Bronte area citizens have an invitation to attend dedication ceremonies Saturday at 1:30 p.m. for the new Robert Lee Dam and E. V. Spence Reservoir. A large crowd is expected for the ceremonies which will be held immediately upstream from the north end of the dam.

The dedication speaker will be

Representative Omar Burleson, congressman from this district. The program will begin at 1:30 p.m. Prior to the program, a barbecue lunch will be served at noon. Tickets have been on sale for the lunch for more than a week at the city hall in Robert Lee. The ticket sale was closed Wednesday afternoon.

In addition to Congressman Burleson, other state and national dignitaries have been invited and are expected to attend.

Robert Lee Dam was built by the Colorado River Municipal Water District, headquartered in Big Spring. The district has contracts to sell water to a number of West Texas cities, including Odessa, Midland, Big Spring, Snyder and Stanton. In the last few months San Angelo also has made arrangements to buy water from the Coke County Lake.

O. H. Ivie, general manager of the CRMWD, said last week that he is looking for a large crowd to attend the luncheon and dedication ceremonies.

The dam was started in the fall of 1966 after Clement Bros. of Hickory, N. C., were the successful bidders with an offer to build the dam for \$8,686,440. Terry Construction Co. of Greenville, S. C., was a subcontractor and did much of the construction.

The dam is over four miles long and rises to a height of 136 feet above the stream bed. It is 28 feet wide at the crown. The lake's capacity is 488,769 acre feet, which is 159.2 billion gallons. A total of 14,950 acres of land will be inundated when the water is at spillway level, and the lake has a shoreline of 137 miles.

Mrs. Knierim died at 8:40 a.m. Saturday at Baptist Memorial Geriatric Hospital in San Angelo following a long illness.

She was born June 22, 1882, in Palo Pinto County, and came to Coke County at the age of eight months. She was the daughter of the first practicing physician in this county, Dr. J. F. Clark and Mrs. Louvenia Clark.

Mrs. Knierim lived at the foot of Cedar Mountain three miles southwest of Bronte until 1902 when she became a Governess on a Sonora Ranch. She was married to Robert Knierim September 22, 1905, on Cedar Mountain. Mr. Knierim, who was in business in Bronte continuously for 55 years, preceded her in death in December, 1961. He was known throughout Texas as "Bob, Water on the Brain," as he worked on his own time and money for 50 years trying to build a dam on the Colorado River for irrigation as he could see this country could produce lavishly with water.

Mrs. Knierim was a member of the Methodist Church and was active in church work, serving many years as a Sunday School teacher. She was among the group who have lived the longest time in Coke County.

New Laws On Student Transfers Passed by Legislature, Now Effective

AUSTIN — Texas parents who wish to transfer their children from one public school district to another — without changing their own place of residence — have been given a new route by the State Legislature.

This new plan is outlined in detail by the Texas Education Agency in a letter mailed to school superintendents throughout the state May 26.

The act, passed by the 61st Legislature and signed by Governor Preston Smith on May 9, repeals transfer methods which have been in effect since 1925 and 1935.

Parents will no longer apply to the county superintendent. Instead, they will now go directly to the superintendent of the school district they wish their children to enter. The parent or guardian of the child must apply in writing at the receiving school superintendent's office. If the district agrees to receive the non-resident student, the parents or guardian will be notified in writing.

The old June 1 deadline for filing transfer applications will be extended, probably by several weeks, when the State Board of Education meets in Austin, Agency officials explain. The board is also expected to adopt policies for implementing the new law.

Parents who have already applied for transfer to the county superintendents will be notified in writing to contact the receiving school district. If their applications have already been sent to the county office, they will be forwarded to the receiving school district.

Parents who transfer their children into another district may be required to pay tuition if the grades are taught in the home district. If, however, the grades are not taught, the home district pays the tuition.

The fee paid by parents may not exceed the difference between what it costs the school district to support a student and the state funds received. This amount will be based on the per student costs during the 1968-69 school year. The state per capita funds for each child transferred out of his home district will travel with him. Average daily attendance, if any, recorded in the home district during the previous year will also be transferred.

