Plan was submitted last month to the U. S. Department of Jus tice by Governor Preston Smith's Criminal Justice Council,
With approval will go $\$ 1.1 \mathrm{mil}$ lion in action grants to state and local units of government for war on crime
An initial planning grant of $\$ 830,350$ started the action, and $\$ 235,000$ more was freed for the purchase of riot control equipment. If this program is success-
ful and continued, $\$ 11$ million more in federal aid will go to Texas in federal fiscal year 1970. Plans of cities and regions were cleared through the Criminal Justice Office for inclusion in a statewide approach. Experts in trials, sentencing, corrections, pardons and paroles participated in the drafting of the overall program.
