

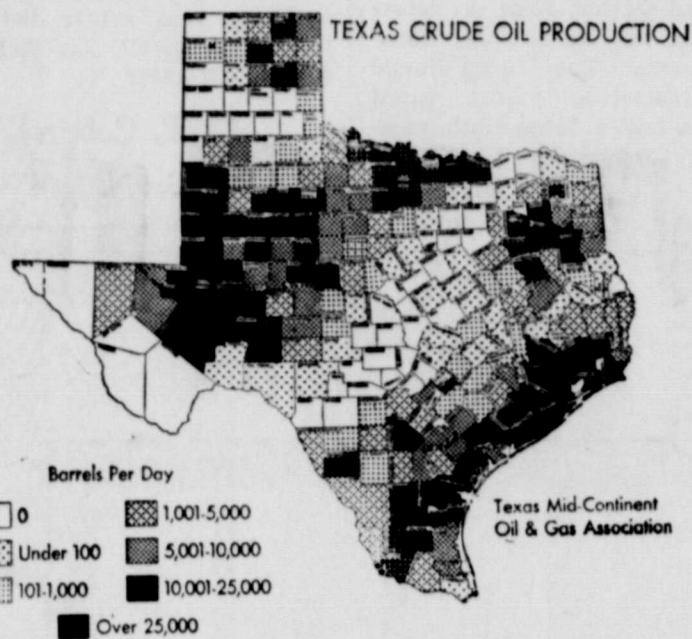

## Hospital Dist. Election Set



## Coke Has Produced 148 Million Bbls. Oil

Texas, the nation's leading oil producer, has yielded more than 21 billion barrels of oil during the past 79 years of recorded production, according to the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

This has meant a statewide distribution of income which currently averages about \$3.4 billion a year. With 207 of the state's 254 counties producing crude oil, each section of the state is marked by several prolific fields. Texas' daily oil production is more than 1.1 million barrels.

## City Statement Being Published

The annual business statement of the City of Bronte is being published in this week's Enterprise. City officials invite the attention of all citizens to the statement, since it reveals how city money was used during the fiscal year, April 1, 1968, to March 31, 1969. The statement was prepared by City Secretary Mrs. Helen Kirkland and audited by B. D. Snead and Earl F. Glenn, Bronte bankers.

Some interesting figures in the statement reveal that the city had a total of \$79,803.42 available in all its funds and expenditures amounted to \$62,644.11, leaving a balance of \$17,159.31 on March 31.

The balance on hand March 31 was almost \$2,000 higher than the balance a year earlier when the amount on hand was \$15,263.51.

Along with the business statement are tables which show the condition of the city bond accounts and its accounts with the Upper Colorado River Authority. Total bonds outstanding on March 31 amounted to \$139,000.00 while the city owed \$249,111.72 to UCRA on the waterworks system.

Mayor Royce Lee said, in regard to the audit, "we are required to publish the city's annual business statement, so that citizens may know how their money is being spent. I want to urge all residents of Bronte to study this report so they will know more about the city's finances."

"More investment is needed to find new oil fields to replace those now being depleted," says Corbin J. Robertson, Association president. "By the end of this century the demand for oil and gas will have doubled. Between now and 1980, some \$200 billion will have to be spent to find enough energy to continue our present standard of living and guarantee national security. Clearly, the country today needs policies which will stimulate the drilling of more wells. Our reserves are shrinking."

Coke County, which has recorded production since 1942, has had a total crude oil output of 148,773,949 barrels up to the beginning of 1969. Coke County production in 1968 was 5,852,904 barrels at the rate of 15,992 barrels a day.

Texas has 36 counties scattered over the state which produced at the rate of 25,000 barrels or more per day. The three largest are: Andrews, 203,520 barrels per day; Ector, 172,654 barrels per day; and Crane, 128,839 barrels per day.

Gregg County is the only county that has produced more than two billion barrels of oil. Andrews, Ector and Rusk counties have produced more than one billion barrels of oil.

## Band to Have Rummage Sale

The biggest rummage sale in Bronte history is being planned for July 16-19 by members of the Bronte Longhorn Band and the Band Boosters organization. Billed as a "Trash and Treasures" Sale, the four-day event is expected to raise money needed to buy additional band uniforms. The sale will be held in the Ditmore building on Highway 277.

Band members said they need any kind of donations to their sale and that anything will be appreciated. "If you have some junk you don't want, we'll be glad to have it," said one band booster, adding, "or if you feel particularly generous toward the band and want to donate something of real value, it will be appreciated, too."

Plans call for donations to be brought to the Ditmore building this week, July 9-12. The first part of next week will be used to sort and price all the merchandise and have it ready for buyers when the doors open July 16.

