Rains Break Hot Weather

Voters Approve Hospital District

Voters of precincts two and four voted overwhelmingly last Saturday to create the East Coke County Hospital District. The new district has the same boundaries as the two commissioner precincts. The vote was 141 for and 26 against creation of the district.

The election was called by the commissioners court after the Texas Legislature in its regular session approved a bill authorizing creation of the district, if approved by voters in the area involved.

Purpose of the election and creation of the hospital district was to provide a means for building a nursing home in the east part of Coke County. Backers of the movement say the need for nursing facilities is evident, inasmuch as many residents of the area, particularly elderly persons, have been forced to move to other places to obtain the care they need.

It is expected that a petition soon will be circulated calling for a bond election to finance the nursing home. However, no such move had been reported to The Enterprise at press time Thursday.

The first board of directors will be appointed by the commissioners court, and thereafter directors will be elected.

Coke Highway Work Approved

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$58,400.00 for state highway safety and betterment and farm to market road improvement work in Coke County during 1970.

The work authorized includes the following projects:

Loop 229 between F.M. 1904 and State Highway 208—**asphalt seal coat.**

U. S. Highway 277 from Runnels County line to State Highway 70—**asphalt seal coat.**

State Highway 158 from Sterling County line east 13.5 miles—**asphalt seal coat.**

F.M. 1904 from State Highway 208 west a distance of 1.3 miles—**asphalt seal coat.**

R.M. 2034 between State Highway 208 and 13.0 miles south-west—**asphalt seal coat.**

District Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo said that the projects in Coke County, which will involve 30.6 miles, will be under the supervision of R. N. Jennings, district maintenance engineer of San Angelo.

Scrimmage Set Friday Night At Rising Star

Things are shaping up for the 1969 football season with hard workouts each day and reserved seat ticket sales in progress. Coaches Cecil Toliver and Gerald Sandusky started workouts Aug. 18 and said this week that their charges are making progress.

Fans will have their first opportunity Friday night to see the lads in action. The Longhorns will travel to Rising Star for a scrimmage. The practice session will start at 7:30 p.m.

School officials said the best way to go to Rising Star is by way of Winters or Ballinger to Coleman, then to Cross Plains, and on to Rising Star.

Another scrimmage will be held on the home field Friday of next week, Sept. 5, when Clyde comes here for a battle. The action will start at 8 p.m. First game on the regular schedule will be Sept. 12 when the Eldorado Eagles come here.

Tickets on Sale

Reserved seat tickets are on sale in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee. Cost of the tickets this year is \$7.50 which amounts to \$1.25 per game. There are six home games on the schedule this year.

The superintendent pointed out that persons who had reserved seats last year may reserve the same seat until Sept. 5. After that date, seats in the reserved section which have not been taken will be put on sale to the public on a first come-first served basis.

The reserved section provides the best seats in the stands and is centered on the 50 yard line.

Regular admission price is \$1.00 per game.

Braswell Given Distinguished Service Award at National ASC Convention

Eddie Braswell, Mitchell County's manager for Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service is the national winner for distinguished service to agriculture among ASCS employees.

The award is presented annually by the association to an ASCS employee who has best served the interest of agriculture and agriculture's citizenship.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Braswell of Bronte and Mrs. Brasswell is the former Carolyn Childress, daughter of Sheriff and Mrs. Melvin Childress of Robert Lee.

Braswell received the award in Grand Rapids, Michigan at the convention of ASCS County Of-

fice Employees, held Aug. 6-9.

Braswell was also presented the association's South Central Area Award for the same distinguished service to agriculture, during the convention.

The Texas award, first in the series of outstanding achievements for the Colorado City agriculture, church and civic leader, will be presented to Braswell in Dallas Nov. 1.

The Mitchell County manager was nominated by fellow employees in the West Texas area for the service award. His nomination first was submitted for the statewide honor, then to the multi-state South Central competition and then to national.

His association cited a long list of meritorious achievements on the job and in job related programs in addition to outstanding community citizenship and leadership.

Braswell's performance within the ASCS setup, his pioneering of new techniques and systems beneficial to the local farmer and rancher, his communication and leadership which resulted in understanding cooperation from the agricultural industry were among the prime citations for his achievement. School Off to Good Start

Classes at Bronte School got off to a good start this week, according to Supt. C. B. Barbee.