The new law, which goes into effect immediately, applies to all Texas school children over six and under 21 years of age who are not high school graduates.

UCRA Directors Go to Water Meet

L. T. Youngblood of Bronte, Gerald Allen of Robert Lee and Dale Leddy of San Angelo, all members of the board of directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority, attended a Governor's Committee of 500 in Austin Monday called to give support to the \$3.5 billion Texas Water Plan. They also attended a reception held Monday evening at the Governor's Mansion. In addition to Governor Preston Smith, former Governors John Connally and Price Daniel were present.

The Governor's Committee is the organization set up to campaign for the passage of Constitutional Amendment 2 in the August 5 special election, the next step in the Texas Water Plan.

Governor Smith said, "This is one of the most important elections in Texas history. It will determine whether or not Texas can act in time to meet the future needs of an adequate water supply."

Former Governors Connally and Daniel gave their full endorsement to the amendment. Each spoke in behalf of its passage. Another ex-Governor, Allan Shivers, was to have been present but he was called to the bedside of his son, Allan Jr., 23, who was seriously injured in a swimming accident at Eufaula, Alabama on Friday. Young Shivers is in the hospital in Columbus, Georgia.

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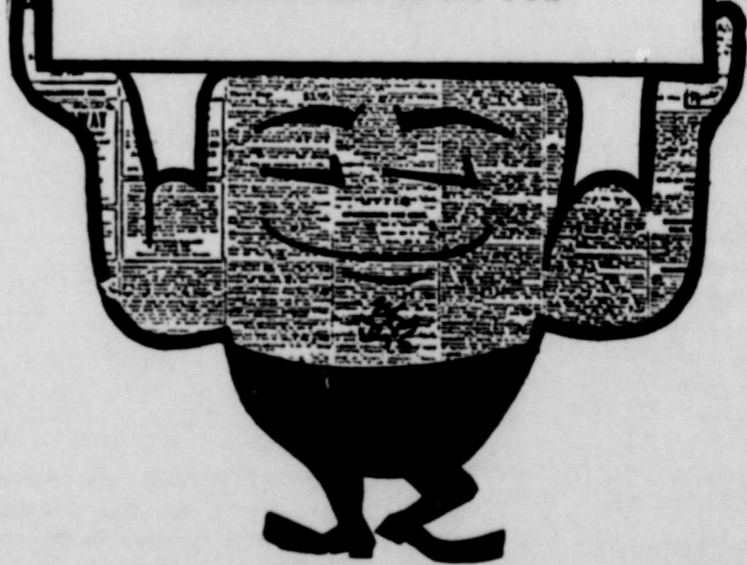

