Bronte Cleanup Drive Going Strong This Week

Bronte's cleanup campaign is still going strong this week with lots of work going on among city and county employees, as well as on an individual basis. Tons of trash have been gathered up and hauled off or burned, and most all the vacant lots in town have been slicked up with bulldozers and mowing machines.

Mayor Royce Lee said Thursday morning that the cooperation of just about everybody has been wonderful. "The rains early this week have slowed down the work

to some extent," he noted, "and it will probably be necessary to continue the cleanup into next week."

Mayor Lee stated the city still has out a few unanswered requests to property owners asking their permission to go onto the property and clean it up. He urged everyone who has received such a request and has not answered it to contact the city hall at once. "We would like to do as complete a job as possible," stated the mayor, "and to do this we have to obtain permission from the property owner involved."

County Commissioners Howard

Brock and Jack Corley and their crews have done a great deal of the cleanup work, using their employees and equipment to make the job easier. In addition to his cleaning up, Corley has paved the parking lot adjacent to the old Santa Fe depot, now being used as a meeting place for the Masonic and Eastern Star Lodges.

A list of block captains was published last week and residents are urged to contact them and report any work which needs to be done.

Last Rites Held for W. B. Middleton, 84

Funeral services were held for William (Dan) Bond Middleton, 84, of Bronte at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the First United Methodist Church in Robert Lee. The Rev. Arthur Kendall, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery in Bronte. Newby Funeral Home was in charge.

Mr. Middleton died at 1:45 p.m. Sunday in West Coke County Hospital after a long illness. He was born July 28, 1885, in Ellis County, and moved to Coke County in 1929. He lived on his ranch in Hayrick community 10 miles northeast of Robert Lee.

He was married to Lillian Caraway Aug. 18, 1961, in Sweetwater. He was a World War I veteran and a director of First National Bank in Bronte for many years.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Dana Sue Middleton of Waco; two stepsons, Willford Caraway of Quito, Ecuador and Jimmy Caraway of Houston; two step-daughters, Mr. John Woodard of Crane and Mrs. Jack Snead of Clinton, Maryland; one half-brother; one half-sister; three grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Barton Waldrop of Robert Lee, R. C. Lasswell, Carroll Robbins and Luther McCutchen, all of Bronte, Merle Proctor of Wingate and Bob Sanderson of Blackwell.

Perfect Record

The Shorthorns have not been scored on in their first two games of this season, having won their first game with the Robert Lee Dogies and defeating the Forsan bunch, 24-0.

In the Forsan contest, Alan Barbee made the first tally on a 15 yard rollout play. Fred Buie went over for the 2 extras.

The second counter came when Kim Burrett blocked a Forsan punt and Leroy Zuniga grabbed it and ran for the TD. Barrett got the conversion.

Barrett was also responsible for the last 8 points. He went for a 53 yard run for the touchdown and he ran over the extras, to make the score add up to 24-0.

Each class is being allowed to have one bake sale in town and a candy sale at school to raise money for candidates. 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AUSTIN, Tex. — Higher automobile insurance rates were adopted by the State Board of Insurance, but they are not as high as had been originally predicted.

Statewide, the increase in rates on Nov. 1 will be 9.9 per cent. Insurance Board's staff earlier had recommended an 11.4 per cent increase.

This smaller increase was accomplished by accepting the recommendation of Gov. Preston Smith's study committee that the percentage allowed insurance companies for acquisition costs be cut from 25 to 22.5 per cent of the premium.

Another recommendation of the study committee headed by former Gov. Price Daniel was that the Board should include investment income of insurance companies in setting the rates.

Board chairman Ned Price said the Board would give careful consideration to inclusion of investment income from unearned premium and loss reserves as "prudent and contingencies." He added that "we may have further comment on this at a later date."

However, Price warned that it may not have as much effect on the price of insurance as had been thought. He said "The Board has consistently recognized and considered in its regulatory acts that the companies have other income than that from underwriting."

Price also said that the Board will begin, "as time and circumstances permit," a detailed study of automobile rate-making formulae. He said the study of the present formula used in setting rates would be made during the coming year. The formula, he said, "will be reviewed with the objective of determining if rates can be made more precisely by another formulae."

