





You will pay a higher permium for the smaller bar and take a heavy discount when you get ready to sell it. Wafers and medallions are even harder to sell.

Gold coins are still probably your best bet if you are a determined gold investor. You don't have to wait until gold ownership become legal to buy coins. Gold coins are a legal investment now. One of the key advantages in coins is that they are much harder to counterfeit or shave than bars. They also have excellent certification, the government issuing them. They are in effect round bars of gold since each coin contains an ounce or more of gold. They are also easier to sell and have the added intrinsic value of being a collectors item. The best bargains in gold coins are the Austrian 100 Corona (.98 oz. of fine gold) or the Mexican 50 Peso (1.2 oz.). Both are currently selling only 10% to 15% above actual gold content.

Perhaps the first thing to de-

termine is who shall make de-

cisions about funeral arrange-

ments. Some consumer experts

recommend that a relative outside the immediate family or a

close family friend be entrusted to make preliminary arrangements, with the immediate survivors having final approval.

Such a person would know

the family's financial situation and perhaps be able to make necessary choices more rationally, since extreme grief could

cause families to be susceptible

THE TEXAS Funeral Directors Association points out that there are four categories of funeral charges to consider:

> 1. Those involving the funeral home facilities and staff, the casket, and other merchandise purchased from the funeral home.

2. Those relating to disposition, such as cemetery lot and charges, cremation and cost of urn if desired, or mausoleum

3. Gravestone, monument, or marker, or niche for urn conaining ashes.

4. Other expenses, such as clergyman's fee, limousines (if not included in funeral charge), flowers, newspaper notices, police escort, and out-of-town transport of the body.

This and other information can be provided by a trained funeral director who is licensed by the State Board of Morticians and whose experience in such matters can be a great help.

However, there are in the funeral business, as well as in any other, a few unscrupulous persons who may engage in questionable practices, and who may take advantage of most vulnerable.
