Redistricting Splits Bronte

Commissioner Howard Brock brought a map of the City of Bronte to The Enterprise office this week which shows tentative division of the city into precincts 2 and 4, in order to conform to the Supreme Court ruling of one man, one vote.

The line starts at the north edge of town on Washington Raughton, who had a score of Street (commonly known as Church Street) and continues southward to Reilly Street, then it turns west for one block and then back south again to the south edge of the city.

Everything west of this line would go into precinct 4, served by Commissioner Jack Corley. All property east of this line would remain in precinct 2, served by Commissioner Brock.