Mrs. Jack Glasscock, who operates a beauty shop in the back of the building said she would be glad to open it up for anyone who brings donations for the sale.

The reason for this sale and other money raising events by the band is that the music-making group is growing. Bronte School trustees voted in the spring to purchase 65 new uniforms for the band. But when the final sign-up for the 1969-70 band was completed, it was obvious that 65 uniforms would not be enough.

Consequently, the Band Boosters and band members started a campaign to raise money for additional uniforms.

Band members recently had a car wash and raised enough money to purchase two uniforms, and they hope the "Trash and Treasures" Sale will raise enough for several more.

## BRONTE CITY HALL TO CLOSE SATURDAYS

Announcement was made this week that, beginning Aug. 2, Bronte city hall will be closed on Saturdays. The city council approved the change in the work schedule at a recent meeting. For many years the city hall has been open on Saturday mornings.

## Medals to Honor Cpl. Wheeler

Four medals awarded posthumously to Marine Cpl. Kenneth W. Wheeler, 23, of Rt. 2, May, will be presented at a ceremony at 7:30 p.m. July 21 at the Owens Community Center.

A fifth medal awarded Cpl. Wheeler prior to his death May 10 in Vietnam will also be presented to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. I. Wheeler, at the ceremony.

The young Marine was the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rogers of Bronte. His mother is the former Leona Fay Rogers.

Posthumous awards include the Purple Heart, the National Defense Service Medal, the Vietnamese Service Medal and the Viet-

namese Campaign Medal. He had earned the Air Medal for combat flights against the enemy prior to his death.

Cpl. Wheeler was killed by a secondary explosion as he attempted to assist several marines from the wreckage of the helicopter on which he served as crew chief.

He had helped several men from the wreckage after the aircraft was shot down while participating in a large scale marine assault. He returned to the helicopter to help more men to safety when he was killed by the secondary explosion according to his commanding officer, Lt. Col. J. A. Wells Jr.

Coke County Commissioners Court agreed Monday to call an election to set up East Coke County Hospital District. The district would include commissioners precincts two and four.

The commissioners did not set a date for having the election, but said some details and legal matters will have to be worked out before the date can be announced.

The proposed election will give citizens of precincts two and four an opportunity to decide if they want to set up the district which was authorized by the Texas Legislature during the latter part of May. Rep. George Baker of Fort Stockton sponsored the measure and Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford got it through the Texas Senate.

A resolution passed by the commissioners court April 16 requested approval of the legislature on the matter.

The matter of creating a hospital district had been discussed for several months, as being the best method for securing a nursing home in Bronte, and the need for a nursing home was the primary reason for asking that the district be approved by the Texas Legislature.

The need for nursing home facilities is becoming more acute all the time, backers of the district say, and they feel there would be no problem in filling a home with residents who need the care which would be provided.

Ground Beef

Ground beef, a summer favorite for cook-outs, picnics and barbecues, is easy to prepare, economical and versatile.

The different kinds of ground meat call for know-how in selection and care. Ground beef, ground chuck and ground round differ in the types of meat from which they are ground.

Ground beef is often a mixture of many different parts of the carcass, such as neck, brisket, plate or shank, flank, heel or round. It usually contains a high proportion of fat and cost less than ground-to-order meat.

If the homemaker likes the fat for juiciness and rich flavor, ground beef is a good choice; but high fat content causes hamburger to shrink considerably during cooking.

Hamburger made from lower grades of meat or less tender cuts is usually less tender than ground round or chuck. Ground chuck makes juicy patties and is less expensive than ground round.

Ground round steak offers a high proportion of lean meat, shrinks less during cooking and appeals to calorie watchers. Since it is low in fat, some prefer to add a little fat or cream to make it juicier.

There are several quality signs to consider in selecting ground beef.

Color — a typical bright red beef color. Ground beef that has started to turn brown is a sign that it is old.

Fat content — visible creamy-white fat should be distributed throughout the meat for juiciness and flavor. Ground beef that is predominantly white has a very high proportion of fat and will shrink a great deal during cooking.

Use ground beef the purchasing day, or if necessary, the day after. Like most fresh meats, place ground beef loosely covered in the coldest part of the refrigerator. If it needs to be kept longer than a couple of days, freeze it.

Choose ground beef according to intended use. For juicy hamburgers select meat with some fat; for tender, flavorful hamburgers choose high grade meat from moderately tender cuts. Mix ground beef lightly and shape into patties lightly — never pack it down.

Cook hamburgers at a moderately low temperature until just done to keep in juices, cut down shrinkage and keep meat tender. If cooking on the grill, moisten both sides with a few drops of cold water just before grilling. Steam helps keep the meat moist and juicy-tender.

Can Opener Care

The average household opens from 900 to 1,500 cans every year. Can opener blades work best at this fast rate when kept clean and sharp.

