

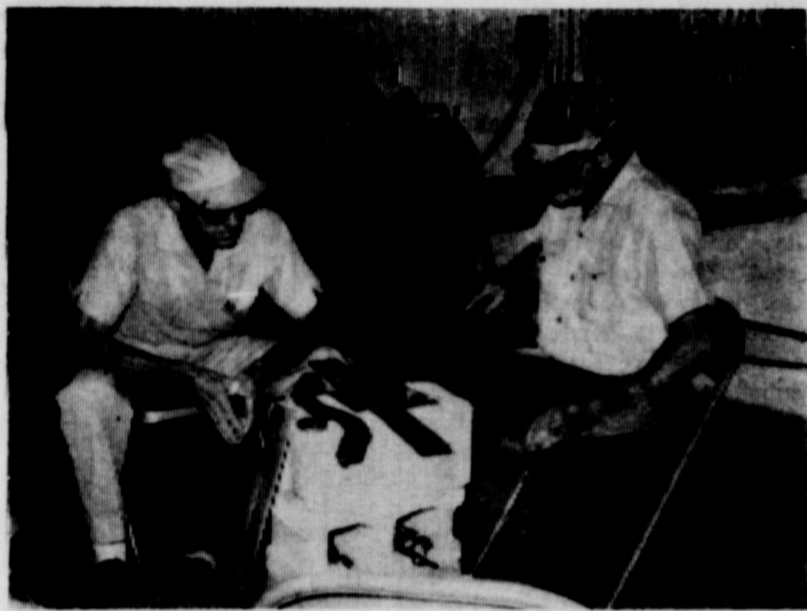

Bronte city council adopted a budget Monday night which calls for an expenditure of \$67,865.71 in all of the city's funds during the fiscal year which began April 1 and ends March 31, 1970. Mayor pro-tem Cecil Kemp presided in the absence of Mayor Royce Lee. Other council members present were Martin Lee, Bill Clark, Ben D. Snead and Jerry Parker.

In other business, the council passed a resolution in protest of a movement to tax the income received by purchasers of municipal bonds. It was brought out that freedom from federal income tax on such bonds keeps the interest rate low and makes them more attractive to potential buyers.

Below are the expected amount of income, estimated expenditures and income surplus in the city's funds for the fiscal year:

Waterworks fund: estimated receipts, \$32,646.73; estimated expenditures, \$32,021.73; indicated surplus, \$625.00.

Interest and sinking fund: estimated receipts, \$1,821.50; estimated expenditures, \$1,573.50; indicated surplus, \$248.00.

General fund: estimated receipts, \$20,778.61; estimated expenditures, \$15,848.84; indicated surplus, \$4,929.77.

Sanitary sewer system fund: estimated receipts, \$9,077.54; estimated expenditures, \$8,770.60; indicated surplus, \$306.94.

Social security fund: estimated receipts, \$2,254.36; estimated expenditures, \$1,539.04; indicated

surplus, \$715.32.

Special sanitary sewer system bond fund, series 1960; estimated receipts, \$12,228.47; estimated expenditures, \$7,112.00; indicated surplus, \$5,116.47.

Contingencies fund: estimated receipts \$3,000.00; estimated ex-

penditures, \$1,000.00; indicated surplus, \$2,000.00.

Total available cash in all funds totals \$81,807.21. Subtracting total estimated expenditures of \$67,865.71 from this figure leaves a total estimated surplus of \$13,941.50 in all funds.

Court Decision to Change Bond Voting

Texas Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., said Monday that the United States Supreme Court decision in a Louisiana case last week has invalidated a Texas law which restricts voting in revenue bond elections to property owners.

By statute the Secretary of State is the chief election officer of Texas and is responsible for obtaining and maintaining uniformity in the application, operation and interpretation of the state's election laws.

On Monday of last week the United States Supreme Court struck down a Louisiana law which gave only property taxpayers the right to vote in elections called to approve the issuance of revenue bonds by a municipal utility, on the ground that it violated the equal protection clause of the Federal Constitution because it excluded otherwise qualified voters who were as substantially affected and directly interested in the matter voted upon as those who were permitted to vote.

The Texas Constitution contains a provision that only qualified electors who own property which has been duly rendered for taxation are eligible to vote in an election for the purpose of issuing bonds. The Supreme Court of Texas has interpreted this provision as applying to elections for issuing public utility bonds which are to be retired from revenues produced by the utility, as well as to elections for issuing bonds to be retired by levy of a property tax.

Secretary Dies said that the property ownership requirement could no longer be imposed in future elections for issuance of revenue bonds. He pointed out that the United States Supreme Court decision applies only to revenue bond elections and that the court has not ruled on the validity of a property ownership requirement in a tax bond election.