Enrollment hit an even 300 at the beginning, with 197 in elementary school and 103 in high school. Barbee said they are expecting about 20 more students to enroll in the next few days, which will bring the enrollment up to about the same figure it was last spring when the 1968-69 term ended.

Enrollment is pretty well divided among the 12 grades, with

20 the lowest figure for a grade and 32 the highest number.

By grades it looks like this:

First grade, 20; second, 23; third, 25; fourth, 24; fifth, 25; sixth, 28; seventh, 32; eighth, 20; ninth, 32; tenth, 20; eleventh, 23; twelfth, 28.

Quite a few changes have been made in this year's procedures, including a six period day, instead of the former seven period day. Also all high school students

are required to take five academic subjects plus a course in either band or physical education. All athletic practice will be conducted after regular school hours.

Another difference is a change in the school calendar which calls for completion of the first semester (18 weeks) before Christmas. The second semester will be 20 weeks long. Report cards will be issued every nine weeks rather than every six weeks.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — Sharp division between the Texas Senate and House was responsible for the tough tax fight in the final days of the special session of the Legislature.

It was not possible to get a majority of the Senate to agree on a tax bill tilted toward sales taxes, while House majority favored that route.

In past years, it has been the other way around, with the Senate sales-tax minded and the House reluctant.

This attitude goes back to the 1930's, when 59 members of the House blocked the "transactions" tax proposed as a constitutional amendment by Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel, and approved by the Senate.

But the one-man, one-vote decision of the U. S. Supreme Court made the Senate more city-minded, and switched the role of the two houses.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Speaker Gus Mutscher and Gov. Preston Smith all were anxious to get the tax-and-spend issued settled by Tuesday's adjournment, because they had other engagements.

Barnes is president of the National Legislative Council, which opened its annual meeting in St. Louis, Mo., Wednesday.

Mutscher planned to head a delegation of House members to the same conference.

And Governor Smith was ready for the National Governors Conference in Colorado Springs, Colo., starting Sept. 1.

ANTI - CRIME PROJECTS FUNDED — Criminal Justice Council of the governor's office has recommended \$252,499 in action grants for new local programs to fight crime.

Council voted funds from \$1.1 million allocated Texas by the federal government under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968. State and local matching funds also must be provided.

Largest of grants, \$127,000, would go to Houston for an area-wide information and communication system to be tied into a computer and connected with a state and national system.

Fort Worth will receive \$60,000 for a police-community relations program; Travis County \$35,000 to expand its model adult probation project; North Central Texas Council of Governments \$21,000 for a police training program;

San Antonio police department \$19,680 for a police-community relations seminar program and \$7,339 for a Bexar County juvenile delinquency prevention project; Galveston \$9,360 for a police department management survey; Houston \$6,550 for a state school for prosecutors; and Alamo Area Council of Governments \$1,500 for a four-week course offered 20 police officers in the re-

gion. Council also accepted a study and report by Systems Science Corporation on a proposed statewide communication and information system to link the criminal justice system including police, courts, corrections and rehabilitation services.

OIL ALLOWABLE TRIMMED — For third straight month, Railroad Commission cut statewide oil allowable, setting it at 52.1 per cent of potential.

September allowable allows a maximum per day of 3,237,997 barrels. This compares with 3,284,263 barrels daily under August 53.1 per cent order.

Six of 14 major crude purchasers sought more oil next month than in August, three wanted less and five the same amount.

Allowable reached 21-year peak when it rose to 63.5 per cent, but was cut to 54.7 per cent in July and 53.1 per cent for August. Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey said Texas crude oil stocks early this month totaled 104 million barrels, 200,000 more than a week ago.

TREASURE HUNT PROBE EXPANDED — Three member commission named by district court to inventory the treasure recovered from a Spanish galleon which sank off Padre Island 400 years ago heard testimony that: "There probably is a lot more treasure beneath waters of the Texas coast."

"There is not much chance any two-man submarines carted off an appreciable amount of treasure as charged by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

Diver Jeff Burke of Rio Hondo told the Commission several items not reported on the log of Platoro Inc., the exploration firm which brought up the artifacts, were recovered. Burke predicted Platoro will win its lawsuit claiming title to the treasure and "open the door for every treasure hunter in the country."

