Bryan was an employee of Rowan Drilling Co. and was engaged in moving a drilling rig when the crash occurred. The family lived in Anchorage, Alaska

Bryan was born Aug. 22, 1927. He grew up in Runnels County and married Patsy Ruth Luckett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Luckett of Bronte, in 1948. He was associated with his brotherin-law, Billy Joe Luckett, in the service station business in Bronte for a short time, but had been employed by the Rowan company for 18 years. He was a rig superintendent at the time of his death.

Citizens Complain Of Town Horses

Mayor Royce Lee said this week the city has been receiving numerous complaints from citizens who live near persons who are keeping horses in the city.
