## Cleanup Drive in Full Swing

### Longhorns to Try Wall In Non-Conference Tilt

The Longhorns have another out of town football game Friday night when they will travel to Wall for a tilt with the Class A Hawks.

The Hawks have a 2-1 season record and suffered a defeat last week at the hands of Rankin. The Longhorns also have two wins and one defeat and are feeling pretty

good after their fine showing last week against the powerful Rule Bobcats.

Coach Cecil Toliver said this week that his team will be operating at full strength, but will miss the services of Tackle Garland Richards, who is ineligible to play.

The Longhorns are listed by the

Abilene Reporter-News this week as the No. 2 Class B team in the Big Country, being outranked only by Jim Ned, another member of the 7-B Conference.

### Star Winners Named for Week

Willie Zuniga was the top star winner in last Friday's game with Rule. The big end was awarded two stars for his recovery of two Bobcat fumbles.

Keith McCutchen, quarterback for the Horns, was named back of the week and James Vaughn was awarded a star as lineman of the week.

Other stars were awarded to Donnie Thompson for intercepting a pass and to Nicky Arrott for recovering a fumble.

Coach Cecil Toliver said that the back and lineman of the week are chosen by him and Coach Gerald Sandusky from a review of the film of the games. He said, "We take each play and analyze it and give each man a plus or minus, depending on his reaction to the situation. If he does what we consider was the best thing, he gets a plus, and if he could have done better, he gets a minus." Players who wind up with the most pluses receive the awards.

## ★ Star ★ Winners

A big dent already has been made in the cleanup of Bronte, but there is much more to do. City officials and other citizens, along with crews and machinery of Commissioners Howard Brock and Jack Corley have been busy for days and the results of their work are clearly visible.

The sentiments are not unusual, but the speaker is. She is Svetlana Alliluyeva, daughter of Joseph Stalin. After a lifetime spent in a communist paradise, Miss Alliluyeva fled from its dubious blessings.

As refugees have been doing for more than three centuries now, she came to the New World. The "golden door" of liberty beckoned to her as it has to millions of others from the Old World.

Stalin's daughter has burned her Soviet passport and renounced her Soviet citizenship to demonstrate that there is no turning back. Most Americans can trace their own citizenship to similar decisions, made by themselves or by their ancestors. Miss Alliluyeva is one of many who have seen America and fallen in love with it, and America has become what it is today because of that fact.

We are going through a great spell of mourning and weeping right now in this country, in which Americans of all creeds and persuasions are entertaining themselves by pointing out what a terrible condition the nation is

### New Building for Surplus Program

A new building is under construction this week on East Railroad Street, just back of Lammers Country Store. Owned by C. R. Blake, the building will be used for storage and issuance of surplus commodities in Coke County. Blake is in charge of the program in the county.

He said he expects to have the building completed and ready for use when the surplus groceries are distributed on Nov. 6. The program has been operated from Robert Lee for several years. Recently the commissioners court approved removal of the operation to Bronte. Blake took over the job three months ago from Chism Brown of Robert Lee.

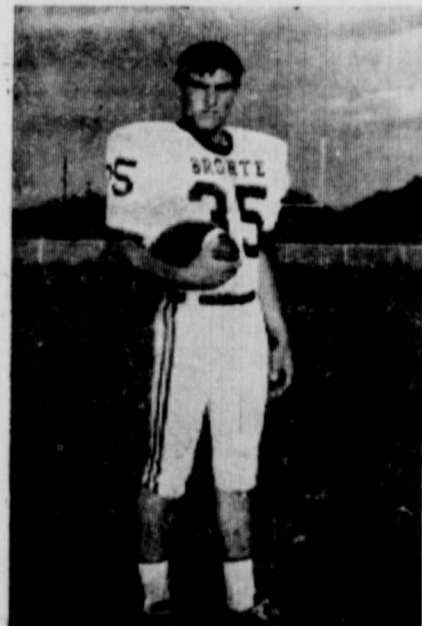
The building is 16 by 32 feet, Blake said, and Leslie Lammers is assisting him with the work. Land for the building was purchased from E. F. Glenn.

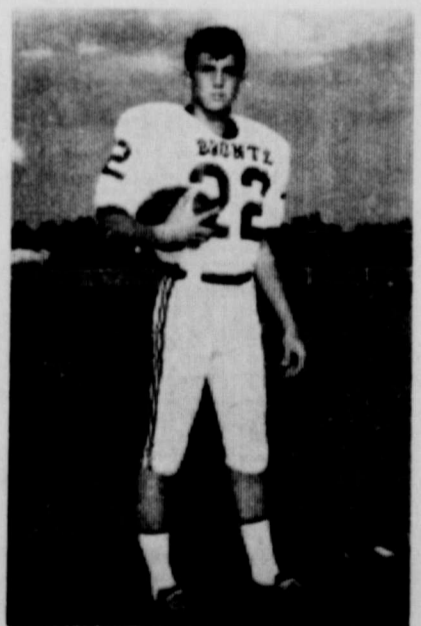

**Fake Furs**

Take a safari to your favorite fabric shop. New fur-like fabrics come in patterns of ponyskin, leopard, tiger, cheetah, chinchilla, opossum, rabbit, zebra and other animals.