Any type can opener must be kept clean, because it is sure to become encrusted with food. This clogs action, is highly unsanitary and can transfer flavor from one food to the next.

When dull blades are forced through a can, metal particles may fall into its content, so both cutting wheels and stationary blades should be kept sharp. A clean cutter remains sharp longer, too.

Wipe blade with a sudsy cloth after use, then remove and scrub in hot suds at frequent intervals.

Electric can openers should never be immersed in water because of motor damage and personal

safety, so the cutting assembly must come out for thorough washing, a factor to consider when buying an opener.

Models with exposed rather than enclosed units usually are easiest to handle. First unplug the appliance then follow the manufacturer's directions for removing the gears.

Current electric openers — which come in pastels, brushed chormes, woodtones and avocado — are designed with a "clean look" and deserve to be kept that way.

The cabinet should be wiped off frequently with a clean cloth wrung out of hot soap or detergent suds, but do not use abrasive cleaners. The cord should be disconnected, pulled taut through a folded damp cloth, then wiped dry before reuse.

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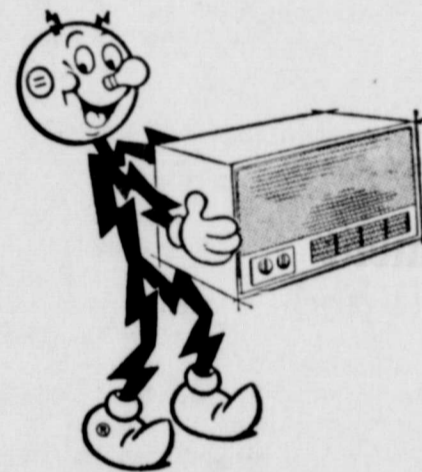
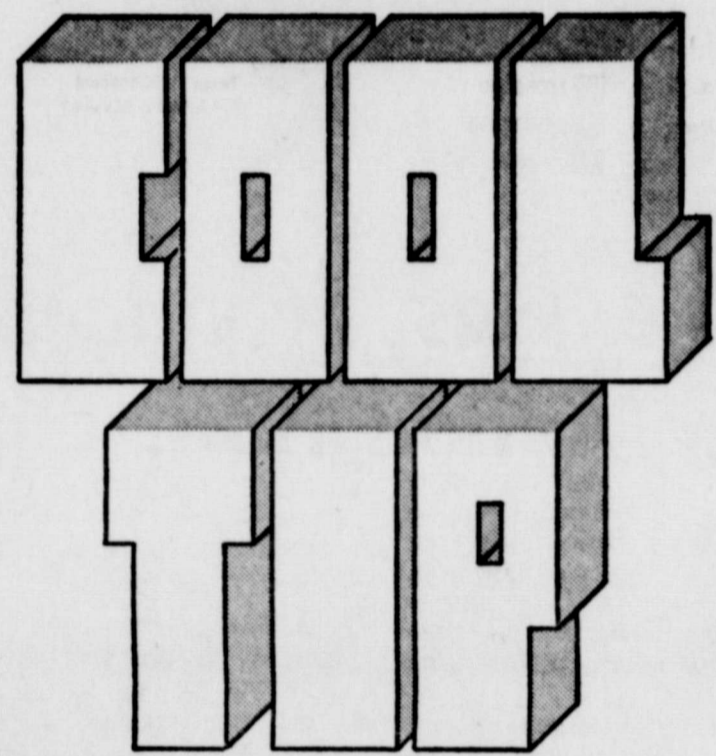

AUSTIN, Tex. — Now it's official: The special 30-day legislative session to draft a biennial budget and a \$300 million tax bill will start July 28.

Gov. Preston Smith has issued the call and put lawmakers on notice to report back to work on the final Monday in this month.

As expected, Smith worded his session - summoning proclamation so as to try to prevent the legislators from giving him another one-year appropriations bill like he vetoed on June 21.

However, the Governor told newsmen that if Texans approve a Constitutional Amendment on August 5 calling for annual legislative sessions he might relax his directive to permit a single-year spending pattern. Actually, Smith sees no chance of the amendment being approved. What he expects is for voters to strengthen his demand for biennial budgeting by firmly rejecting annual sessions — as they have done before.

Governor Smith will permit lawmakers to consider other sub-

jects in the 30-day session only after they have completed their mandatory duties of financing the government for a two-year fiscal period extending until August 31, 1971.

Apparently Smith will hold no pre-session conferences on taxation with House Speaker Gus Mutscher and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes since Barnes is now in Tokyo, Japan.

However, Mutscher plans to hold a series of appropriations committee meetings on the budget before July 28 and also endeavor to arrive at a negotiated understanding with the Senate on the perimeters of spending.