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

AUSTIN, Tex. — Biggest organized plan in Texas history — to fight crime — is in the approval stage, with early approval anticipated.

Plan was submitted last month to the U. S. Department of Justice by Governor Preston Smith's Criminal Justice Council.

With approval will go \$1.1 million in action grants to state and local units of government for brand new approaches to the war on crime.

An initial planning grant of \$830,350 started the action, and \$235,000 more was freed for the purchase of riot control equipment. If this program is successful and continued, \$11 million more in federal aid will go to Texas in federal fiscal year 1970.

Plans of cities and regions were cleared through the Criminal Justice Office for inclusion in a statewide approach. Experts in crime prevention, apprehension, trials, sentencing, corrections, pardons and paroles participated in the drafting of the overall program.

Obesity Begins in Infancy

More attention should be directed to the dieting and overfeeding of children according to Dr. Jules Hirsch, professor and senior physician at Rockefeller University, New York. Fat cells, which compose adipose tissue, are increased by overfeeding in infancy and pre-adolescent years. These fat cells remain with the children for a life time and studies show that the cells never disappear once they are laid down.

Fat cells may decrease in size, but not in number. A weight loss can be demonstrated by a shrinkage of the cells, which still continue to function. A craving for food may be a signal put out by the fat cells that they wish to be refilled. This may contribute to the difficulty in keeping weight off once it has been lost.

Dr. Hirsch notes that the obese person has about three times as many fat cells as the lean one. There are about 27 trillion fat cells in the body of a lean person as compared to about 77 trillion in an obese person.

The prevention of obesity should begin with infancy. The healthy baby is not necessarily the chubby one seen in so many baby pictures. It appears now that many of these infants are obese.

Timely Food Facts

Harvest is underway on Texas truck farms and supplies of many fresh vegetables will increase within the next week or 10 days.

Corn is an excellent choice. Red potatoes, squash, bell peppers, green onions, cucumbers, purple hull peas, carrots, beets and dry yellow onions are in good supply.

Cantaloupe at attractive price level highlights most fruit counters. Watermelon is more plentiful. Bananas, pineapples, oranges and grapefruit are the more economically priced items.

Honeydew melons, early peaches, Bing cherries, seedless grapes and plums are mostly luxury items at current price levels.

At the meat counter, beef chuck steaks and roasts, boneless rolled roast, round steaks and ground beef are featured in some markets this week. Boston butt roasts, ham portions and picnics are among the better pork choices.

June is celebrated as dairy month: the time when output of fluid milk hits the highest level of the season. Prices will be at or near seasonal lows. You'll find many delicious choices of fluid milk and processed dairy products at the dairy counter.

Outdoor vegetable cookery can be as exciting as grilling meat. Vegetables included as a part of your cook-outs help assure better balanced meals for your family.

Fresh, frozen and canned vegetables may be used in a variety of interesting ways. Be sure to check markets for price comparisons of the fresh, frozen and canned vegetables available.

With locally grown vegetables now on our markets you'll find a wide variety of fresh items, mostly selling at moderate price levels.

Vegetables on skewers are tasty and they are fun to prepare. String each kind of vegetable on its own skewer or alternate chunks of meat and vegetables on skewers. Broil filled skewers over hot coals, brushing vegetables frequently with melted butter or margarine.

If vegetables on their own skewer get done before the meat, wrap them in aluminum foil and place on outer edge of grill. Pre-cooked small new (red) potatoes; tiny cooked onions, baby pattypan squashes; tiny eggplants or eggplant crosscuts; green and

sweet red peppers; firm tomatoes, quartered; or husky slices of cucumber. Think up some interesting combinations of vegetable you particularly enjoy.

Wrap potatoes in a double thickness of aluminum foil for barbecuing on the grill. Other fresh vegetables that can be cooked in foil on the outdoor or indoor grill include sweet potatoes herb-seasoned carrots young sweet corn in the husk and small beets. These and other vegetables in plentiful supply.

You CAN tell a watermelon by its cover. A light greenish-grey cover on a long shaped watermelon indicates it is a Charleston Grey, a favorite in Texas.

A Charleston Grey will continue to ripen after picked. The melon is crisp, deep red and has a sweet flavor.

To buy watermelon check characteristics that tell quality.

Good quality melons are firm and well-shaped, fresh and attractive in appearance.

There is a bloom over the surface of the rind, giving a good melon a velvety appearance. The lower side of the melon usually is yellow compared to a white or pale green on an immature melon.

Watermelons are fragile and they should be handled with care to prevent bruising. They should be refrigerated at home. About 12 hours is required to chill a melon to serve.

Halves or pieces should be wrapped tightly in waxed paper or plastic to prevent the cut surface from drying and also to prevent the aroma of the melon from spreading to other foods.