Fake fur has a pile surface and usually is a synthetic fabric. The backing may be woven knitted or quilted in synthetic or cotton yarn.

Keep an eye on the label and help prevent costly mistakes; certification of performance and care information on the label gives consumer guarantee of wear satisfaction.

When buying fabric and pattern, select styles with simple, straight lines. Set-in sleeves may be used but raglan-sleeves will be easier to construct.

For best results make personal alteration on the pattern. Check it out in muslin for that perfect fit. Alterations made in the coat may leave permanent marks.

**Buying Equipment**

Ask a few questions. That is how to get the best buy on major household appliances.

Does the business stand behind the merchandise it sells or will it suggest writing to the factory if problems occur? Other suggested questions are:

Is this a well-established business in the community with a good reputation?

Will the store provide the services necessary for complete satisfaction: such as, prompt delivery, proper installation, and adequate service?

Does this dealer have his own service department, or will the buyer be referred to some other organization when he has trouble?

Does the dealer maintain an adequate stock of repair parts or will the buyer have to wait to get the repair parts from some distant point?

Is the merchandise an established and reputable brand name?

Can he give an adequate demonstration of the product?

Does he have a wide variety of models and sizes to select from and compare?

An affirmative answer to these and other questions should give a competent dealer that should help a consumer buy the right piece of equipment to meet his needs.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Will legislative redistricting force another special session of the legislature this year?

Nobody knows for sure, although rumors have been hot on the subject. Observers, including Gov. Preston Smith, have indicated they doubt reapportionment will demand emergency attention of the lawmakers.

Issue is before a three-judge federal court in Houston. Plaintiffs claim that population variance of 24.2 per cent between smallest and largest Texas legislative districts is discriminatory. They argue that big city House members should run by individual districts, not county-wide.

Court, in spite of some rumors to the contrary, has not scheduled the case for hearing.

An Indiana case involving the validity of multi-member legislative districts is on appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Governor Smith recently noted that 1970 census figures will be available in less than a year and that the new head count will provide a more reasonable basis for reapportionment than the 10-year-old census.

Filing deadline for legislative candidates is next February. So if the court is going to order immediate redistricting to affect the 1970 elections, it is presumed that the decision would be handed down well before the end of this year.

Naturally the longer the court delays its decision, the closer looks the new census tabulation.

**INSURANCE RAISE LIKELY** — A quick decision of the State Insurance Board is expected to jack up auto insurance premiums at least 9.9 per cent.

That, in effect, was the recommendation of the governor's study committee on rates. Board originally proposed an 11.4 per cent boost. Industry wanted 5.6 per cent more than that.

A last-minute flurry of controversy raised the question as to whether the committee had been misled by exaggerated statistics on auto accidents.

Also in controversy was insurance agents' commissions. Committee recommended 18 per cent, which Chairman Price Daniel specified as "average."

F. Darby Hammond, executive director of Southwestern Insurance Information Service, released a blistering attack on the committee's report. He called it not only an insult to auto insurance companies but a disservice to the insurance buying public. "There is no way," said Hammond, "that forcing companies to continue operations in the red will not eventually harm the public."

As to statistics, Hammond says that the Insurance Board does not use Department of Public Safety figures as the basis for determining costs. It uses claims paid, DPS doesn't get reports on all accidents.

Committee has no control over what the agents receive as their commission, Hammond pointed out.

**SCHOOL MONEY** — Texas school board members have been hit hard in making budgets this fall, when the major part of the teacher pay raise takes effect.

Local share of the teacher pay

raises — 20 per cent — must come out of local tax revenues on property, the only source of local school funds. Texas Association of School Boards, meeting in Austin, has asked for help.

A resolution adopted at the meeting requested the Texas Education Agency to make a study as to other ways in which school districts might raise money for the local share of school operations.

**SAFE DRIVING** — Governor Smith says the Federal Government has given the state \$1 million to help finance the State-wide Driver Education Project. Governor's Traffic Safety Fund is providing \$1.8 million for support of the program and the school districts are contributing \$4.5 million toward the remaining costs.

Smith said "last year, we reached only 36 per cent of the eligible students, but I hope with the acceleration of the program this percentage will increase until all eligible students receive this training."

**COTTON FARMS** — Agriculture Commissioner John White says that Texas cotton exports "are in trouble" and urged cotton farmers to support new production and marketing techniques in attacking problems that plague the cotton farmer.

White blamed a good part of cotton's export ills on "the mechanics of our support price system which has unwittingly allowed foreign competitors to undercut our prices a fraction of a cent in the world markets."

# Longhorns Look Good; Down Rule Bobcats, 22-0

The Bronte Longhorns looked their best of the 1969 season Friday night when they did an outstanding job and won a 22-0 victory over the Rule Bobcats. Rule had been rated No. 2 among Big Country Class B teams, while the Longhorns had been placed in the No. 3 spot. Bronte fans are looking for a change this week in the positions.