Secretary of State Martin Dies said Platoro had no license for exploration from the state, and its find belongs to Texas.

Meanwhile, Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi offered a House resolution proposing censure of Sadler for his handling of legislative committees and legislators seeking to probe the treasure case.

U.S. Bureau of Customs jumped into the controversy with a demand for an inventory of items salvaged, and claimed they are the property of the U. S. until matters in controversy (including processing of entry forms) are resolved.

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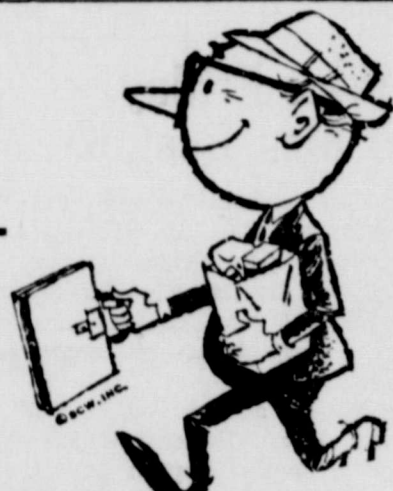
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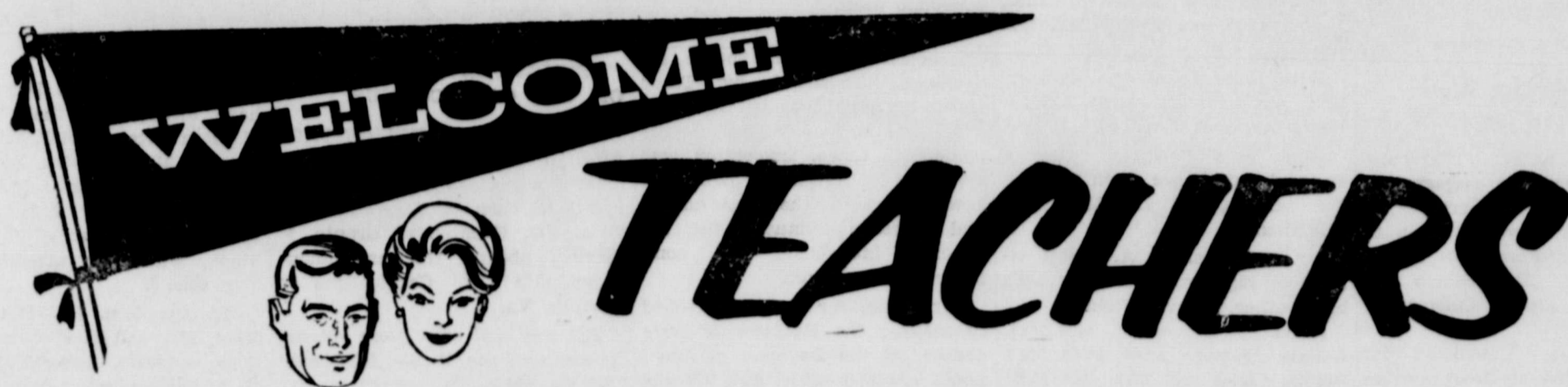

SAN ANGELO — Degrees were conferred on 118 students when Angelo State University held its summer commencement exercises at 9 a.m. last Saturday, Aug. 23.

Ceremonies were held in the ASU Academic Mall. Commencement speaker was Dr. Billy Mac Jones, president-elect of Southwest Texas State University and former head of the ASU history department.

Degrees were conferred by Dr. Lloyd D. Vincent, ASU president, after the certification of candidates by Dr. Hugh E. Meredith, academic dean.

The program also included special music by Marion Bledsoe, soprano, accompanied by Terry Lowe, organist, and by the ASU Fine Arts Ensemble, also accompanied by Lowe. H D Agent's News Dept.

With the purchase of back-to-school clothes, fiber content in some new garments probably will be unfamiliar. How will you care for it?

Information on hang-tags and labels tells the care story. All hang tags and labels should be kept and filed for ready use.

Development of fabrics, blends and finishes progresses so fast, even textile experts can't always identify fibers. Washing instructions on a purchase are worth their weight in gold.

Keep a small card-file box near the washer. Each time a member of the family gets a new garment, new bedspread or curtains, take off informative tags and put them in the file box — identifying each tag as "Mary's pink blouse" or "green nylon spreads."