DEMOCRATS — State Executive Committee has nominated Mrs. Carrin Patman of Ganado to serve as the National Democratic Committeewoman from Texas. She is the wife of Sen. William N. Patman and replaces Mrs. Lloyd Bentsen of Houston,

who resigned the position. Mrs. Patman is the daughter-in-law of U. S. Rep. Wright Patman and the daughter of the late State Sen. Fred Mauritz of Ganado. She still has to be approved by the National Committee.

At the meeting, State Chairman Elmer Baum told committee members that Democrats have to overcome their biggest handicap — taking success for granted. He is organizing a futures committee to act as an advisory group to chart new approaches "for a brighter future."

French Robertson of Abilene, executive committee finance chairman, told members that he is dropping the "card carrying" Democrat scheme to raise money. The party had been selling gold Democratic Party memberships for \$1, but Robertson said it wasn't raising enough money to continue the program.

BILLS — Governor Smith has sent Sen. Mike McKool's voter registration bill to the Secretary of State without his signature, there by allowing it to become law. It requires that all citizens registering to vote in person must fill out a written application containing the same information as the registration certificate in order to get a certificate.

Governor vetoed a bill that would have allowed legislators to have office space in their home county courthouses. He said rental could be provided from legislators' expense allowance.

He also vetoed bills providing for insurance protection (through private, non-profit corporations) on bank deposits above \$15,000.

Smith said he is in accord with idea of giving full protection for bank deposits but feels that the matter should have careful study before implementing legislation becomes law.

FIRST CANDIDATE EMERGES — Hawthorne Phillips, former district judge at Brownsville and now executive assistant to Attorney General Crawford Martin, has announced his candidacy for the Texas Supreme Court.

He says he will run for the seat being vacated by Associate Justice Robert W. Hamilton of El Paso, who recently announced that he will not run again, after 11 years on the bench.

TO AWAKEN SMALL TOWNS — Governor Smith announced a "Texas Communities Tomorrow" program to revitalize the small towns in Texas.

Aim is to provide a central source through which small towns can get information on governmental aid available to them and to help find technical and financial know-how for improvement programs.

Most "hometowns" are "becoming crowded cities" or "decaying into nothingness", complained the governor.

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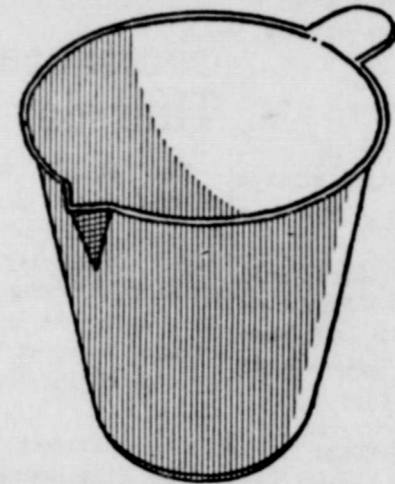


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EDWARDS PLATEAU GROUP TO MEET IN ROBERT LEE

Wall Hawks Fall To Tough Longhorns, 36-8

The Bronte Longhorns scored in every quarter when they blasted the Wall Hawks 36-8 last Friday night in a non-district contest. Keith McCutchen's pass completion record was a tremendous factor in the victory, along with the defense's tight throttling of the Hawks' offensive efforts. Fumbleitis in the Wall backfield also was a big factor.

First Quarter

Donnie Thompson received the kickoff and was pulled down on the 45, but the Longhorns couldn't move on the first series of downs. Randy Barbee punted to the Wall 32 yard line. A Hawk fumble, recovered by James Vaughn quickly gave the ball to the Horns on the 20 and set them up in excellent field position. Nicky Arrott carried twice for 11 yards and a 1st and goal on the 9. McCutchen made a yard, and then he tossed the first counter of the night to Barbee, who went into the end zone for 6 points. Try for extras was no good. Score 6-0.

Willie Zuniga's kick went to Wilfred Wilde on the 20 and he was tackled on the 34. Wilde carried for a loss of 4 and the next play gave the ball to the Horns again on a fumble recovery by Roger Graves.