The two teams played a scoreless first quarter and the Longhorns made the only tally of the first half in the second period when Randy Barbee went over from the 1 yard line. Starting the third quarter with a 6-0 score, the third period was the action-packed quarter as the Longhorns went wham-bam for two touchdowns, one on a pass from Keith McCutchen from the 15 to Willie Zuniga in the end zone, and the other on a 30 yard sidestepping scamper by Nicky Arrott. Arrott also added 2 extras. Bronte's other two points came, also in the third quarter, when a Bobcat was tackled behind his goal line.

### First Quarter

Rule's Jimmy Lisle started the ball game with a kickoff to Jerry Graves who was dumped on the 26. Arrott carried twice for 4 yards and a pass from McCutchen to Barbee was short of the 1st. Barbee was called on to punt. Something happened as the Bobcats swarmed through and the punt was blocked to give Rule a 1st down on the Longhorn 42.

Things were not as bad as they looked. However, as Rule fumbled and lost 2, then was assessed a 5 yard fine, and Kent Le-

Fevre, the quarterback, was swamped by the defending Longhorns and lost 5 more to bring up a 3rd and 22. A pass to Lisle was completed but was way short of a 1st. Another Barbee, this time Donny of Rule, was the punter and he got off a high one which took a Rule bounce and finally settled on the Bronte 10. Arrott made a yard, McCutchen kept for 5 more, then Arrott went 17 yards on the first good gainer of the night for a 1st on the 33. A net loss of 2 on the next two plays brought up 3rd and 12. With no choice but to pass, McCutchen tossed one to Zuniga and was a beauty, giving the Longhorns a 1st on the Rule 38.

McCutchen carried twice for a 12 yard gain and a 1st on the 26. After failing to move the ball on the ground, McCutchen tried a pass on a 4th down effort, but was unable to find a receiver and had to run for a good gain. It was for nothing, however, as the ball was called back and the Horns were penalized 15 for holding. The fine moved the ball back far enough that Barbee had to punt. A fine kick gave the Bobcats the ball on their 20.

Winston May went for a couple of yards on 2 tries, then LeFevre kept for a 7 yard gain, but it was not enough. D. Barbee punted to Arrott who was downed on his 23. One play was completed as the quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

The Bobcats were after Arrott and nailed him for a total of 1 yard on two tries. McCutchen then tried a pass but had to keep it. It was a good play and netted the Longhorns a 1st on their 45. The next play was catastrophic, as May recovered a fumble for the Bobcats on the Bronte 48. The Bobcats were on the march and moved the ball from the 48 down to the Bronte 30 before a bruising tackle by Zuniga jarred the ball loose and he recovered the fumble for Bronte on the 33.

A pass over the middle to Barbee was good enough for a 1st on the 45. McCutchen went for 2 and a pass to Zuniga netted 1. The 3rd down pass try was incomplete, but Rule was penalized 15 for holding, giving the Horns a 1st on the Rule 39.

Arrott gained almost 10 yards, and Rule was penalized 15 for grabbing a face guard, to bring up a 1st on the Bobcat 14. Arrott made 7, then Barbee went 4 more for the 1st on the 3. McCutchen moved a yard each carry to place the ball on the 1. It was from there Barbee went through the line to make the first TD of the night. David Scott's kick attempt was blocked, to make the score 6-0.

Zuniga kicked off and Rule couldn't move the ball 10 yards, so the Bobcats punted and Bronte took over on the 50. But the Horns couldn't go either and Barbee kicked to May on his 12. The Longhorn line held and only two plays materialized before the end of the half. Score: 6-0.

### Third Quarter

Zuniga kicked off to May to start the second half. Three plays netted the Bobcats 3 yard, so D. Barbee punted to his own 49. Likewise, the Horns failed to make a first and Barbee's punt went out on the 25. A couple of plays later a Rule fumble was recovered by Arrott on the 28. A pass to Barbee set up a 1st on the 15. Then a pass to Zuniga in the end zone was good for a TD. Try for PAT failed and the score

was 12-0.

Zuniga's kickoff was taken by Cato Macias near the goal line and returned to the 31. Once again fumbleitis hit the Bobcats, this time with a recovery by Zuniga on the 31. Arrott made a yard, then on 2nd down took the ball through his would-be tacklers across the double stripe for another Bronte counter. He then ran over 2 extras, to make the score 20-0.

Zuniga kicked into the end zone to give the Bobcats the ball on the 20. A pass to Rule's Barbee covered 9 yards, but the next two plays were losers and a punt was necessary. It went to Arrott on his 40 and returned to the Rule 47. Two passes were completed to Zuniga for a 1st on the Rule 15. The Longhorns lacked inches making a 1st on the 5 in four plays. The Bobcats had their back to the wall and Arrott caught Jesse Galindo in the end zone to give Bronte a two point safety. Helping Arrott were Sowell, Zuniga and Thompson. Score 22-0. D. Barbee punted for Rule's free kick after the safety, and Bronte had the ball on their own 44 as the quarter ended.

### Fourth Quarter

Rule was given a 5 yard penalty to make it 2nd and 4, but the Horns didn't make the needed yardage, and Barbee punted to May who was knocked out of bounds by Skelton on the 21.