"The real key to the success of the session," commented Mutscher, "is how much work we put in before it actually opens." He has already conferred with his tax and appropriations committee chairmen and most of the individual House members.

The speaker wants the House Committee to complete both appropriations and tax bill hearings during the first week of the ses-

sion and send the measures to the Senate by the end of the second week.

Smith indicates that he will spell out his tax program on the opening day of the session. He has been swapping revenue ideas with staff members but still isn't offering any hints as to his final decision on the type of tax or taxes he will propose.

**COURTS SPEAK** — An historic federal court decision prohibiting a cut in welfare payments to mothers with dependent children also prevents the State Welfare Department from receiving federal funds unless a new plan for aid to families with dependent children is worked out.

So, the Welfare Department is boxed in.

A Constitutional restriction limits welfare payments to \$60 million a year. At the same time, court rulings continue to make more families eligible for AFDC. This problem will be relieved only if voters approve a constitutional amendment on August 5 to increase the welfare fund to \$80 million. If this amendment fails, an emergency condition will exist which may bring federal action to invalidate the constitutional restriction altogether.

**KERRY EVANS TO MAKE 23-DAY TOUR OF EUROPE**

Fire Marshal Bill Luckett said this week that several men turned out for last week's fire meeting, but that more are still needed. "It's really a big job to go to all the fires we've been having here lately and some more help is needed and would be appreciated," he said. He also pointed out again that more firemen are needed to attend meetings, so that the department can meet state requirements. Meeting the requirements has a definite effect on Bronte's insurance rates. Luckett said, and a "few more men at the meetings could well save us all some insurance premium money."

**JULY 1 STARTING DATE OF WOOL SEWING CONTEST**

Travel, scholarships, bonds and many other exciting prizes await girls 14 through 21 who sew their way into the 1969-70 Make It Yourself With Wool contest, which will officially open July 1.

The national fashion sewing contest is sponsored annually by the American Wool Council, a division of the American Sheep Producers Council, Denver, and the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Association, Salt Lake City, Utah. There will be 40 finalists...two representing each of the ASPC's 20 councils.

Two trips abroad are the grand prizes awarded top winners. Runners-up receive sewing machines, college scholarship grants, government bonds, luggage, wool fabric, cosmetics and numerous other merchandise awards.

Denver will be the scene of the national finals, which will be held January 22, 1970, in conjunction with the annual convention of the National Wool Growers Association.

The junior division of the contest is open to girls from 14 through 16 years of age, and the senior division is for girls from 17 through 21 — all living in the Continental United States. There is no entry fee.

To be eligible, an entrant must sew her own dress, suit, coat or pants outfit of 100 percent wool loomed or knitted in America, and must model her entry before judges and in special fashion shows.

District and state competitions will be scheduled throughout the country during the coming months.

Outstanding entries will be handsomely rewarded at each level of the contest.

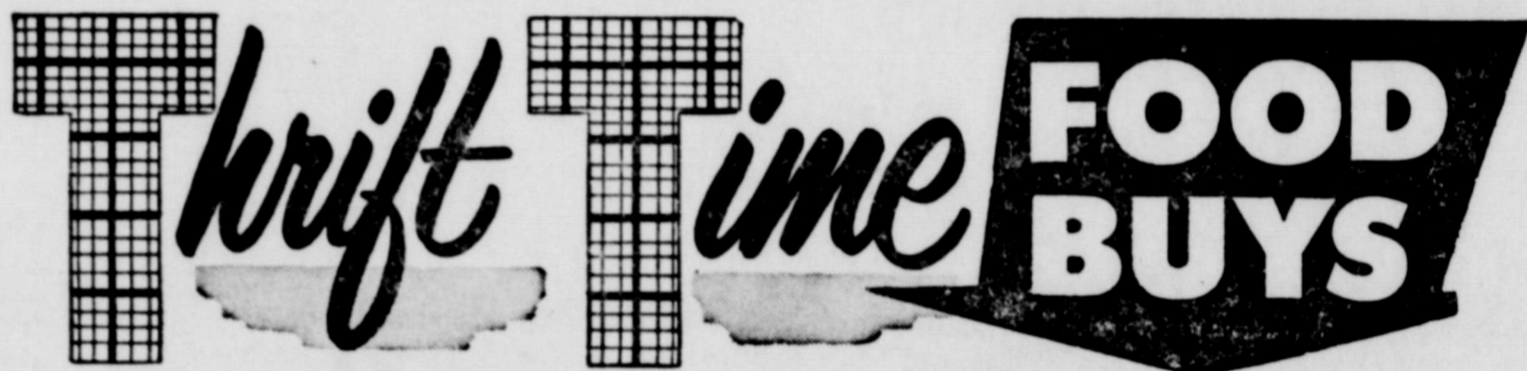