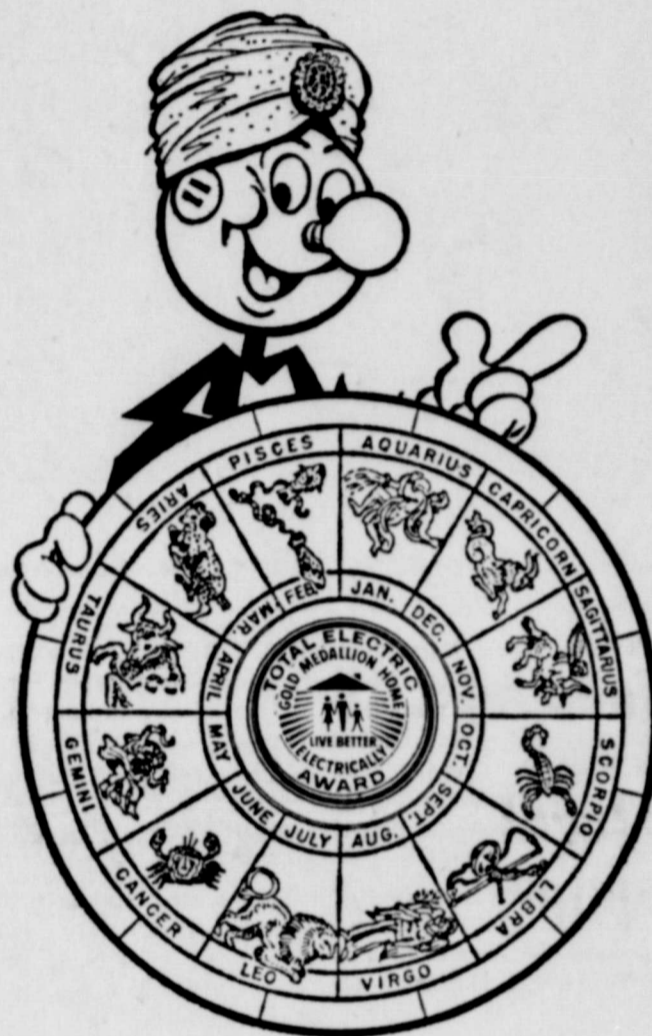

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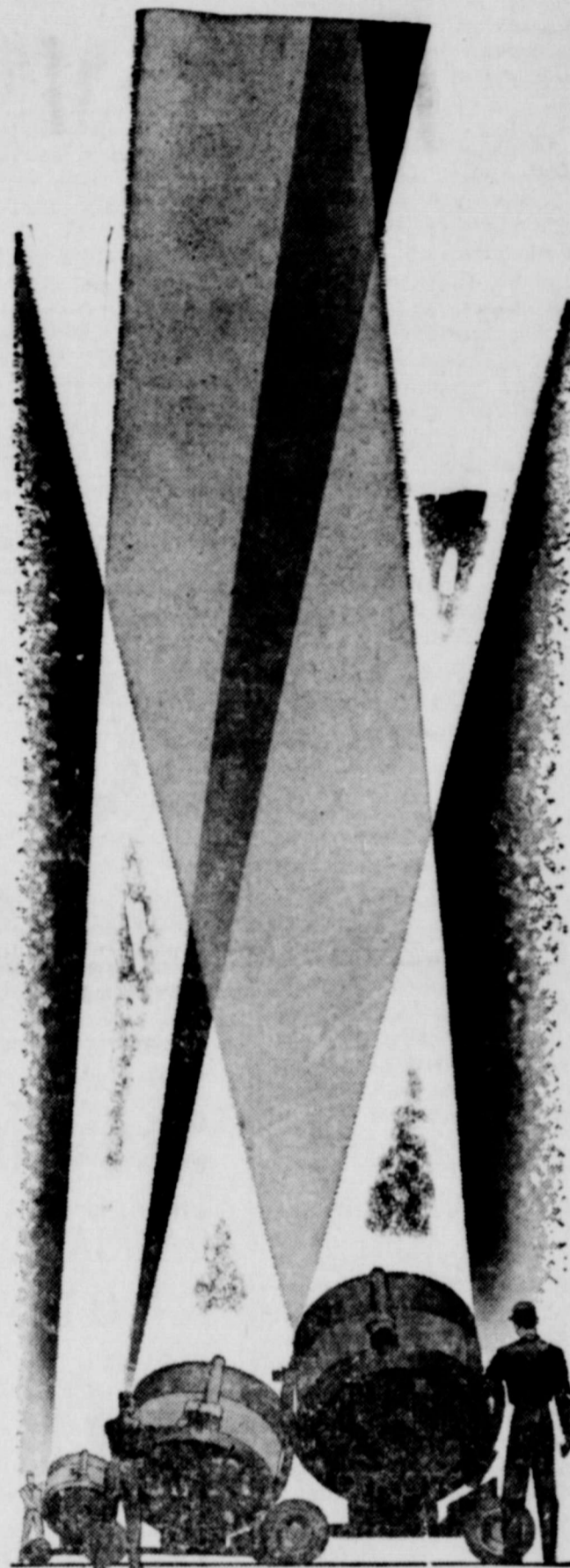