You will know which items can be loaded together, which take short washing and spin cycles, and need hot or warm suds. Records of ironing instructions and temperature setting, will eliminate guess work.

Fabrics give much more wear and satisfaction when laundered properly that it does not pay to rely on memory as to fabric content. Write information down, file it properly, and refer to it as needed. It will protect belongings and budget.

Nectarines Are Good

Nectarines no longer are reserved as a special delicacy. This year's crop is expected to set a record.

Look for nectarines with general plumpness, firmness, good color and fresh appearance. Store ripe fruit in the refrigerator but keep unripe fruit at room temperature until it feels slightly soft.

Nectarines may be used any way peaches are used. Some suggestions for use are pies, fruit bowls, jam, ice cream sauce and fruit salads.

Supermarket Credit Cards

In a year or two, credit cards may be found in supermarkets if the present try-outs are successful.

Two major chains are experimenting with them. Trials are to determine if shoppers prefer or like to use credit cards instead of cash in the supermarket and if the consumer will pay his bill after the food has been taken home and consumed.

This plan may be convenient, but similar to most plans, an 18 percent interest charge is added to bills not paid within the month.

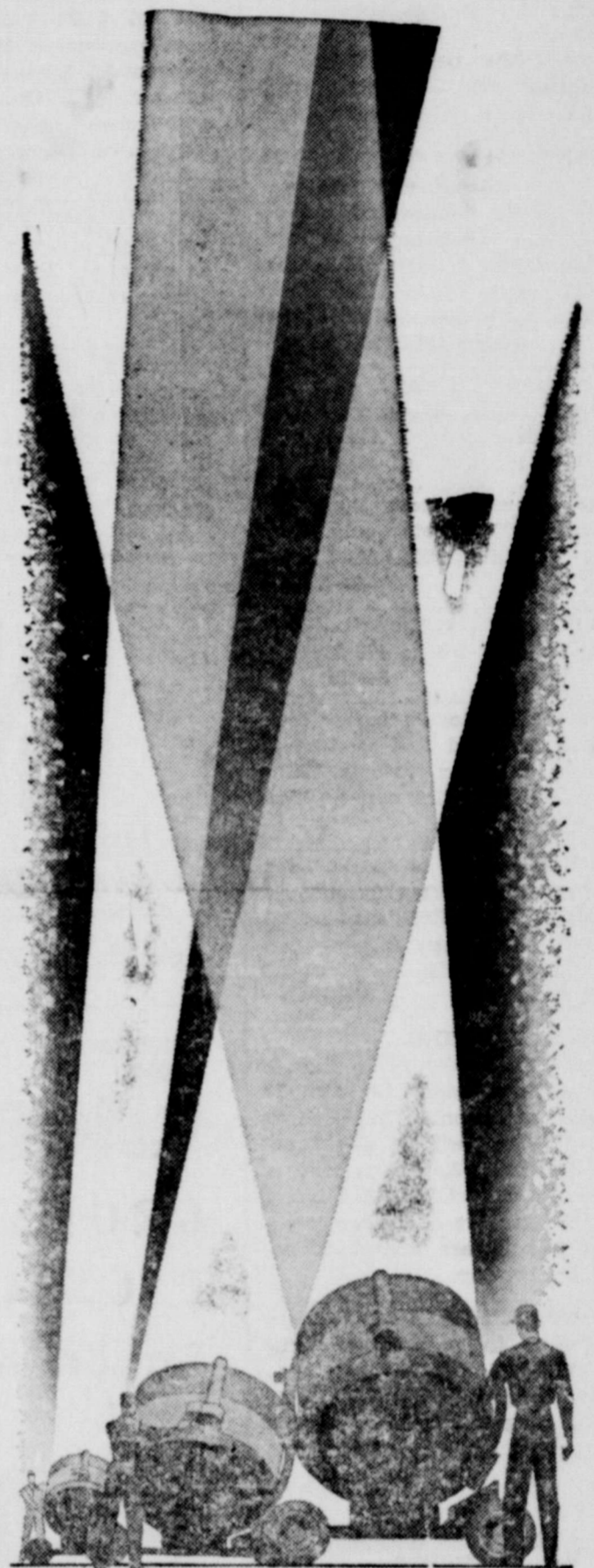