McCutchen tossed a pass to Zuniga who did some beautiful running to the Wall 15 for a 1st. Arrott made 9 in two tries and McCutchen went the needed yard for a 1st on the 4. A pass was tossed to Zuniga, but he had stepped out of the end zone and it didn't count. Penalties bogged the local lads down and they had

to give up the ball on the 16.

The Hawks started off pretty well, but their hopes were short lived as another fumble was recovered in the air by Arrott. On top of losing the ball the Hawks were penalized half the distance to the goal line which put the ball on the 12. Arrott went for 9 yards to the 3, then McCutchen kept for a 1st on the 1. Arrott then hit a brick wall on his effort to cross the double stripe. Next play was different as once again the Horns had to go to the air and McCutchen hit Zuniga in the end zone for the tally. Another pass to Barbee was good for 2 more and the score stood at 14-0.

Zuniga's kick was short and went to Jim Westbrook who was dropped on the 42. The Hawks couldn't make the yards and the punt went to Arrott who was tripped up on the 31. A penalty moved the ball back to the 14 and then Bobby Skelton went for 6 yards and to the 20 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Arrott went for a 1st down on the 24. Then came Bronte's only fumble loss of the night, recovered by Olen Wilde on the 20. Holick made two tries and lost 4 yards, then a pass went to him and a penalty against Bronte moved the ball to the 14. A couple of plays lost more yards for the Hawks and Bronte took over on their 16.

The Horns failed to make the needed 10 and the punt went to Holik who was tackled on his 35. A pass to Richard Lehr was good for 7 and a Bronte penalty gave the Hawks a 1st on the Bronte 45. Holik then made a beautiful run for 27 yards and a 1st on the Bronte 27. Then Bronte was penalized to the 14, giving Wall a fine opportunity. However, it was the same old story and a fumble was recovered by Roger Graves, giving the Longhorns the ball on the 15.

The Hawks tightened up and Barbee had to kick with the ball being placed on the Wall 28. Holik carried twice and made a 1st on the 40, but that was about it, and they had to punt. The ball went out on the Bronte 45.

A 15 yard pass from McCutchen to Barbee gave the Horns a 1st on the Wall 45. A second catch by Barbee netted another 9 yards to the 36. Arrott carried for 9 more and a 1st on the 27. Two incomplete passes were not much help, but the fourth try saw McCutchen hitting Arrott with a 27 yard gainer and another touchdown. A pass to Zuniga gave 2

extras and the score was 22-0.

The kickoff and a couple of plays by the Hawks ended the half.

Third Quarter

Holik brought Zuniga's kick out to the 40 and then he went for a 5 yard gainer. Another fumble was recovered by McCutchen and Bronte took over on their 49. *Engineering — electrical, automotive, tractor.

*Family living — food and nutrition, clothing, grooming, furnishings, home grounds, child care.

*Personal development—safety, health, career exploration, leadership and citizenship.

