more than 100 bills on climactic Thursday.

Senate passage of a much-amended \$1.25 an hour minimum wage bill, with a push from Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, highlighted the action. Bill survived Senate filibusters. Now it goes to the House where Speaker Gus Mutscher reports its fate will be decided in a floor battle.

Also triumphant over filibusters was the bill to set up Texas State Technical Institute under a separate governing board with authority to operate facilities in Waco, Harlingen and Amarillo areas. It now is known as James Connally Technical Institute and is under the Texas A&M University System. Only those courses which area junior colleges can't or won't offer could be taught in this job preparation field. Bill goes to Gov. Preston Smith for signature.

House earlier voted to split the Parks and Wildlife Department into separate agencies regulating parks and game and fish. Senate apparently is cool to the "divorce" plan.

House also voted to create University of Texas of Permian Basin near the present Odessa College campus and agreed the name of the Liquor Control Board should be changed to Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

Both houses agreed on bills to provide for misdemeanor action against corporations charged with air and water pollution.

A Senate-passed bill would permit admission of oral confessions as evidence in criminal trials.

**WATER PLAN ADOPTED** — Nine billion dollar Texas Water Plan has been formally adopted by Texas Water Development Board, and implementing legislation is moving fast.

Water Development Board accepted the plan, which includes a proposal to import some 12 to 13 million acre feet of surplus water annually from the lower Mississippi River to meet state requirements to the year 2020.

Water Rights Commission set the stage by entering an official finding that the plan "gives adequate consideration to protection of existing water rights and takes into account modes and procedures for equitable adjustment of water rights to be affected."

**SCREWORM CASES FEW** — Texas had only eight cases of screwworms confirmed in March, which — with nine cases found in February — marks the end of the serious screwworm outbreaks last summer and fall.

Spring is about here, however, and the Texas Animal Health Commission foresees "more problems." Rain and warm weather hurt the control program.

A joint report of the Commission and the Animal Health Division of the US Department of Agriculture says that 200,272,000 sterile flies were dropped in Texas during March to fight the expected increase.

Report also shows that 184 Texas counties are being tested and 32 others are under modified certified testing.

**TEACHER SHORTAGE GRANTS** — US Office of Education has awarded Texas Education Agency six grants totalling more than \$600,000 to attract and qualify teachers to meet the critical teacher shortage.

A TEA spokesman said the projects represent a cooperative effort among six regional education service centers — at Amarillo,

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

"(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.