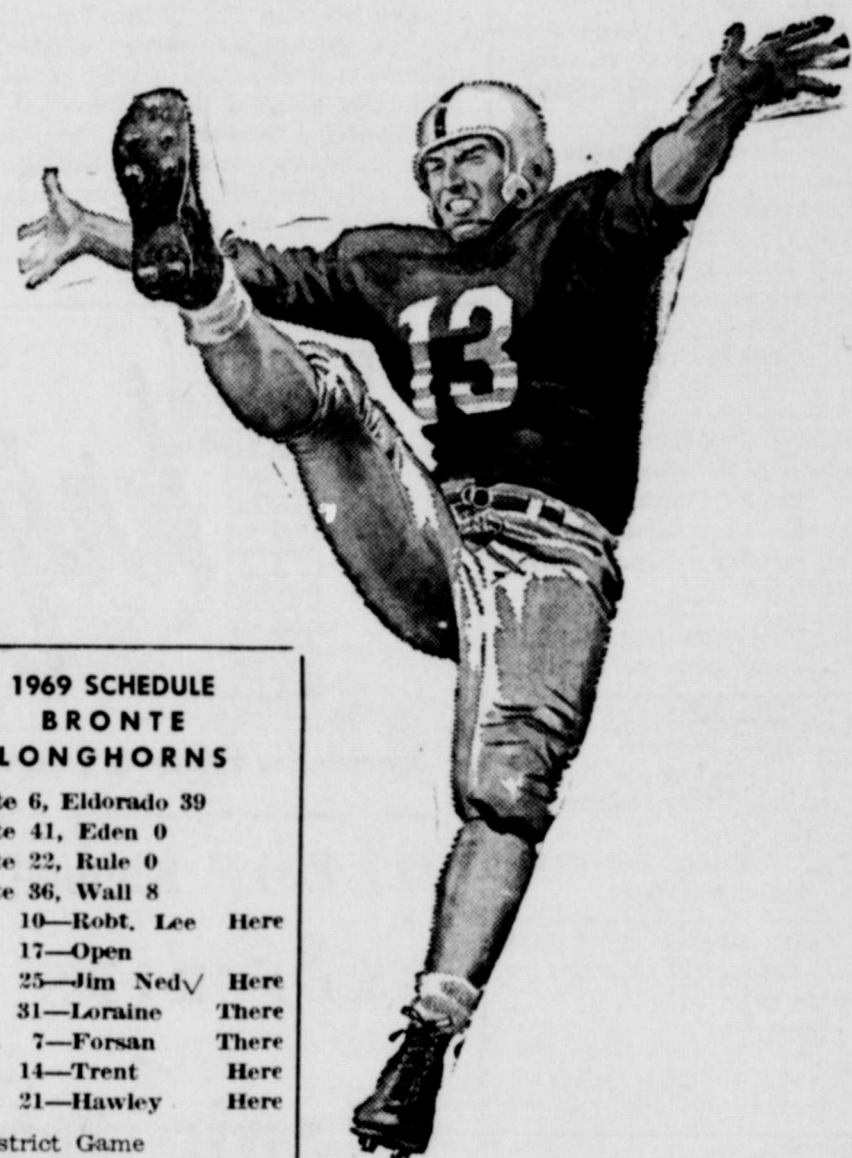

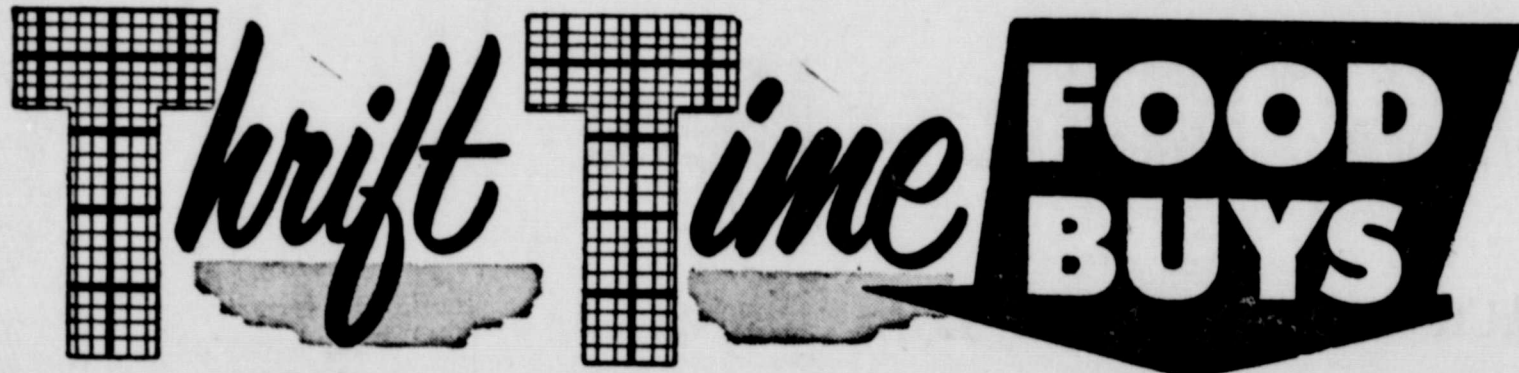
